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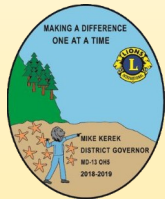

Making a Difference 1 Lion at a time! Governor Mike Kerek



First I want to congratulate the Plain City Lions for bringing in 8 new members, with the possibility of 2 additional new members, as a result of a very successful Membership Night! Proof once again that the **Ohio Plan** (available on the district website, district13oh5.org) works! Kudos to PCC Ben Cosgray for organizing the event.

I read an interesting quote from Ann Sullivan, Helen Keller's teacher/friend. "I need a teacher quite as much as Helen. I know the education of this child will be the distinguishing event of my life, if I have the brains and perseverance to accomplish it."

She understood that this would not be an overnight process; that instant gratification was not even an option, but many years of arduous effort, compounded by frustration and physiological barriers, would be the path to success. The results are indisputable; Ann Sullivan's perseverance resulted in Helen Keller's ability to change the world with her message. Helen rightfully deserves the accolades she received, but Ann's contribution is no less significant.

Just as Helen's life changed with the results of a life-altering illness in her childhood, our organization, at least here in the United States, has been hit with a devastating blow as well: the cultural shift in our society that has swept the country over the last decade. For some of our clubs bedrocked in tradition and history, this has severely adversely affected them, in both membership and activities.

Helen had Ann Sullivan to teach her how to navigate through her new reality. We have teachers too, but may have a more difficult time accepting them as such: the younger generation. Like Helen having to trust Ann, we have to do the same. Because the world isn't the same for us anymore either.

We have to understand that this process is going to take time. Perseverance is the key, overcoming obstacles and not accepting defeat – just looking for alternative solutions until something works. Allow the growth to come back slowly and with substance, adapting to the new realities as you do so.

We also have to accept that 20% will STILL do 80% of the work in the clubs. (That has NOT changed in the last decade, and is pervasive everywhere, in every organization, in every community.) If you are one of the 20%, allowing this to frustrate you is counterproductive. You are doing good, important work for your communities. Stepping back or worse, quitting, is only going to hurt the people you serve, and will leave a sour taste of bitterness in you as well. Adopting an attitude of, "If it has to be, it is up to me," and doing what needs to be done is sometimes the best option. Assess what assistance you can get from others, plan accordingly, and make it work, remembering the entire time why you are doing it. You joined Lions to help other people in need.

At the same time, when we get a new Lion in our club, we need to put them to work. Give them relevant projects. Teach them what you know and let them be an asset. Learn from them and support their passions. If you want active Lions, find ways to allow them to be active. This goes for your old timers as well, by the way; some of them CAN'T do the things they used to, but they can help in other ways if asked. Find ways where they can contribute, and you may be surprised.

I am encouraged by what I have observed around our district. When we are submerged in our own club's problems and see only the difficulties we have to overcome, sometimes it takes an outsider to notice what we're doing right. There is a whole lot of that going on.

Remember our district convention on March 29-30; I hope many of you can make it.

Happy New Years to everyone! If you are keeping your New Year's resolutions, good for you!

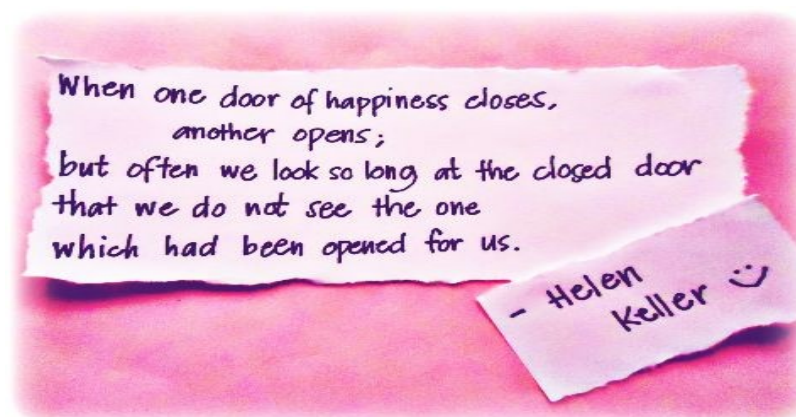

Kim was the recipient of the eye care fund who needed special contacts. Lion Bob Merkle’s Club helped to get her through the eye care fund application process and she was awarded money to assist with the contacts. Kim called Lion Bob to thank his club and let them know she had her new contacts and now has 20/25 vision most of the time. She needed to get insurance to help with replacements she’d need in the future (18-24 months) of about \$750 per eye!! She even got a lead on a part time job. Kim was most appreciative and it’s good to see the eye care funds were well spent!

Donation Checks to The Ohio Lions Foundation

Last year your Ohio Lions Foundation celebrated its **thirty second** year of service. Since its inception, the Foundation has awarded grants in the total amount of **\$1,889,975**, while its administrative expenses have averaged less than five percent (5%) of revenues.

Support Your Ohio Lions Foundation

- **Ohio Lions Foundation Helen Keller Scholarship Program** (now in its 29th year, a total of **11** scholarships are awarded annually to undergraduate, graduate and professional school students at seven state supported universities. The *OLF Helen Keller Scholarship Program* is one of the very few scholarship programs available for visually impaired students pursuing post-graduate courses of study. To date, **over \$676,800** in Helen Keller Scholarships have been given to students in nearly every academic field of study, including nursing, education, rehabilitation, physical therapy, electrical engineering, finance, mathematics, computer/information science, music, law and veterinary medicine.
- **Disaster Relief Grants** (The OLF is proud of its record of being the first organization on the scene with disaster relief funds for direct assistance to victims of floods, tornados and other natural disasters in Ohio). The Foundation has provided disaster relief to flood victims in Deshler, Napoleon and Holgate in Henry County, flood victims in Ripley, Ohio and in Crooksville, Ohio and victims of a devastating fire which displaced residents of a multi-unit apartment building in Medina, Ohio.
- **Low Vision Reader Matching Grant Program** (over 70 low-vision readers have been placed to-date in public libraries throughout Ohio). The program has now been expanded to include matching grants for the acquisition of **iPads** (which come with voice-over technology built-in) for public libraries and senior centers to be made available to visually impaired individuals.
- **Matching grants for sight-related programs and equipment**
 - **Direct grants to qualified blind individuals for acquisition of assistive technology.**
 - With the creation of the **Charles E. Cody Fund** for Aid to the Blind (Through a generous bequest from the Estate of Charles E. Cody), grants are now available directly to qualified blind individuals for the acquisition of Apple iPads (which come with built in voice over technology) and Victor Trek GPS/Reader devices.
 - The Foundation has created the **Tom and Helen Roberds Fund** (through a bequest from the Estate of Helen Roberds) which is dedicated to providing funding for sight-related grants.
 - **Ohio State School for the Blind Marching Band.** Let's get behind our nationally recognized **Ohio State School ForThe Blind Marching Band**. The *Ohio Lions Foundation* maintains a Restricted Fund specifically for the support of the OSSB marching band. Donations may be made payable to the "Ohio Lions

Foundation" with the designation in the memo line "Ohio State School for The Blind Marching Band Fund", and mailed to the Ohio Lions Foundation, P.O. Box 21016, Columbus, Ohio 43221.

- **Lions Sensory Garden at the Ohio State School For The Blind.**
The Foundation recently sponsored a series of classes through the "One-Touch Project" which teaches self-defense techniques to blind individuals.
- **Other restricted funds:** The OLF also serves as the trustee for various restricted funds such as the **James and Betty Coffey Endowment Restricted Fund**, the **District OH5 Eye Care Restricted Fund** and the **Lions Sensory Garden Fund** (a District OH5 project).

Lions Club International

Proposed chapter would serve Village

Where there's a need in Franklin County, there's usually a chapter of the Lions Club International ready to step up.

That is not the case, however, in German Village.

Stu Koble and Joe Jackson are looking to change that.

Go to the *ThisWeekNews* YouTube channel to watch Lions Club International members Stu Koble and Joe Jackson talk about establishing a chapter in German Village.

"We're a little befuddled," said Koble, immediate past president of one of two

Grove City chapters. "There are Lions Clubs all around German Village. But, at least from our perspective, all the surrounding communities have needs."

"We've thought about this for several years," Jackson added.

The two men said they will spend the next two months trying to sign up 20 members – the basic threshold of any

Lions Club chapter. Another immediate goal is to try to establish a regular meeting place.

The closest chapters are in downtown Columbus and the Near East Side. The proposed club would serve German Village and surrounding neighborhoods, they said.

“We have resources, manpower and ideas,” Koble said.

Lions Club International, founded in 1916 in Chicago, is a volunteer-run organization. Local dues are \$80 – a one-time sign-up fee of \$15 and \$65 annually. Sign-up fees are waived for those who are veterans, Jackson said.

The club’s original mission was helping the vision-impaired but has dovetailed into many other areas, such as literacy, hunger and assisting those who have diabetes.

All 33 Franklin County chapters have an ongoing mission to collect Legos for children staying at Nationwide Children’s Hospital.

The club also collects used eyeglasses that are refurbished and given to those in need and is actively involved with Pilot Dogs, a group that provides trained dogs to the legally blind.

The Lions organization, based in Oak Brook, Ill., has 1.4 million members worldwide, according to its website.

Jackson, immediate past governor of Ohio District 5, which includes 11 counties in central and western Ohio, said a German Village chapter has no particular mission in mind, only to help those who need it.

The nonprofit organization hopes to work with schools in the area in providing vision screenings for students in grades pre-K-12, Jackson said. Other than that, the members would rely on the community to voice its own needs, he said.

Linda Langhorst, a board member and volunteer of the South Side Community Ministries Food Pantry, located inside St. Paul United Church of Christ, 225 E. Gates St. in Merion Village, said she recognizes volunteer opportunities throughout the greater neighborhood, including with her own organization.

“There’s always a need, and matching up need with what people are willing to do is a great project,” Langhorst said.





Donation Checks to the OH5 Eye Care Fund

The OH5 Eye Care Fund is a restricted fund under the Ohio Lions Foundation Charitable Organization umbrella created to assist OH5 clubs in providing funding to individuals with vision related issues. If the club does not have the financial resources to help qualified individuals to obtain glasses, have eye related surgeries, or to obtain vision assistance device, please complete the Eye Care Fund grant application that is available on the district website (www.district13oh5.org under the Resources and Training link).

Donation checks need to be made payable to **The Ohio Lions Foundation** with a notation in the memo line **OH5 Eye Care Fund**. Also, add the club name making the donation, if appropriate, to the memo line.

Banks have become very strict in the past few years and will not cash checks not made payable to the account name. Hence, the checks need to be made payable to **The Ohio Lions Foundation** or **OLF**.

Please help us continue to help those in need of vision assistance. This year we have helped an individual obtain some special contacts to permit her to see, have helped with cataract surgeries and contributed to the purchase of an eVision device for a young lady. We contributed \$3,000 towards the \$6,450 total cost of the device. Our maximum grants are \$3,000.

HELEN KELLER SIGHT SAVER AWARD

In 1925, when Lions International was only seven years old, the legendary Helen Keller spoke to Lions members at their annual convention and challenged them to become **“Will you not constitute yourselves Knights of the Blind in this crusade against darkness”**

Quote from Helen Keller in that address: “Will you not help me hasten the day when there shall be no preventable blindness; no little deaf, blind child untaught;” set the Lions’ course. Since this pivotal moment in 1925, the Lions have founded eye banks around the globe and, millions of Lions members worldwide have devoted their service careers to **“hasten the day”** by helping people with visual impairments.

As a tribute to this inspirational woman, The Central Ohio Lions Eye Bank has created the Helen Keller Sight Saver Award. The award is an excellent way to honor an exceptional Lion, Lioness, non-Lion individual, business or organization. Recipients are typically persons or groups who have distinguished themselves on behalf of sight and who see and care for the needs of those less fortunate than themselves.

A \$1,000 donation to the Central Ohio Lions Eye Bank allows the donor to present a Helen Keller Sight Saver Award. The award recipient receives a beautiful plaque and pin. The recipient’s name is put up on the Helen Keller award board at the Central Ohio Lions Eye Bank. Both the donor and the recipient have the satisfaction of supporting worthwhile Lions projects. Donations can be in the form of a one-time payment or cumulative donations over four years to equal \$1,000.

The Central Ohio Lions Eye Bank was founded in 1973 on the campus of The Ohio State University, thanks to the support of the Ohio Lions clubs. In December of 2005 we moved to our current location at The Eye Center of Columbus. The Central Ohio Lions Eye Bank operates a laboratory accredited by the Eye Bank Association of America for performing comprehensive eye banking service, from donor recovery to microscopic evaluation, donor eligibility determination, storage, and distribution of surgical eye tissues. The Central Ohio Lions Eye Bank with the help of our healthcare community, has been able to provide over 18,000 corneas for transplantation since its founding in 1973. Our goal of advancing eye care through research and medical education is also accomplished with eye research projects and through residency training for physicians who will become eye care specialists. The Eye Bank provides corneas to patients in need, regardless of financial circumstances, insurance status, race sex, country of origin or other demographics

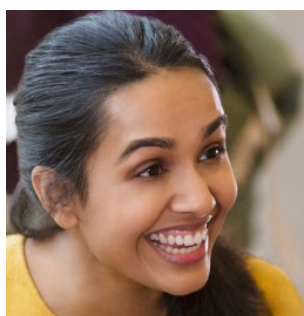

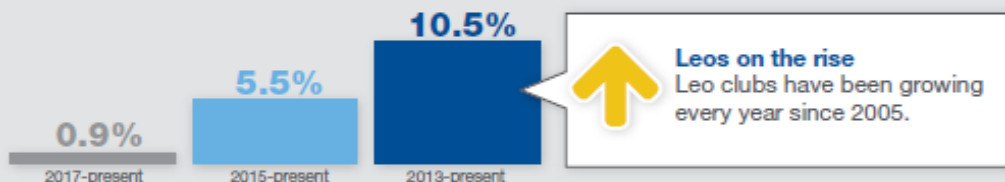
