Sensory Garden: The Design

The design was completed. It will be located to the right of the (at that time) entrance of the school. It would be designed in three circles with the kiosk in the center. The kiosk had colorful banners on a pole about eight feet above the kiosk and could be seen from several feet away.

Pavers and bricks surrounded the kiosk. The outer circle had the taller plants which gave peace and serenity to the garden. First row of bricks were laid followed by a circle of plants not as high as the outer area, another row of brick with more plantings. There were rows of brick linking each circle of plants. You could enjoy the garden without leaving it. Also had benches strategically placed so one could sit and enjoy. Chimes were hung in the trees to give a melodic sound to the garden.

The students and staff enjoyed this relaxing area of smell (several plants had a fragrance, sound (the chimes) and feel ([plants that had a texture). A breakaway from the everyday life of school.

Also need to mention, several rows of bricks and pavers were purchased in memory of or in honor of a Lion. Individual Lion's clubs and Districts also purchased rows of brick and pavers.

HELEN KELLER SIGHT SAVER AWARD

In 1925, when Lions International was only seven years old, the legendary Helen Keller spoke to Lions members at their annual convention and challenged them to become "Will you not constitute yourselves Knights of the Blind in this crusade against darkness"

Quote from Helen Keller in that address: "Will you not help me hasten the day when there shall be no preventable blindness; no little deaf, blind child untaught," set the Lions' course. Since this pivotal moment in 1925, the Lions have founded eye banks around the globe and, millions of Lions members worldwide have devoted their service careers to "hasten the day" by helping people with visual impairments.

As a tribute to this inspirational woman, The Central Ohio Lions Eye Bank has created the Helen Keller Sight Saver Award. The award is an excellent way to honor an exceptional Lion, Lioness, non-Lion individual, business or organization. Recipients are typically persons or groups who have distinguished themselves on behalf of sight and who see and care for the needs of those less fortunate than themselves.

A \$1,000 donation to the Central Ohio Lions Eye Bank allows the donor to present a Helen Keller Sight Saver Award. The award recipient receives a beautiful plaque and pin. The recipient's name is put up on the Helen Keller award board at the Central Ohio Lions Eye Bank. Both the donor and the recipient have the satisfaction of supporting worthwhile Lions projects. Donations can be in the form of a one-time payment or cumulative donations over four years to equal \$1,000.

The Central Ohio Lions Eye Bank was founded in 1973 on the campus of The Ohio State University, thanks to the support of the Ohio Lions clubs. In December of 2005 we moved to our current location at The Eye Center of Columbus. The Central Ohio Lions Eye Bank operates a laboratory accredited by the Eye Bank Association of America for performing comprehensive eye banking service, from donor recovery to microscopic evaluation, donor eligibility determination, storage, and distribution of surgical eye tissues. The Central Ohio Lions Eye Bank with the help of our healthcare community, has been able to provide over 18,000 comeas for transplantation since its founding in 1973. Our goal of advancing eye care through research and medical education is also accomplished with eye research projects and through residency training for physicians who will become eye care specialists. The Eye Bank provides comeas to patients in need, regardless of financial circumstances, insurance status, race sex, country of origin or other demographics

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The Unspoken "S" Word

This unspoken "S" word is SUICIDE. People hear about it but never talk about it. One talks about losing a loved one to cancer, heart attack, accident to name a few but very few talk about losing someone to suicide. The stigma associated with suicide is real. You don't want people to know how your loved one really died. One may ask what could I have done to prevent this – Don't you ask the same question when someone dies from other maladies?

How do I know the above is true, I lost my sister to suicide several years ago. She had been seriously ill for a time and I let people presume she lost her life to her illness. I have since become a QPR instructor "Question Persuade Refer". Please read the following about QPR and the relationship to CPR. Be informed – the next life you save could be a loved one.

The "Official" presentation takes approximately 90 minutes but would like to visit your club to do a brief presentation (your normal time for a speaker) and answer any questions you may have. Death by suicide is constantly rising. The latest statistics show that 10 people out of 100,000 lose their life to suicide that is one person approximately every 10 minutes.

What is **QPR**

QPR stands for Question, Persuade – the 3 simple steps anyone can learn to help save a life from suicide.

Much of the world is familiar with CPR – short for cardiopulmonary resuscitation – an emergency medical intervention. The process is designed to stabilize people who are not breathing or breathing intermittently until a person can reach a hospital or other care. Similarly, QPR is an emergency mental health intervention for suicidal persons. The intent is also to identify and interrupt the crisis and direct that person to the proper care.

Both CPR and QPR are part of systems designed to increase the chance of survival in the event of a crisis.

In the Chain of Survival model of emergency cardiac care, the likelihood that a victim will survive a cardiac arrest increases when each of the following four links is connected:

- 1. Early recognition and early access
- 2. Early CPR
- 3. External Defibrillator

4. Early Advanced Life Support

Similarly, with QPR, the following Chain of Survival elements must also be in place:

- 1. Early Recognition of Suicide The sooner warning signs are detected and help sought, the better the outcome of a suicidal crisis will be.
- 2. Early QPR Asking someone about the presence of suicidal thoughts and feelings opens up a conversation that may lead to a referral for help.
- **3. Early Intervention and Referral –** Referral to local resources or calling 1-800-Suicide for evaluation and possible referral is critical.
- 4. Early Advanced Life Support As with any illness, early detection and treatment results in better outcomes.

In CPR the general public is educated about the classic signs of a heart attack: pressure, fullness, squeezing and pain in the center of the chest, sweating and other symptoms and then taught how to respond. In QPR the general public is educated about the known warning signs of a suicide crisis: expressions of hopelessness, depression, giving away prized possessions, talking of suicide, securing lethal means and then taught how to respond.

Spotlight on Service

(Excerpt from the Columbus Dispatch, February 29, 2020) Powell resident Nikki Friermood is among the army of Lions Club volunteers worldwide who collect eyeglasses for the needy.

Having worn eyeglasses most of her life, Nikki Friermood, a first-grade teacher, knows the importance of clear vision. And she's seen how those less fortunate sometimes have to squint.

The single mother of two daughters — Chloe, 9, and Sophia, 6 — wanted to teach them, in a direct way, about empathy and caring for others.

So when she learned about the Lions Club mission of donating glasses to the needy, she jumped at the chance to pitch in. She is now among the army of volunteers with Lions Club, the world's largest service organization whose main mission is providing eyeglasses for those who can't afford, or lack access to, optometrists.

And in just six weeks, the living room of her Powell home is now full of donated spectacles and she has two kids who are proud of their efforts.





"Learning empathy and sympathy, especially at a young age is important," said Friermood. "I think they see firsthand the impact of helping others."

Friermood and her daughters have placed collection boxes around town and at Wyandot Run Elementary, where she teaches first grade and where her kids are enrolled.

The glasses will be given to Bob Dotson, treasurer and past president of the 13-member Olentangy Lions Club. Three times a year, he'll deliver his haul to student volunteers at the Ohio State University College of Optometry who measure the glasses' optical strength. They, in turn, travel to foreign countries to distribute them.

Dotson praised the Friermoods' frontline efforts.

"They throw their weight behind doing the volunteer work ... it's the good feeling you get by helping your neighbor and the needy," he said.

Friermood said "the magic that can be done with these glasses, to help other people, is incredible."

Lions Serve MORE Through Joint Efforts

The OSU Campus Club Lions wanted to teach up-and-coming optometry students how to



sort and catalog the glasses that are used for the SVOSH mission trips. But the SVOSH students had already sorted all the glasses they were holding. So the OSU Campus Club reached out to the Tri-Village Lions and the Worthington Noon Lions who were both holding LOTS of glasses that hadn't been delivered to SVOSH yet. During the February 27th meeting of the Tri-Village Lions, members finished the task of sorting out the glasses from the cases and counting up, and then sent more than 1500 pair of glasses (750 from WNL, 770 from TVL) home with the speakers from SVOSH who were there that night. We serve MORE when we work together.






