#### FROM DG MIKE KEREK

I received a call from a gentleman last Friday named "Brian." He's 65 years old, has diabetes but otherwise in good health, but was forced to retire early last year due to Diabetic Retinopathy. The loss of vision was rapid and severe. He's legally blind now and his vision continues to deteriorate. He lives on his own; no family, no friends who are available, nobody to help him.

He called me because my number was online and he was trying to reach, "The Lions." His pharmacist recommended he do so when he was picking up his prescriptions – apparently her sister suffers from the same condition and "The Lions" helped her out. (No mention of what that assistance was!) When I asked how the Lions could assist him, he could only come up with, "I need eyeballs." He couldn't see to drive anymore. He couldn't read a computer anymore. He could barely make out the numbers on his phone and could hardly read what he wrote...unless it was in really big letters and numbers.

We talked for over an hour. He was belligerent, almost hostile; argumentative, rejecting suggestion after suggestion; but overriding it all, he was afraid. Absolutely petrified at the direction life was taking him without vision. I heard him break down several times, though he tried to hide it. At one poignant moment he said, "It's hard, Mike. Really damn hard." The emotion in his voice, in the voice of a grown man who went from working, boating, and enjoying life to being lost in a new reality, was heart-breaking. I had no clue how to help him, or what the Lions could realistically do for him. Except...

I looked up the number for Pilot Dogs and Lion Dan Kelley, who many know is a successful teacher, husband, proud father of 2, president of his Lions Club, and completely blind. I almost had to bully Brian into writing those phone numbers down but explained that he needed resources that the Lions didn't have. He needed professional assistance from people who knew how to help him, and where to go to find additional resources.

Brian called me today to thank me. He called Pilot Dogs and is now registered to take the ONM class to help him start the process of learning how to live without his sight. They also hooked him up with other organizations and are helping to guide him. Through Dan and other blind Lions, he has the start of a network to help him emotionally. As he said to me, "Things are looking up."

As Lions, we have sometimes an infuriatingly limited ability to help people we so want to assist. Limitations including financial, time, and knowledge. But we have so many other organizations that we either partner with or can utilize when needed; we can, in fact, help many more than what we have the resources ourselves to do. IF we know our resources!

Take the time to learn about the various Foundations, Agencies, and organizations that are local and in Ohio, and the services they each provide. I think you will be amazed at the wide range of options you and your club has to assist others in need. We don't have to HAVE the money, the time, or the knowledge. We just have to know who does and where to go to get it!

## Our Ongoing Commitment to Service

Help Us In Spreading Kindness...

The Lions of MD13 will be coming down to our neighborhood in May, for the State Convention, at the Doubletree Hotel in Worthington. If you remember, at last year's State convention, we sorted and prepped more than 13,000 pill bottles for reuse or recycling. This year's service effort is focused a little closer to home.

The Buckeye Food Alliance (BFA) is the food pantry providing support for OSU students who are experiencing hunger – and there are a lot of them! The BFA is visited by almost 1000 students every month. One of the favorite items on their shelves is peanut butter. It is nutritious, is it easily stored, it can be used in a number of ways, has a long shelf life... and it fits in a backpack for easy transport! So, we are going to give them peanut butter!!!

Lions from throughout the state are being asked to bring in jars of peanut butter to be transported down to the State convention and, eventually, to the Buckeye Food Alliance. The OH5 Cabinet has already kicked off the campaign locally. At the cabinet meeting last week, each Lion present was asked to bring a jar of peanut butter. We already have more than 60 lbs of peanut butter to get us started. Let's see how much we can collect at the Zone and individual club levels over the next two months so that when the time comes, we can see our contributions added to those of Lions across the state, and feed a whole lot of hungry students.

#### FROM CC DAVE STOCKUM

Where did February go? What a month. We had a successful Council of Governors Meeting in Grove City at which many pressing issues were decided by the District Governors. Foremost, the DG's approved the language of an issue to be voted on at the MD13 State Convention in May asking the delegates in attendance to decide whether the International Relations Committee remain as part of the MD13 Structure. A second issue approved by the DG's was the language to consider whether to add in the MD13 Policy Manual an unfunded position of New Voices Coordinator to the Global Action Team. PDG Rob Murry informed the DG's that he was retiring from his position as Assistant MD13 Treasurer, and the DG's approved the nomination of PDG Randy Goff to replace Rob beginning July 1, 2024. PDG Rob also announced his intention to step down from the MD13 Liaison Committee, effective the end of June, so DG's will select a replacement for that position at the State Convention. MD13 Lions and OH3 have been blessed by the leadership and service PDG Rob Murry has provided in these two important offices, as well as the OH3 CST, over many years. Thank you, Lion Rob, thank you.

We are close to moving into positive numbers in membership growth for the first time this century! We are currently only 15 members in the red, if you are familiar with accounting terminology. There are many things we can do to put us in the black. We can embrace the Recruiter's Passport Program. Lions who have received this handy guide to recruiting new members have been quite enthusiastic about it. We can accept the Council Chair Challenge to finish the year +2 or better in membership in our clubs. We can invite non-Lions to join us in our service projects. We can put our new members to work and make sure they feel welcome and essential to the life of our clubs. We can make sure we have sufficient orientation to both new and longtime members about how our club, our district and our international organization function. We can remind members who have sponsored new Lions that their duty does not end when the new Lions are installed. We can recognize that not all our members have the same skills and motivations in being part of <u>our</u> organization and work to take advantage of those areas in which they are adept. In other words, growing by adding members is important, but keeping members by following the WE SERVE of Lionism is why we exist.

Best Wishes in the coming months. Plan to attend your District Convention if possible. Spring Ahead (as the Daylight Savings Time folks say) into a season of growth in service.
