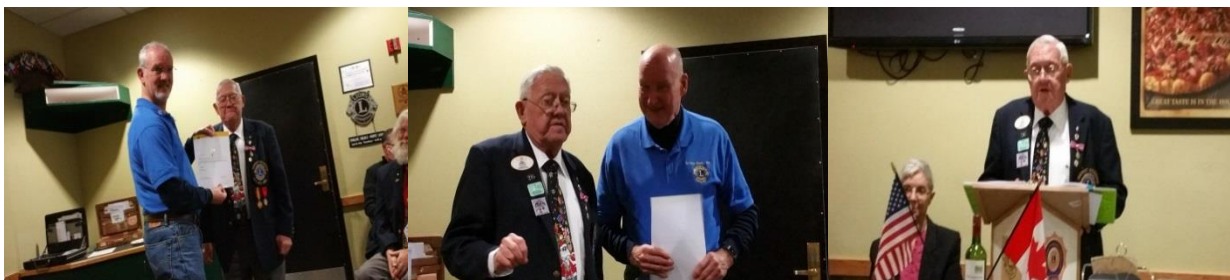

This month's article will focus on tips and information that will hopefully help not only those with diabetes and prediabetes, but for those who have friends and family who live with the effects of diabetes and prediabetes. The Joslin Diabetes Center has the following suggestions for annual goals:

- See your doctor 2 to 4 times a year
- Follow your schedule for checking blood glucose levels
- Follow exact instructions for every diabetes medications you take
- Know and keep these numbers in check: A1C, blood pressure and cholesterol
- Get a renal function test and microalbumin test each year
- Get moving. Any form of physical activity is a step in the right direction
- Create a well-balanced meal plan with your diabetes educator
- Have a yearly eye exam
- See your dentist twice a year
- Get a flu shot in the fall
- Always be prepared for a low or high blood glucose reaction - know the warning signs

Further, the Joslin Center has the following daily goals:

- Check blood glucose X times a day (depending on what your physician suggests)
- Take all diabetes-related medications
- Examine your feet for cuts and sores
- Bathe with mild soap and lukewarm water
- Brush and floss your teeth

Tyler Stevenson of [www.diabeteshealth.com](http://www.diabeteshealth.com) has the following suggestions for New Year's resolutions and diabetes:

- Find a new snack that's low in carbohydrates and calories
- Do more cardiovascular exercise
- Make a schedule
- Learn to cook at least one diabetes-friendly meal
- Search out one new tip or fact about diabetes every week
- Keep your A1C between 6% and 8%

## **Lions Club International Foundation LCIF**

One child loses ability to see every minute, that is half a million children a year that lose their sight. In an effort to prevent this unnecessary suffering LCIF and the World Health Organization (WHO) launched the first ever initiative to combat child hood blindness in 2001.

Since that time 45 needs based pediatric Lions eye care centers in countries around the globe have been established or strengthened. These centers are aimed especially at delivering preventive, therapeutic and rehabilitative eye care services for 140 million children.

LCIF has given SightFirst grants totaling nearly \$7 million, divided among six WHO regions where the eye centers are located. During evaluations each region showed that they were significantly closer to achieving the goal of fighting avoidable childhood blindness. Due to this success, a second phase of the project will provide additional support to 10 of the centers and establish 16 new centers.

### ALMIRA LIONS CLUB RECEIVES INSPIRATIONAL AWARD

Almira-Harry Lippincott, Lions District Governor for 19E, recently presented the Almira Lions Club the “Multiple District 19 Club Inspirational Award”. This award is given to the Lions Club that has accomplished the greatest service to its community, state, province or nation.

The club received this award for their project called “Potty in the Park”. The Almira Lions Club Memorial Park land was donated to the club by the Carstensen family more than 50 years ago. The park is in constant use for all types of sports activities, family and community gatherings, paper recycling and the community Christmas board. As one can imagine bathrooms were sorely needed. The club’s initial plans were to construct a new bathroom facility directly on the park grounds. After the reality of costs and logistics the club redirected its focus on renovating the current public bathrooms located across the street that are attached to the town hall.

To help with the project the club sent out letters for donations and pledges. During the past three years the club raised \$20,000.00. They felt these funds were adequate to complete the project but they wanted the facility to be great. So they applied for a Lincoln County Economic Development Grant, where they asked for and received \$15,000.00. With the funds, there are automatic low water use toilets, automatic sinks, air hand dryers, occupancy sensor lighting, exterior signage, interior and exterior LED lighting. Additionally, the facility will utilize as many low or no VOC materials as possible. The club plans to assist with future maintenance by selling engraved bricks.

## Bits & Bytes: Technology Tips by Lion Tammy Avoid Phishing Scams.

Phishing scams are designed to trick you into sharing valuable personal information, such as account numbers, Social Security numbers, birthdates, login IDs, and passwords, with which to steal your identity, money, or both. A phishing scam can be in the form of an email, website, phone call, or text. Oftentimes, cybercriminals will ask you to download and complete something that contains malicious software. Ransomware is a particular nasty form of malicious software, and can lock you out of important files and pictures on your computer that may never be recovered. Phishing scams will often make it seem as if they need additional information, something bad might happen, and/or someone might be mad or get into trouble if the information is not sent. Scammers will lure you into a false sense of security by spoofing familiar logos and websites of trusted, legitimate companies.
