





Vision disability is one of the top 10 disabilities among adults 18 years and older. It is one of the most prevalent disabling conditions among children and causes substantial social and economic toll for millions of people. This causes significant suffering, loss of productivity and a diminished quality of life.

Half of all blindness is preventable but the number of Ohioans who suffer vision loss continues to increase. The primary causes of loss of vision are cataracts, retinopathy, glaucoma, and age-related macular degeneration (AMD).

Kindness!

The Lions of Ohio and of OH-5 outdid themselves at the State convention in May, following through on a planned statewide service project in spectacular fashion. The Lions were tasked with collecting peanut butter, to be contributed to the Buckeye Food Alliance (the student-run food pantry on the main OSU



campus in Columbus). The goal was to raise awareness of the issue of hunger on campus, not just at Ohio State, but across the state.

Lions brought peanut butter in bags, in boxes, and even in suitcases! The jars were stacked on a table at the convention site under nifty looking signs fit for a "mountain of peanut butter" – Skippy Summit, Jif Junction, Peter Pan Peak, and Random Range. The display was flanked by two signs, one proclaiming peanut butter as the near-perfect superfood for hungry college students, and one highlighting the 50+ sites around the State of Ohio with student-run campus food pantries. There were even open jars of creamy and crunchy peanut butter included, wafting that wonderful aroma through the room. Lions were invited to grab a tasting spoon and dip in for a free sample, in exchange for a promise that they would check out the poster, look for a campus near them, and return home to explore what their Lions Club could do to help hungry students close to home.

When we ran out of room on the table (and worried about it collapsing under the weight!) the peanut butter was stacked in front of, and under the table. LOTS of peanut butter. In the end, it was estimated that we collected 2271 pounds of peanut butter!!!

Special thanks go out to Lion Stu Koble, of the Grove City Lions, who came and collected all that peanut butter in his truck (with the loading help of Lions from all over the state), then took it down to the Buckeye Food Alliance on Monday, for delivery.

That mountain of peanut butter... that TON of peanut butter... is a great reminder of what Lions can do when we come together. But it was created by collecting the individual jars donated by individual Lions. Individually, and together, WE SERVE!



FROM CC DAVE STOCKUM

Greetings! As we enter the homestretch of the 2023-2024 Lions Year, first and foremost I want to thank all the MD13 Lions for their service to humanity. Lions International has added a global cause of humanitarian service to include all those things we do that do not fit into the specific areas of childhood cancer, diabetes, sight, environment and hunger. MD13 leadership has done an excellent job of promoting service in all these areas. Disaster Relief, an area we have had to deal with more than we wish this year, and Youth are also designated as Global Causes now.

At the recent MD13 State Convention, we celebrated the outstanding job our multiple district leaders have done this year. The convention could have been marred by the poor service we experienced, especially in respect to food issues, but the fact that attendees practiced, not simply preached, the idea that "kindness matters" enabled us to celebrate the accomplishments of numerous Lions, especially our district governors. We also took advantage of the opportunity to update our knowledge of how our foundations work, to enjoy hospitality provided by our incoming second vice governors and OLERF, and generally to just have a good reunion with members of our Lions family. MDS Debbie Luttrell and PDG John Davis, with a little help from their friends, did a super job at what we believe is our last concession to COVID commitments.

If you like numbers, MD13 has completed almost 8000 service activities this year, serving close to 1.5 million people with 185,000 service hours donated. We have added 856 new members, and if we maintain this pace, we will meet the Constitutional Area Assigned goal of 957 new members. MD13 has 9700 members in 350 clubs at this point, and our clubs have donated over \$190,000 to various causes. Keep this last thought in mind; we have not had a year since 2007 in which we have had positive membership growth. We are hovering around the break even point so a strong June is critical. If each club added one member in the next month, we would end the 17-year losing streak in which we find our multiple district. Keep inviting non-Lions to join our association and keep encouraging non-participating Lions to come back to an active role in our clubs.

PDG Mike Kerek has been selected as the next Council Chairperson, DGe Brad King as the Vice Council Chair, and DGe Lilane Fox as the Chaplain. Congratulations to these Lions, along with DGe's Susan Davis, Patty Moorman, Mary Ellen Sherer, William Humphrey, and Toni Gray, who will take office in the new Lions Year, 2024-2025. I am confident that they will provide solid leadership and guidance given the support I have received this year.

It has been an exciting year for me, and I thank you all who have graciously welcomed me to club meetings and celebrations, to district events, and through personal interactions. You have followed the Code of Ethics reminder to be liberal in praise and careful in criticism, especially when criticism was due. Bless you all, MD13 pride of Lions.

An "Old-Fashioned Pancake Breakfast" July 20 8:00 AM – 12:00 PM

Every July, the Tri-Village Lions hold their annual Pancake Breakfast at the Larson Middle School in Grandview Heights. Last year, members of our community were invited to donate tickets for the breakfast to be shared with families who use the Heart-to-Heart Food Pantry in Grandview.

More than 80 children and adults used those donated tickets to attend the breakfast. One mother couldn't say "thank you" enough – she said that had it not been for the pancake breakfast, her kids wouldn't have had anything to eat that day. Another mother said she thought it was the first time her children had ever been to a "restaurant" – someplace where they went, outside of home, to sit and eat and be served. All who attended courtesy of the community's generosity were grateful.

Their attendance at the Pancake Breakfast was, in part, the impetus for proposing the Tri-Village Packers project. The Tri-Village Lions would like to extend our Packers outreach to include this summer's Pancake Breakfast. We would like to offer donated tickets to the same families who were approached for the Fall and Spring food distribution, as well as to the families who rely on the Heart-to-Heart pantry.
