District 19E February Newsletter Submitted by Frank Bega 2nd Vice District Governor

We are fortunate to be accepted as Lions, but as Lions we also have a responsibility to make our presence felt throughout all of the communities in our District. The following is a brief summary of what is expected of us as Lions.

Lions Club International By-Laws, Article 8, Section 3 REDISTRICTING

Redistricting proposals shall be considered by the International Board of Directors provided that each proposed sub-district shall contain at least thirty-five (35) Lions Clubs with a total membership of no less than one thousand two hundred fifty (1,250) members in good standing...

In the event the International Board of Directors approves such a redistricting proposal, it shall become effective at the close of the annual International Convention which next follows the date of such Board approval.

- 1. REDISTRICTING OF DISTRICTS: Districts (single, sub- or multiple districts) seeking to redistrict must submit the following:
- a. A list of clubs that would comprise each proposed sub-district containing each club's total membership. Each proposed sub-district must have the minimum of 35 clubs with 1250 members in good standing 60 days prior to the board meeting for which it is considered and sustain membership strength through the time that the redistricting takes place.
- b. A Map clearly defining the proposed boundary lines or changes in boundary lines for each district. The proposed districts should be established in a way that allows for efficient district management and minimal travel and administrative costs.
- c. Payment of US\$500 as a redistricting fee for each new district, sub-district, or multiple district proposal.

As District E, we owe it to ourselves and our communities to ensure that we maintain our membership levels above 1250, and our chartered clubs above 35. Therefore, Retention, Bringing New Members, and expanding our club numbers are critical to the vitality of our District. Let's get busy fellow Lions; Let's keep District 19E EXCELLENT.

CARE

CARE has developed a program framework for Girls with Opportunities initiative, which intends to reach 100,000 girls nationwide over a 10-year period. The proposed project is part of a broader program framework, and achievement targets have been established to contribute to this broader goal. As part of this broader initiative, CARE seeks funding for the two-year Girls with Opportunities pilot project, which will target 4,569 girls at 19 schools in the departments of Huancavelica and Ica in southern Peru. The focus of this project is to empower adolescent girls from rural and marginalized urban areas with better quality education and opportunities to learn important social skills.

As District Governor Harry visits clubs he is asking for members to make individual donations to CARE. Please help insure that all members know this and come prepared to help support CARE.

Through the end of December our district has donations of \$1745.00 from only 9 clubs. I encourage all clubs to donate to CARE as this is a MD19 program we should all support.

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IMPROVING RETENTION

19E Retention Chairperson Lion Marge Bega

There is no question that retention is a serious problem. The membership charts clearly show the drops exceeding the adds each year in the USA and Canada. Does everyone know the No. 1 reason we have drops? It amazes me that we still have Lions starting from scratch to determine this—as if they can't believe the information that LCI has put out. I still see new retention chairs trying to get information from dropped members in their districts and multiples to try to find the reasons people left the club.

We know the No. 1 reason: it is ineffective club meetings! And LCI has already developed materials addressing each one of these issues. We need interesting and productive meetings. We need meetings to be worthwhile. We need to plan and run effective meetings. Officers need to focus on meetings. We need to avoid cliques and politics. We need to keep members involved.

So what is something we can do to focus on having better meetings? What tool can we do to turn things around? How many clubs elect a new president for the year and that new president doesn't have any idea what to do to get his/her club clicking on all cylinders? Here is an answer: it is called the Lions Club Retention Index or LCRI.

No Love for Diabetes

In observation Valentine's Day the focus of this month's Diabetes Awareness newsbit focuses on what those that have loved ones with diabetes or prediabetes can do to make their lives just a bit better and easier.

- **Lend a pocket** Small acts of kindness count Consider carrying those emergency snacks or insulin in your pocket so that the diabetic doesn't have to lug them with them. People with diabetes are constantly lugging around supplies and provisions helping them carry the physical load goes a long way in aiding with the emotional one.
- Go back to biology class Make a point to educate yourself about diabetes. You don't have to be an expert, but knowing enough to know what it means to have a high or low blood sugar is important. Many people with diabetes will explain the biology of their condition to people close to them. They are the expert in talking about their own diabetes, and questions show them that the askers care
- Ask the right questions If someone hits a BG high or low, don't ask: 'What did you do?' or 'What did you eat?' When things are calm, do ask: 'What does it feel like to have a high (or low) blood sugar?' Do not ask if someone's blood sugar is high every time you think they're acting grumpy. If their mood is due to an off-target blood sugar reading, chances are pointing that out will only serve to make them even grumpier. Asking a person with diabetes about their blood sugar level is tricky territory, and should be done with sensitivity and caution. Every person with diabetes is different, so there is no one right way to handle it. In general, they want your support, but don't to be told what to do.
- Step into their shoes There are some very specific ways to exercise empathy towards those with diabetes. You may never know what it's like to experience a low blood sugar, but here is an example: think about how you'd feel if you skipped breakfast then ran a half marathon. You'd probably be seriously irritable until you got some calories in you, too. You may also try checking your blood sugar with a finger prick or inserting a Continuous Glucose Monitoring sensor into your belly.
- **Don't knee-jerk react** –It's vital to recognize why someone is acting a certain way because they feel ill, and emotionally feel like they've lost control. Chances are their unpleasantness is a result of extreme frustration with themselves, and with their disease that they cannot always control but it isn't directed at you. Let the highs and lows pass with patience.

Above all, I'd like to offer up a big Thank You to all of the partners of people with diabetes. Your patience, caring, and selflessness does not go unnoticed.
