One of the main goals of the Lions is to protect, enhance and maintain our environment. Every Lions club in our Multiple District can and should work towards benefiting our environment.

There are many ways each and every club can help keep our communities clean and environmentally friendly. One easy way is to become a host club for a stretch of highway or street in or near your community. Once each quarter, four times each year, our club picks up litter along a public right of way. The city provides safety signs, vests, gloves and trash bags to help accomplish this environmental clean-up. It's easy, fun and a good way to help foster comradery within our club. This can provide your club with the same gratification. Pictured below is the Post Falls Lions on their most recent street litter clean up.



Note that it is also an excellent opportunity to have Lions members' children participate in club activities. Another potential environmental opportunity would be to approach your local parks department and enquire about suppling, installing and maintaining recycling bins in your community parks. Often times these bins can be donated by soft drink companies and decorated with the Lions Logo. And a third opportunity would be to volunteer with the local garden society, forestry department, bureau of land or the department of agriculture, to hand out unused plants, shrubs or trees. The Post Falls Lions Club has participated in the tree give away for over the past fifteen years. It is a great experience giving plants to community members to enhance the environment on their own land. Membership update as reported to the 19E Spring Conference in Worley, Idaho.

We welcomed both, ID Thomas Gordon and his wife Lion Gillion from Newmarket, Ontario, Canada along with Council Chair Jon Whitman and his wife Lion Carol from our own MD919.

Started the year with 1377 members, 50 clubs, 6 of our zones represented with chairpersons and 4 without, The Spring Ahead Program encouraged by MD19 had 10 out of 49 clubs participating and brought in 20 members. We have 33 out of 49 clubs bringing in 125 new membership this year. To date we have 1337members and we hope to increase that by June 30.

We lost one of our oldest clubs this Lions year, Spokane Hillyard. Its membership fell to an aging out problem.

We started our effort to build our new Cheney Centennial Lions the first of July 2017. We then made plans to address the community in February 2018 as most of our time was tied up until after the first of the year. A community needs assessment was distributed to several business establishments. We decided to bring in Lion Ronnie Martin, a club building specialist from Texas. He spent 4 days with us canvassing and left leaving us a start of 3 members. We need 20 members to form a club. A hand full of us spent many more hours in the Cheney community, every week for seven weeks, before finally getting the magic number of 20. Medical Lake Lions will be the sponsoring club. They also agreed to a guiding lion. We will soon be adding 23 new members to our roles and 1 new club in zone E1 for the 2017-2018 year. (goal of 1 new club achieved)

Our gender distribution currently is 64.15% men and 35.85% women. Last year at this time it was 65.43% male and 34.57% female. (35% goal achieved)

33 clubs out of 49 have added 1 or more new members this year compared to 36 of 51 in April 2017. We have had many new baby boomers and retired military join this year.

We also set a goal of achieving better monthly reporting from clubs. This has been achieved with our average of 90.89% thru the first 3 quarters of this year. Overall average reporting is up 9.59% over last year. (Goal achieved).

At present we have almost one half of our clubs reporting their new officers for the 2018-2019 Lions year.

Congratulation District E. for your enthusiasm and the progress you have just achieved.

Remember membership gains happen when you model yourself to your communities, "Just Ask". Ask those that you think will become great representatives, be positive role models and keep your membership totally involved with community and organizational happenings.

What is a hashtag? A hashtag is a word or phrase preceded by a hash or pound sign (#) and are used on social media sites such as Facebook, Instagram, and Twitter to tag and search messages on a specific topic. When you add hashtags to a message, you are essentially joining a conversation.
