October Is Vision Awareness Month!

Ever since Helen Keller inspired Lions to champion the cause of blindness in 1925, we've served and advocated for the blind and visually impaired. Raise awareness of Lions fight against preventable blindness. **This year, World Sight Day is October 10**th. Has your club planned any activities to remind the community of the importance of sight conservation? Here are some reminders of how precious vision is, and why Lions have long been recognized as the *Knights of the Blind*.



What Is the Difference Between a Vision Screening and an Eye Exam?

What does a vision screening do?

A vision screening serves to detect the presence of ocular or visual health issues and with that detection, a referral is made to a local optometrist to complete a comprehensive eye examination. The

difference between the two is that a comprehensive eye exam actually diagnoses visual health issues and ocular conditions in a way that a vision screening just can't, simply because there's a difference in equipment and in the depth of the examination.

What's the advantage of a comprehensive eye exam?

Not only is your eye doctor able to tell exactly what your prescription is during the comprehensive eye exam, they're also able to look at the health of the back of the eye using special drops that dilate the pupil. During the eye dilation, the doctor is able to see the retina and to check for early indicators of diabetes, warning signs for glaucoma and any other possible retinal findings that could be detrimental to the overall ocular health.

Isn't Modern Technology Wonderful?

The latest technology available to people who are blind provides an opportunity for them to access print materials on the go. **Voice Dream Scanner** is an optical character recognition (OCR) **scanner**. It was created for use on a cell phone. It **scans** an inaccessible document or text image and converts the text to an accessible document that can be read out loud by the built-in reading program in the cell phone. Blind individuals can buy it from the App Store for (ready?) just \$6!!! New, affordable technology provides a level of independence and dignity that people who are blind have struggled to achieve until now. Learn more about Voice Dream Scanner at

Help Staff an Information Table Medication Safety Awareness for the Blind



Filing Deadline Approaching – Which side is your club on?

Only 33% of Lions Clubs in OH-5 have filed their IRS return for 2018-19 and only 49% have filed their Attorney General return. If your club is using the standard fiscal year of July 1 to June 30, then you have only until November 15th is get both of these returns filed. Do not wait until the last minute. From the F&P Committee

Hi, again, from Lion PDG Dave Luttrell. I am currently serving as the Chair of the state committee Finance and Long Range Planning (F&P for short). I was asked to write a column for district newsletters about what happened in the July and August F&P meetings. As I started to do that, it dawned on me that I really need to report on last year's activities first.

Around 2018-2019 we led a change. approved by the Council of Governors (the 7 sitting District Governors of Multiple District 13 aka COG) to cut mileage in half, and to eliminate meal reimbursements at the state level. F&P suggested, and the delegates in May 2018 approved eliminating two state committees. Finally, F&P adjusted the dues allocation of \$12.16 per Lion per year at the state level to try to balance the State Council Fund, the Office Operations fund, and the remaining funds to keep all of them afloat. In my mind in Fall 2018, I thought this would be sufficient for 3-4 years. I was wrong - it made it until August 2019 before some concerns showed up.

For the 2019-2020 year, the Finance and Planning Committee met in July and then in August, and finally with a joint meeting with the Council of Governors in August. F&P has recommended further options to reduce costs



and promote a growth in membership. The State Finance & Planning & COG discussed & approved most of the 2019-2020 budgets as well as the current five year forecast.

F&P is working with the Global Leadership Team to reduce costs for June 2020 training of Second and First Vice Governors. We are discussing ways to try to make state conventions more affordable, how to better train, and how to readjust the dues allocation (if practical).

F&P has been busy. I hope to be able to share our progress with you in the November timeframe. We will be looking at the five year forecast. And as a heads-up, we shall be starting to discuss a dues increase for some time in the next few years.

What can you do to avoid a dues increase? That's all within our control – if we increase the number of Lions in Ohio each year it will delay or even avoid a dues change. Will you choose to help?



The Tri-Village Lions Present After 9/11: How Strangers Made a Better World An Afternoon To Give You Hope for the Human Race

"Never forget!" has become the mantra of those who urge us to remember, and to learn, from the tragedy that was 9/11. Adults remember the day that our world changed forever, and still mourn the loss of innocent lives. We have heard the stories of bravery and

heroism that surrounded the events, and the aftermath, of that day. But not everyone has heard the tales of ordinary people everywhere, who responded with extraordinary kindness to those who were caught up in those tragic events. It seems that when things are at their worst, people are at their best!

Those are the stories we hope to share on **Sunday**, **October 6**. We'll share stories from a first responder who was sent, with his unit, to help with the rescue and retrieval efforts at Ground Zero, and who experienced, first-hand, the kindness and caring of New Yorkers who couldn't help with those efforts, but could support those who did. You'll hear stories from an everyday hero who wasn't part of any rescue team, but felt compelled to go to the site before the ashes settled, to try to help in any way he could. And you will hear the remarkable story of the little towns in Newfoundland whose people opened their hearts and their homes to the stranded "plane people" from international flights who couldn't go home for four days, and who couldn't know what they would find when they got there.

Why is it important to hear – and remember – these stories? Because it reminds us that we are all part of something bigger than ourselves. Our actions matter. Each of us *can* make a difference. Those individual actions may not be felt or remembered on the world stage. They may never be known or recognized by anyone. But every offer of kindness, every selfless act, every contribution you make towards a better world will, indeed, make our world a better place.

We thought about naming the event "The Feel Good Sunday." We expect that when you leave the panel discussion that day, you will leave with a smile. Come and hear about the kindness of strangers in response to unthinkable tragedy, and consider how you can make a difference to someone else every day, in little ways that count.




