#### **Monthly Membership Reporting**

The Club Monthly Membership Report (MMR) is one of the most important documents used in the management of clubs. It lets LCI know the current membership of your club for reporting and billing purposes. It is very important document for the District Governor to gauge the how well the club is doing. The lack of an MM Report over a period of time could mean the club is in trouble and needs help.

#### **Service Activity Reporting**

"We Serve" is our motto. It is not only what we do, it is who we are and it is the reason our Association has been so successful all these years. Why is it important to report service activities? What does LCI do with this information? As members of the world's largest service club organization, Lions are in a unique position to improve their local communities while simultaneously contributing towards global challenges, such as protecting the environment and providing learning opportunities for youth. The data is also used to demonstrate Lions' commitment and contribution to the global sustainable development agenda to partner organizations, such as the United Nations and World Health Organization. Lions Clubs and members who participate are recognized.

## Northwest Lions Foundation Lyndone. Harrima by 2<sup>nd</sup> VDG-19E

On September 9<sup>th</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup>, 2016, I had the incredible opportunity to visit the Northwest Lions Foundation Board Sight Life Office in Seattle, Washington. As a newly elected officer of District- E, I was invited to attend a reception, tour of the facilities, and participate the following day in the Board of Trustees of the Northwest Lions Foundation meeting.

The idea behind the invitation is to acquaint newly elected officers with the mission and work that the NLF provides to members and our communities. Further it was an opportunity to showcase the incredible facilities and staff that operate the Foundation Office and the SightLlife eye bank.

The eye bank is literally filled with up-to-date equipment, some not even available to general medical professionals. Much of what I saw was experimental, with cutting edge practices and equipment dealing with eyes and vision. Millions of dollars in optical machinery await the arrival of donated eyes. This equipment has the ability to test the eyes, alter their defects, and produce near perfect specimens for transplantation.

While the equipment is phenomenal, even more so are the dedicated staff members who tirelessly train, honing their skills, enabling them to interact with the families who have just experienced a crushing loss. Then there are the staff members who deal with the harvesting of the organs, their careful packaging and speedy delivery back to the NWL SightLife eye bank, then sent on to their final destination.

The following day attending the Board Meeting was once again an eye opening experience. It was amazing the amount of business they managed to cram into just a few hours. It truly shows how much dedicated and knowledgeable volunteers can accomplish when pursuing clear goals, ie. the smooth well-coordinated operation and expansion of the NWL SightLife eye bank.

In my mind the most telling presentation dealt with the monies donated through White Cane Days. This money is used in totality to better the operation of and the expansion of the NWL SightLife eye bank. Most troubling was the information that many Lions Clubs in MD 19 do not operate a White Cane Days and do not donate to this critical program. Every club should send a representative to observe the tremendous amount of good done by the NWL SightLife eye bank, and every club should consider adding or increasing the amount of money donated to the eye bank, after all its what Lions are all about.

I would like to thank Bill Lundin, Chairman of the Board of Trustees, Sandy Jeghers, Senior Advisor, the other members of the Board of Trustees, as well as the staff of the NWL SightLife eye bank for a most enjoyable and informative visit.
