Community Service FOR and BY Your Community

I encourage you to read the feature article included in this newsletter about the activities of the Tri-Village Lions (those completed and those planned). The projects described there are (we think!) impressive – but the lesson to be learned (and borrowed by others!) have to do with how the projects were funded and brought to fruition.

There was a time when many of our Lions Clubs were larger and were able to pull off a few well-coordinated service projects a year, supported by our separate fundraising projects. But as the numbers shrunk, so did the ability to impact our community. Smaller clubs raised lesser amounts of money, and thus had to scale back our service projects because we had smaller budgets to support those efforts. But it doesn't have to be that way.

Consider asking for help from your community. Are there community foundations that provide funding for projects in your area? Are there other service organizations in your community (for example, Rotary Clubs, Kiwanis Clubs, Key Clubs) who have members ready to serve? Are there community members who will donate money to be used to pay for things for community members who can't afford them directly?

Decide who you want to serve – and then "pitch" the PROJECT to your community (with the Lions spearheading the activity, of course!). Sometimes, WE SERVE by gathering the resources needed instead of doing it all by ourselves!!!



December Feature Club: Tri-Village Lions Club "Focus on Hunger"

The Tri-Village Lions made a conscious decision to focus our service efforts this year on issues of hunger and food insufficiency in our community. We began, in July, by inviting community members to buy tickets to our annual Pancake Breakfast for themselves – or for others! Folks could buy tickets to be donated to our local food pantry, who shared those tickets with patrons of the food pantry to enjoy. More than 80 children and adults who regularly rely on food from the Heart-to-Heart pantry were able to enjoy a traditional pancake breakfast with the Lions.

In August, we proposed a new initiative. We set out to provide food for children in the schools in Tri-Village (Upper Arlington and Grandview) who receive free school lunch, and would be without that hunger support during the five days of the Thanksgiving break. We knew that we couldn't pull this off by ourselves – and we didn't need to. You may want to check out the website we established to celebrate the inaugural efforts of the "Tri-Village Packers" at www.trivillagepackers.com. Make sure to check out the reference to "Our Team." The Tri-Village Lions brought together folks from a variety of community-based organizations. Together, we packed and distributed more than 1400 meals and snacks to 93 children in the Tri-Village community. The project was funded by a grant from the Upper Arlington Community Foundation, along with contributions from both organizations and community members.

We have plans for the future, as well. We will be doing a series of small hunger-related projects throughout the coming months, and then focus on two major initiatives in the spring. The Tri-Village Packers will stage a return to send home food for hungry school kids over Spring vacation. Then, in late Spring, we will be producing a cookbook targeted for seniors in our community. It will include recipes for 1 or 2, heart healthy recipes, diabetic-safe recipes, and more. This, too, will be funded by someone else – the Upper Arlington Senior Association.

We anticipate that before the year is done, the Tri-Village Lions (and friends!) will have served more than 700 Tri-Village residents with projects related to food, hunger, and food insufficiency – all provided through the generosity of money and spirit from our community neighbors!

Lions of MD13,

As this communication will reach you sometime during the Holiday Season, best wishes to you and your family and friends as you gather together in thanksgiving and celebration of all that has been given to you. Thank you so much for all you give back to those who are not as fortunate.

November has been an exciting month in MD13, and December promises to be equally productive and fun. We just completed an RLL2 Training Weekend at Salt Fork Lodge in Cambridge, Ohio. Lions representing all the districts in MD13 were in attendance, ranging from club members to a sitting International Director. We were blessed to have ID Ron Keller fly/flee from Iowa via Chicago/Columbus/Millersport during the wee hours Saturday night and early Sunday morning and appear for lunch and enlightenment Sunday afternoon in Salt Fork. At the other end of the Lions experience, Kevin Plummer of Logan Lions shared his first five months of Lions experience with a gathering that included three first vice district governors, a second vice district governor, a sitting DG, three FDI graduates, a few past council chairs, numerous zone chairs, a GLT, an MDS, PDG's, and moi! We investigated how we became Lions, the skills we had to offer MD13 and our local clubs and districts, identifying potential leaders, and how the multiple district worked and supported Lions work through the responsible use of dues and donations. GLT Chair PDG Jay Carey hopes to follow this training up early next Fall with an Emerging Lions Leadership Institute for current and aspiring club officers.

At the November Council of Governors Meeting, we had an excellent presentation from a representative of the Charitable Division of the Ohio Attorney General's Office. Her presentation was recorded and is currently being edited to possibly being offered as a YouTube program. Keep your eyes open for that unveiling. A tour of the Central Ohio Lions Eye Bank, which stores and provides corneal tissue for research and surgeries, was part of the day, as well as two fine dining experiences provided by the Eye Bank! At the meeting, the DG's voted to have Constitution and By-Laws frame two motions; one to eliminate the International Relations Committee and a second to promote the New Voices Platform. These would be considered at the February CoG Meeting and could be offered for approval at the State Convention in May. In her monthly meeting, PCC Kerry

Parker reported Service Projects reported to MyLions rose from 46% of our clubs to over 70%, in part due to the Fall into Service Campaign. Let's continue to work on letting folks at all levels of society, Lions and non-Lions, know about the good things we do. As I write this report, we are +10 in membership growth for the current Lions Year, but clubs should be looking to their non-participating and nonpaying members this month finding ways to help them continue as contributing members of our organization. At the Salt Fork Training highlighted earlier in this message, providing mentoring and training, both of new and existing members, was offered as one way we can do a better job of retention. While we have added almost 400 new members this year, seeing a growth of +10 only takes a little simple math to see we have lost nearly 390. PCC Kenny Schuck's Global Membership Team is about ready to unveil a program to promote membership growth. We have one new club, three in the works, and at least two potential branch clubs being investigated in MD13 at this time. The goal set for us by the International is 918 new members and 8 new clubs. We are barely beyond one third of our Lions Year. We can make this happen, folks!

Check out ohiolions.org, our state website, for information on the Winter Retreat and the Spring Convention Season. Those who attended the recent RLLI Training will tell you how much fun it is to gather with Lions from across our districts and state, sharing fellowship, training, and service ideas. Having attended Cabinet Meetings in all our districts, five STEPS walks, a handful of charter nights, and other local Lion events, I can say with confidence that we have an outstanding organization in MD13 of which we can be proud to say we are a member. MD13 Lions are being recognized outside our state boundaries as well. PID Steve Sherer is Chairman for the 2024 USA/Canada Forum in Louisville, Lion Tamarra Parker-Stephens was the feature speaker in the October Meeting of the Regional GAT, Lion Robert Borger is the alternate for Leo Liaison in CA1, and ID Ron Keller is Chairman of the Llons International Membership Committee. Congratulations!

Let's serve, let's grow, and let's have fun in the process.
