You Can Do It!

As I have visited various clubs in the district, I hear recurring themes. The two most prevalent are:

- 1. We don't have enough members to do our projects anymore
- 2. We don't have any money since COVID took our fundraisers away

I wanted to address those concerns the same way I have made my responses to them in the meetings.

First, why are you putting this pressure on yourself? So you can't do the pancake breakfast or man the gates at the county fair, at least not at this time. You have the opportunity to start fresh. Find new projects, new fundraisers. Look to the active members for things that have not been tried that sound fun and worthy. FORGET about the past at this point and look forward to what you CAN do...and you can do plenty, regardless of the size of your club or the ages. There are a bunch of projects available for any club to pick up and do – clubs just have to reach out and ask. Even projects where some members can work on the projects at home but still be engaged as Lions.

If you look for the problems in every idea, nothing will work. If you look at the ideas and come up with solutions for the challenges you might face, every idea has a chance of being a success. Even ones that are tried but are not exactly executed as planned are a success, for they provide the lessons learned the next time you try something. Look for partnerships and relationships – churches, scouts, other civic organizations, Bubba's extended family at the end of the street. Not only will you expand your ability to provide more opportunities for service, you'll forge new relationships that could potentially lead to new members down the road.

Bummed about no money? Guess what – nowhere in Lionism does it say that philanthropic donations are required. Until you have a chance to get a couple of fundraisers going again, you have a resource that is just as valuable – time. If I ask you what the last new project was that you tried, what will you tell me?

Peek your head outside the box and let's get back to being Lions again. "We Serve" is what we should be doing. Work together as clubs, ask if you need help. If you are an active club still, reach out to your fellow Lions and offer assistance to struggling clubs. The ultimate beneficiaries of our collective efforts are the 50+ communities we serve as a district!

OUR NEIGHBORS IN KENTUCKY REACH OUT FOR RELIEF

Our Kentucky relief project is an ongoing statewide project through June 30, 2022. As victims are slowly beginning to get their insurance claims dealt with, they are trickling back to the affected towns. Clubs, individual Lions, and our community partners can participate in one of three ways -

- 1. pack plastic totes with household items sheets, kitchen utensils, tools, anything from the list. District service coordinators can arrange pick up points for the totes. Millersport Lions are allowing us to collect all the totes in their clubhouse, to be taken to the Kentucky Lions distribution centers. See the message below re: collection at the state convention, and the next page for information about what is needed by our neighbors in Kentucky.
- 2. Monetary donation to help buy 2"X4"s, 2"X6"s and plywood to help with repairs for the uninsured and the many UNDER-insured. These folks are just now able to start patching roofs and walls now that the insurance adjusters have been out. Instead of collecting wood, we are collecting money to purchase the wood closer to Hopkinsville and get it delivered to the distribution center.
- 3. --Money can be sent to Ohio Lions, Inc 4074 Hoover Rd., Grove City OH 43123 or there is a Paypal link for donations on <u>ohiolions.org</u>.
- 4. Sending thoughts and prayers for those struggling to make ends meet, to secure housing, to cope with the depression and PTSD that are affecting their families.

With the disastrous events unfolding in the Ukraine, the world has turned its attention there. This is not to negate efforts to help internationally. But our neighbors in Kentucky are also displaced and desperate, just without the continued media coverage. We want to show them the heart that Lions have.

THIS Is What It Means To Be A Lion

LCI has invited each District to submit a story – their story – of service to the community, in order to receive a \$500 grant to be used to expand the reach of our service. This is the submission sent in from the Lions of OH5. It makes you proud to be a Lion!

In October 2015, 14 Lions leaders from around Ohio, participating in a Regional Lions Leadership Level 3 program, were tasked with coming up with a legacy project for Ohio that would help celebrate 100 years of Lionism. After much deliberation, childhood cancer was chosen as the cause and a series of 5K walk/runs across the state named "STEPS" walks with at least one per district, was decided upon as the project. Allowing for planning, the first events were to be held in the Fall of 2017.

Three of the RLLI participants were from District OH5; two of them, GMT/1VDG Mike Kerek and Kirby Witmer, co-hosted their STEPS 5K during September 2017 in Worthington, OH. This first event was made even more meaningful to attendees from the Reynoldsburg Lions Club because two months earlier an eight year old boy named Braxton Long passed away from cancer. He was friends with one of the Reynoldsburg Lions' son.

Braxton's well-publicized fight with cancer before losing the battle resonated with everyone in the area. Super Braxton shirts appeared everywhere in Reynoldsburg and outlying areas. He was a cheerful, upbeat little boy who loved Legos, police officers, and God. Even toward the end he greeted everyone with a smile, and he always asked for extra Legos to be brought to Nationwide Children's Hospital's oncology ward so his new friends wouldn't be bored. When he passed away, his coffin was filled with no less than a dozen police badges from surrounding departments; thousands of Lego sets were brought in lieu of flowers; the Pataskala Police Department named their new building wing after him; new awards were given in his memory at his old elementary school.

The following year, DG Mike Kerek appointed Lion Debbie Bolyard, the parent of the son who lost his friend, as the first OH5 Pediatric Cancer Chair. The 5K moved from Worthington to Reynoldsburg, and with the blessing and participation of the Long family, the event was renamed the "Super Braxton 5K." (SB5K.) DG Mike and Lion Debbie became the co-coordinators. While this event remained an OH5 Lions district event, it became known in the Reynoldsburg community as well, and the 5K went from 35 attendees to almost 200. Four area pediatric cancer foundations came out in support. Police and fire departments donated their time. About 15 Star Wars reenactors and princesses joined them to cheer everyone on. Local fast food stores donated food. About 50 Leos Club members volunteered. A finalist in "America's Got Talent" sang the National Anthem. Emberly Long, Braxton's twin sister, started the race for everyone. What had occurred was magical; this event, now being held in Braxton's memory, was also raising everyone's awareness of the disease, in addition to much needed money for research. (100% of the net proceeds from the SB5K go to Nationwide and Dayton Children's Hospitals for cancer research.)

It also lit fires across the OH5 district. The Lego Drive became an OH5 project as well, with clubs and zones competing against each other to collect the most sets. (The Long family, who coordinates the Lego Drive, now have so many donations coming in from Lions and other sources that they are donating to Nationwide, Dayton and Cincinnati Children's Hospitals, with a surplus in stock!)

Frustrated by the distance from the far west side of the district to get to Reynoldsburg, the Arcanum Lions Club started a "Fun Walk" at Brumbaugh Fruit Farm that raised over \$15,000 for research at Dayton Children's Hospital in three years before COVID shut it down. There is now a room named after the OH5 and OH6 Lions at this hospital, due in large part to their efforts.

Clubs around the district started donating to various pediatric cancer causes, including foundations and other programs, in addition to supporting the SB5K. The Sam Bish Foundation,

named for Sam Bish who passed away at the age of 9 in 2010, was helped in cash and in-kind donations not only by OH5 Lions, but at the state convention as well. When the Ohio Lions Pediatric Cancer Foundation was started in 2019, it raised \$25,000 its first year alone, and has steadily grown every year – it could hit \$100,000 in its first three years of existence. At the 2022 OH5 District Convention in March, despite frigid temperatures and snow, a STEPS walk to raise money for pediatric cancer raised \$1000 in donations from attendees.

In 2017, few Lions clubs even thought of childhood cancer. Today, over half the OH5 clubs are reporting at least some sort of donation to a pediatric cancer cause, with the trend continuing up each year. Just the OH5 5K Walks and the Fun Walks alone have raised over \$75,000 for childhood cancer research; with other club donations to various worthy programs, that number exceeds \$100,000. Thousands of people have participated in events and have been educated about childhood cancer during this time frame.

The OH5 GST considers the SB5K to be the most successful District service project they've had. But in addition to the obvious benefits, it also has produced in other areas. Thanks to the STEPS 5K/SB5K, seven new Lions have joined. Four Lions have moved into leadership positions within the district after volunteering on the SB5K committee. A couple of them have taught at "Learn to Roar" District OH5 Leadership Training. The SB5K has also opened doors to new partnerships with the city, various foundations, and corporations. It has also brought new relationships with Lions Club members who participate.

In November 2022, it will be the 6th pediatric cancer walk for OH5, and the 5th SB5K. Brittany Long, Braxton's mom, wants this to be a celebration event. Super Hero costume contest for kids and adults, special awards, special food. Already over 20 reenactors have said they were coming out, with more to come. Super Heroes from the comics will be there. Police from three different departments and EMS are planning on being there. Star War's R2D2 will be making an appearance. The Summit Station High School's robotics program will be demonstrating their robots. Special Kids Run. News media will be invited, along with local dignitaries and perhaps even some other special guests. It

But underneath it all is the reason the Lions continue to pull it together, year after year. A message that is stated to the members and all volunteers before opening the doors to the public for

should be quite the event.

registration. This event is not about us. It's not about the Lions, or the Leos, or the other foundations and volunteers who help out. This is about the children who have cancer and their families.

We will never stop childhood cancer. But our ultimate goal is one day, if a doctor has to tell a parent, "I'm sorry, your child has cancer," the next words out of his or her mouth is, "But we have the cure."
