From 2nd VDG Mike Kerek:

Greetings, fellow OH5 Lions.

It feels odd greeting you as 2VDG again, but when DG Joe asked me, and knowing that there was no one stepping up, I had no solid reason to say “No.” Fortunately the 2VDG position isn’t as demanding as what is coming over the next couple of years, so I’ve been able to dovetail with other obligations this year.

That being said, we are in dire need of others to step into district positions for the next couple of years. I’ve heard the many reasons cited for others not making the commitment: still working, (I work a full-time job as well,) other organization obligations, (I’m active in my church and other volunteer opportunities,) family obligations, (while I’m not raising children, I know of a number of DGs who have managed to balance family with that position, to say nothing of zone chairs and committee chairs, and those are with smaller children,) and family member caregiver. (That one you got me on.)

If your reticence is cost related, both in terms of money and time, I can and will respond. Depending on the position, the personal expenses on both do increase. That’s true. But I can tell you from personal experience that I have recouped those expenses through intangibles many times over: in friendships, networking, experiences, knowledge, development of my own skills, and personal satisfaction of making a difference on a larger stage. Bottom line, you get what you pay for. I’ve received a bargain!

Even those costs are not all that extreme. A zone chair organizes and runs 3 zone meetings a year, attends 3 cabinet meetings a year, the district convention, and visits his or her clubs at least once during the year. A committee chair, depending on the committee, has a comparable amount of meetings. Obviously the time commitment and monetary expenses do increase if you move into the VDG positions, heading toward becoming the District Governor; but the intrinsic rewards increase as well. In my 22 years as a Lion I have met hundreds of PDGs, and very few didn’t view it as the highlight of their Lions experience.

Afraid of not knowing the position? Training is available and offered, both organized and planned training sessions and a multitude of people who have “been there done that” who are happy to help you succeed – because if you succeed, we all benefit.

To be a zone chair, you need to either have served as club president or club secretary at least one year. (Though that can be waived if you are gung-ho and talk with the incoming DG!) To be a committee chair, it helps to have some working knowledge of the committee’s emphasis. To be a 2nd Vice District Governor, the first position on the trail to District Governor, you need to have served as a club president and either as a zone chair or CST (Cabinet Secretary, Cabinet Treasurer, or Cabinet Secretary/Treasurer.)

If you even think you might be interested in a new challenge, contact 1VDG Debbie Luttrell or myself. We’d be happy to sit down and chat with you. If you know someone who you think would be good, feel free to rat them out! To be a strong district, we need strong leadership...that starts, and ends, with the Lions of OH5.

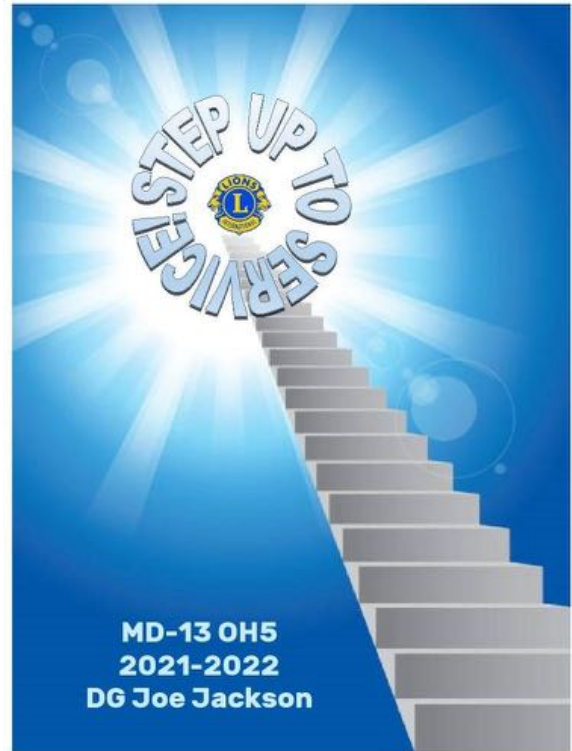

Roley High Reunion To Feature Rock N. Roley



Description of the event:

Roley City High School Class of 1954 celebrates its fifth reunion this month with a weekend of activities highlighted by a rock & roll concert featuring the class' most illustrious graduate, Rock N. Roley. The two-and-a-half-hour performance will begin at 3:00 p.m., Saturday, August 15, and is expected to fill the Roley City Municipal Auditorium. "Rock has fond memories of Roley High," said the star's business manager, Joseph K. Awledge, "and he's looking forward to seeing many of his old friends again." While the Class of '54 has much to celebrate, it will not eagerly recall the outcome of the 1954 Homecoming game. The Big Game with rival Lowe Valley was lost by the Roley Rollers 24 - 21, the first ever loss to the Lowe Riders. Homecoming was also marred by the tragic death of Becky Sue Lamour, a student at Roley High who was killed near midnight after the Homecoming dance, when the car in which she was a passenger stalled on the railroad tracks at Back Road Crossing and was struck by a freight train. The driver, Rock N. Roley, escaped without injury. Reunion activities will commence at 9:00 a.m. Saturday with a tour of the new gymnasium, after which Principal R. Anton Ravon will make his remarks.

URGENTLY NEEDED! Volunteers for the Mid-Ohio Food Collective

Mid-Ohio Food Collective (MOFC) and its peers continue to feel the squeeze of the pandemic on volunteer operations. The work of volunteers is critical to our daily operations. In these unsettling times, it is imperative that we are able to meet the increase demand from our struggling neighbors have access to nutritious foods.

- In 2019, MOFC had over 13,500 volunteers who donated more than 77,000 hours;
- In 2020, these numbers dropped to 4,500 volunteers donating 38,700-plus hours;
- Through 2021, we began to recover, with 7,300 volunteers donating 55,000 total hours.

January and February traditionally are the two toughest months of the year for volunteer recruitment as individuals, families and companies are coming off the holidays and settling back into school and work routines.

The COVID-19 surge has added to our struggle to support our daily operations as volunteer numbers continue to drop for January and February 2022.

In 2020, MOFC had 2,300 volunteers help in January and February for a total of 12,770 hours. Currently only 530 volunteers have signed up to assist this January and February – a projection of 3,700 hours, **a 71% drop**.

We are calling to action our community to aid us in our continued fight to feed our struggling neighbors. To provide peace of mind that our volunteers feel safe during their shifts, MOFC has taken the following precautions to ensure a safe working environment:

As of January 1st, 2022, we are asking that **all volunteers be vaccinated against COVID-19**.

Additional safety measures we ask of you:

- We require all staff and visitors to our building to wear a mask.
- We are asking volunteers to reschedule their shifts if they are experiencing symptoms, or if they have a confirmed case of Covid-19 in their household.
- We ask that you practice social distancing when possible.
- We ask that you use our hand sanitizing stations often, and wear aprons and gloves when required.

This year marks 70 years since formation of the initial Ohio Lions Eye Research Committee and 65 years since obtaining 501(c)(3) tax-exempt status. The Ohio Lions Eye Research Foundation (OLERF) is committed to finding treatments and cures for blinding retinal diseases. With your continued support, we have been able to develop new breakthroughs and fund groundbreaking research that provides hope to those living with blinding retinal diseases through our grants and fellowships. However, there is still much more work to be done in the fight against blindness, and we cannot do it without you. Now is the time to renew/continue your dedication to ending blindness and vision loss here and around the world.

You can help OLERF find treatments and cures by continuing your commitment as a supporter to those affected by retinal diseases. Just look at what we have been able to accomplish together however, there is still more work to be done and we will not stop until we have eradicated blinding retinal diseases and restored vision across the world.

RESEARCHER KATELYN SWINDLE-REILLY, PHD.

In 2017, Katelyn Swindle-Reilly, PhD, Assistant Professor of Biomedical Engineering and Chemical & Biomolecular Engineering at The Ohio State University, was awarded with the inaugural Ohio Lions Eye Research Foundation Lois Hagelberger-Huebner Young Investigator Award. Dr. Swindle-Reilly conducts innovative research on using polymeric biomaterials for drug delivery and medical devices, focusing on ophthalmic applications. Funding from OLERF has helped her, along with Matthew Ohr, MD, Retina Director at Ohio State, develop several drug delivery systems for age-related macular degeneration (AMD).

Her research has led to several new drug delivery systems to deliver anti-VEGF long-term with potential to reduce intravitreal injection frequency for patients. This includes nanoparticles, microparticles, and a bi-layered capsule system. This work has been published in top scientific journals and has resulted in 7 patent applications. In 2020, several of these ocular drug delivery technologies were licensed by Columbus-based startup company Vitranu. Drs. Swindle-Reilly and Ohr and working with the company as Chief Technology Officer and Chief Medical Officer, respectively, to help bring these new treatments to the clinic.

The only way to currently prevent permanent blindness from AMD is to receive an intravitreal injection directly into the eye on a monthly basis for the rest of the patient's life or surgically implant a refillable port delivery system. Her technology with the highest potential to impact patient outcomes is a tunable, injectable, biodegradable sustained-delivery implant system that allows for sustained release treatment for wet AMD. Preliminary studies indicate duration of action of the implant system can be tuned to cover 6 months to over a full year of treatment, and additional biologic or pharmaceutical agents which require different release kinetics may also be used in this drug delivery system.

Does Your Club Sponsor a Boy Scout Troop?

Most clubs that are sponsors for a BSA troop have been receiving paperwork giving them the option to "opt-out" of the litigation in the BSA bankruptcy case (Boy Scouts of America & Delaware BSA, LLC No. #20-10343). We want to make clubs aware of the following recommendations from Lions Clubs International.

PER LCI:

"We recommend Lions clubs not opt-out of the action at this time. However, local counsel can be sought if a club has been named in a claim and has concerns about their position as it relates to bankruptcy.

With respect to incorporation, we certainly recommend all clubs incorporate, as it provides additional benefit to the officers and members of the club. However, this is not a requirement.

As usual, if any Lions clubs are served with documentation regarding litigation, please have them contact the Legal Division at legal@lionsclubs.org and we will coordinate with our insurance provider and outside counsel to ensure appropriate support is provided."
