Retention is difficult; there are so many scenarios to consider. We need younger members that have the energy to do club projects, and become club leaders, yet we still need the older members that are able to help with projects that does not require a lot of physical strength and share their knowledge of what being a Lion means.

If you happen to meet an older member when you are out and about greet them, and let them know they are missed and invite them to attend your next meeting, even if it is just for a visit. They may say they are to busy with other things now and don't have time for Lions. This did happen in my club and the dropped Lion came to one of our events and paid his dues for another year and said he would attend one of our dinner meetings before he leaves for the winter.

CARE

CARE has developed a program framework for Girls with Opportunities initiative, which intends to reach 100,000 girls nationwide over a 10-year period. The proposed project is part of a broader program framework, and achievement targets have been established to contribute to this broader goal. As part of this broader initiative, CARE seeks funding for the two-year Girls with Opportunities pilot project, which will target 4,569 girls at 19 schools in the departments of Huancavelica and Ica in southern Peru. The focus of this project is to empower adolescent girls from rural and marginalized urban areas with better quality education and opportunities to learn important social skills.

As you know MD19 is Partnering on this project for 2017 & 2018. The 19 E goal last year was \$4005 the district raised \$3872, we were so close! 39 clubs did not make a contribution to CARE. Going forward please consider making CARE part of your 2017/2018 budget.

LCIF

Grants

Quite often when we think about LCIF we think about disaster relief for flooding, earthquakes hurricanes and more. While we are faced with many of these disasters annually and many in recent time LCIF does so much more. Since LCIF was started in 1968 there have been 13,509 Grants totaling \$1,029,435,535.32 through September 1, 2017.

Where do we spend the money other than disasters? There are 4 areas in which we give grants to, they are, Sight, Youth, Disaster relief and Humanitarian needs. In this month's article I want to talk about youth and the Quest Program.

Quest: More than 15 million youth have been taught positive life skills through Lions Quest, our most comprehensive program for youth. Lions Quest unites the home, school and community to cultivate capable and healthy young people through positive youth development programs. More than 600,000 educators have been trained to implement the programs, which supports character development, social and emotional learning, civic values, violence and substance abuse prevention and service learning.

Lions work with the schools to implement the program from kindergarten through 12th grade, and often partner on community service learning projects. Lions Quest is present in nearly 100 countries and program materials have been translated into 40 languages. This positive youth development program is having a huge global impact.
