It is with tremendous gratitude that I write this letter to you. First of all please receive my deepest sympathies for your great personal loss. Your loved one's loss has provided me with better vision that I've had in years.

I am a Vietnam veteran having served in Vietnam in 1967-1968. Though I've always considered myself a healthy individual, age is catching up with me. I now suffer from macular degeneration in both eyes. My left eye was in need of a corneal transplant. My wife and I enjoy the hobby of birdwatching. We've traveled across the USA and beyond in search of some cool birds. In the past seven years it was becoming increasingly frustrating and difficult to see birds in flight and not as clearly as before. My ophthalmologist recommended a corneal transplant in my left eye. Thus, in August, my doctor performed the corneal transplant. Following the surgery, I can see better than I have in years. Bird watching has become enjoyable once again. I can never thank your loved one enough for restoring my vision and restoring my joy in observing nature - birds, butterflies, dragonflies, flowers, etc. May my story bring you some degree of comfort in knowing that I am seeing better because of your loved one's selfless gift. Your loved one lives on in others like me.
