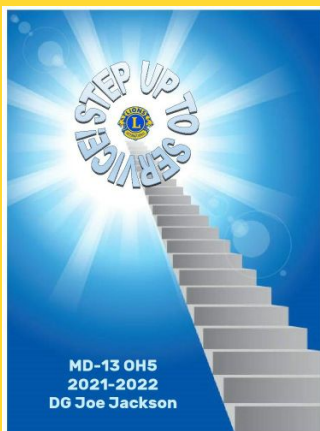

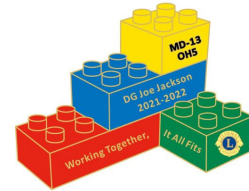

Christmas Child Shoeboxes

Maryville clubs collect items for boys and girls in the following categories:

Girls: 2-4; 5-9; and 10-14

Boys: 2-4; 5-9; and 10-14

Shoeboxes are filled with school supplies, non-liquid hygiene items; accessories; toys, and wow items such as shoes, stuffed animal, a doll or a soccer ball with a pump.

Shoeboxes are due for collection on November 10: see the website for Franklin Graham's program or contact Steve Kaplan or Chris Waller of the Troy Lions. This local program was started by the late Gary Brown and his wife. We now use plastic containers as many locations have no other way to carry water.

Recycling Hearing Aids

Unclaimed Funds Reporting

An URGENT Reminder (*Warning!*) from Compliance Chair

According to the Ohio Unclaimed Funds Law (Revised Code Chapter 169), all businesses (including Lions Clubs) that operate in the State of Ohio, are required to file an Annual Report of Unclaimed Funds to the Ohio Department of Commerce. Lions Clubs usually do not have any unclaimed funds (abandoned bank accounts, safety deposit boxes, paychecks). However, clubs must still file an annual negative report.



The negative report may be filed electronically through the Ohio Business Gateway or by printing out form OUF-1 from the Ohio Department of Commerce website. If filling out the printed form, include all of the contact information at the top. The FEIN is the same as your club's EIN (never write in a Social Security Number). The Report Year is the current calendar year. Check the "NO" box, sign, date, and mail to the address on the bottom of the page.

The State's annual unclaimed funds reporting deadline is **NOVEMBER 1**. Failure to file could result in civil penalties of \$100 per day. If you need any assistance, contact your district compliance chair,

PROJECT IDEAS HUNGER

LEARN

- Invite a community health professional to visit your club and educate members on the prevalence and impact of hunger in your community.

ACT // BEGINNER

- Support your local food bank by donating time, equipment or food.
- Create a resource list of hunger related volunteer opportunities in your region to share with other clubs in your district.
- Use social media to raise awareness about childhood hunger in your community and to inspire others to become involved.
- Host a healthy eating event at your school, community center or place of worship. Invite a nutritionist as a keynote speaker.
- Deliver nutritious, prepared meals to elderly, disabled or ill community members.
- Serve meals at a soup kitchen or homeless shelter.
- Donate to organizations that provide micro-nutrient powders to malnourished children.
- Bring a variety of fruits and vegetables to an elementary school class. Explain to the students where the food comes from and encourage them to taste different types of produce.

ACT // INTERMEDIATE

- Volunteer with a "gleaning group" to harvest unpicked fruits and vegetables at farms and orchards.
- Host a grocery store or market tour where a nutritionist gives participants tips on choosing healthy and nutritious groceries.
- Collaborate with a food bank to organize a community food drive, focusing on collecting items most needed in your area.
- Write a cookbook of inexpensive, healthy, easy-to-make recipes.
- Work with your local school to provide weekend take-home bags of nutritious snacks for children in need.
- Sponsor a cooking class for youth to learn basic cooking skills for healthy living.
- Create an online resource on planning and portioning meals to reduce household food waste.

ACT // ADVANCED

- Conduct an assessment of food access in your community. Advocate to local government leaders for additional or improved options in areas of need.
- Support pregnant women and new mothers by ensuring there are comfortable, safe and clean areas for them to nurse in the community.
- Use your professional networks to connect food banks to food industry leaders interested in food recovery.
- Develop a program to provide underserved students with food during holiday times when school is not in session.
- Establish a community or school vegetable garden for residents in a food-insecure neighborhood.
- Establish a weekly produce stand in a food desert.
- Create a volunteer transportation program to help individuals and families get to and from grocery stores, food banks and soup kitchens.
- Develop an animal husbandry program where a few families receive a small stock of animals. A portion of the animals' offspring will be given to neighboring families for sustainable growth of the program.



We've had a year of being apart, of disruptions to our service projects and fundraisers. It is time to get back to work. Each month we will provide news and ideas about how Lions throughout OH5 are *Roaring Back* from the Pandemic.



Remind Your Lions That They Are Better Together

Just as we couldn't hold our traditional fundraising activities during the pandemic, most of us hit problems in trying pursue our regular fundraising activities, because they didn't fit into the safety protocols established during the pandemic. Just as I suggested that you go back to what folk are used to for service projects, at least this first year, I think the same is true of fundraisers. Give them what feels comfortable and familiar – then add to it with new ideas.

Did you find a new way to fundraise during the pandemic? Is it worth continuing along with the old stuff? For example, my club started up an online “grudge match” with a Lions Club from Michigan, leading up to the OSU/Michigan football game. Even though there was minimal hype about the upcoming game... which ended up being cancelled... we still made close to \$2000. This is a “keeper” for us. We are going to hope that it builds in the future.

Did you have a drive-by pancake breakfast or barbecue dinner this year, when folks placed their orders and then drove by to pick them up? You are going to want to return to your traditional format this year... but maybe keeping the drive-by option AS an option would be a good extension of the project. Did you find a different way of doing outreach for your traditional fundraisers (perhaps doing an online solicitation letter instead of being able to greet people face-to-face to ask for funds)? Is there any reason NOT to do them both? Think about adding to your traditional fundraising activities, rather than changing them.

More than anything else, it appears that our Lions Clubs often lagged this year because we couldn't come together to energize each other. We need to find ways to reconnect. It seems to me this isn't the time to ignore what we have just been through.

The key to getting your Lions Club back on track is to get back, as quickly as possible, to what you were doing pre-pandemic PLUS a whole lot more. In many cases, your Lions have had a year of NOT doing anything, or anything much, related to Lions. You have to convince them there is something worth coming back to. Remind them of WHY they were Lions in the first place, and remind them of all the things they COULD do if they come back together, because we are better together!

The Worthington Noon Lions Reach Out

Lions Clubs traditionally talk to each other about activities and achievements, but forget to share that same information with their community. This month, the Worthington Noon Lions chose to showcase their achievements more broadly with this press release. Take note! It's a great model to use.

WORTHINGTON NOON LIONS CELEBRATE 10 YEAR ANNIVERSARY

For the past 10 years the Worthington Noon Lions Club has been a continuous supporter and contributor to the Worthington Community.

This past year when it seemed like many withdrew from normal activities W.N.L.C. kept itself out-front with continuous community service activities.

The name Lions is synonymous with assisting those visually impaired. Throughout this Club's existence and especially this past year, eye glass donation boxes located in key city sites were monitored by our members and glasses collected for OSU School of Optometry (Student Volunteer Optometric Service to Humanity).

What does a service organization do to celebrate their 10th year anniversary; how about rotating a Worthington Resource Food Pantry donation box among each Lion member? Over this past year, for each month Lion members shared a food donation box on their front porch so their neighbors could donate can goods and personal items. Those items were passed along to the Worthington Food Pantry.

And, when schools opened back up, it was the Worthington Noon Lions who adopted a Worthington Elementary School and 'stuffed-the-back-packs' of three kindergarten classes.

You heard about the Battle of Hard Road? Each fall W.N.L.C. assists Worthington Kilbourne High School in their weeklong battle with Dublin Scioto High School for food collection and dollar donations to feed the hungry.

W.N.L.C. is proud to state as we closed out our 9th year and began our 10th anniversary year of 2021, 100% members renewed. Our club meets twice a month, 2nd and 4th Tuesdays. W.N.L.C. Program Chair has done a superb job securing keynote speakers from Worthington City and School leaders, to International Lion Directors.

The Lion's motto: *We Serve*. Our causes are donating to *Diabetes* research, *Environment* by roadside cleanup projects, supporting the Worthington Resource Food Pantry to improve *human flourishing*, assisting *Vision* with collecting eyeglasses and working with the Ohio State School for the Blind, and *Childhood Cancer* with support to Nationwide Children's Hospital.

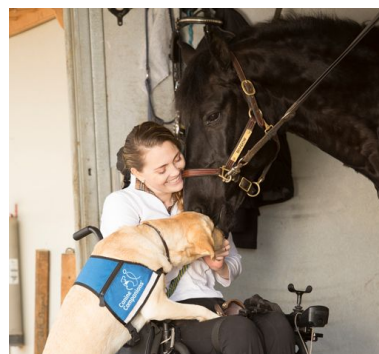
