Remind them of how they felt the first time they helped someone or helped their community when it was needed. Yes, we need new members, but we also

need to retain the members we have... we need their knowledge and experience to continue helping when help is needed.

GLOBAL SERVICE TEAM

We Serve, But Do We Report It?

According to the MyLion metrics, District 19E clubs have reported a total of 206,914 people served by club activities. Our goal for the year is 500,000, so we are currently at 41% of that goal. I feel that we are on course to meet the goal. Even though we are nearly halfway through the Lion Year, some clubs have responded that their first service activities would be tied to the holidays. I am also confident that more clubs have been providing service, but have not yet reported it.

A recent review of MyLion shows that of the 47 clubs in District 19E, 28 are reporting their service activities in MyLion. That equates to 60% which is actually higher than I had expected based on the difficulty clubs have had in using the new program. Thank you to the Club Secretaries and Club Service Chairs that have been reporting.

For those clubs who have completed service projects, but have not been reporting them, again, I encourage you to the YouTube video that explains how to post past activities (https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=kP3498MrHxE). Realizing that secretaries have many recordkeeping tasks assigned to them, I am suggesting that clubs find a tech savvy member to serve as the Club Service Chair so that that person could be posting the service activities. I also encourage club secretaries to reach out to friends or relatives that may be able to assist them in learning the new MyLion program. I have been advised that our District Governor Frank Bega (frankbega@frontier.com) and our District Administration Assistant PDG Harry Lippincott (hlippin1@comcast.net) can also now assist clubs to report their service. Please, take them up on their offer to help!

In the November District Newsletter, I announced the launch of a service incentive program for the District. Each club that completes a service project for each global cause (Diabetes, Environment, Hunger, Vision and Pediatric Cancer) during this Lion-Year will have their club's name put on a ticket and placed into a drawing. At the end of the Lion year 2019-2020, three ticket(s) will be drawn and the clubs whose names were drawn will be reimbursed up to \$200 for money spent for their projects. Check the November newsletter for details (it is posted on the District 19E website (http://e-district.org/userfiles/112/file/Newsleters/2019-2020/19E-DG-2019-11.pdf).

At this time, one club, **North Pend Oreille Valley Lions Club**, has completed and reported projects for all five Global Causes. Three clubs (**Green Bluff, Hauser and Spokane Shadle North Lions Clubs**) have completed and reported projects for four of the five Global Causes. And four clubs (**Chewelah Valley, Lake Windermere, Medical Lake and Rathdrum Lions Clubs**) have completed and reported service projects for three of the five Global Causes. Keep up the good work!

CARE is working in Honduras. Today programs are structured around empowering vulnerable groups. Such as children, women, indigenous people and rural populations.

MD19 is funding the 2-year school gardens for Healthy Nutrition pilot project, which will target 40 communities in five municipalities in southern Honduras. The focus of this project is to create garden learning spaces at schools to improve agriculture and nutritional food knowledge, promoting conservation and preservation of natural resources.

To date our district has had only 7 clubs donate a total of \$1,305.00. We need to have all clubs donate to this MD 19 supported annual project. Please donate soon. Last fiscal year we had 100 % participation from all clubs.

Our involvement with CARE started with PDG Gordon F. Smith, MD19 Executive Secretary-Treasurer for over 25 years. Any club donating \$500.00 US or Canadian is then eligible to request a Gordon F. Smith CARE Fellowship. This can go to a Lion or non-Lion. Contact the MD19 office for more information.

Lions Club International Foundation

Our major Foundation LCIF does great work both at home and around the world. The Foundation was started in 1968 and a couple of years ago surpassed 1 billion dollars in grants. Currently we are in the middle of CAMPAIGN 100 in which we want to raise \$100 million in each of 3 years and provide service to 200 million individuals each of those three years.

To date giving for District E the Excellent district is \$1844.00 behind giving at this time last year. At this time the District has given \$14,378. Each of the last three years our giving has gone up. Only 14 clubs in the district have donated so far this year, last year we had 100% participation.

I know some clubs like to use your money for local charities and I applaud that. Melvin Jones our founder started Lions with the idea of supporting the local community. Since that time, we have grown and became an international organization. Many parts of the world do not have vision centers, local Dr. Offices, Cancer treatment facilities, food banks to help those in need. That is where some of our donations go. Recently I had a local Lion share about he and his wife helped feed fire fighters on the fire lines in Australia. Funds to provide the food was from LCIF. The U.S. and Canada are sending firefighting teams as there is a need. As District E we can help fund that need.

Asking all clubs, members to help fund LCIF by giving to our major Foundation. All you need to do is go to LCI webpage and select DONATE, follow the prompts after that.

New Year - New Ideas for Environmental Projects!

Small actions can add up to help others. I was wondering what to do with the Christmas cards that we received, so I went online and found a great way to recycle them. St. Jude's Ranch for Children (https://stjudesranch.org/recycled-card-program) has a program to find uses for all types of greeting cards.

They accept the fronts of your recycled cards (except for Hallmark, American Greetings and Disney which they are unable to accept due to copyright laws) which are used in their recycled card program in an effort to provide teens with life and work skills. This could be a simple club project!

Just cut the front of your greeting cards and send them to: St. Jude's Ranch for Children, 100 St. Jude's St., Boulder City, NV 89005.

They also accept new cards (any occasion) with or without the envelopes. Please do not send cards promoting other charitable organizations. If you have any questions about the program, please call 702-294-7100.

What are some Green Resolution that you can consider this year? Here are seven ways to reduce your impact on the Earth:

- **1.** Recycle. If you aren't in the habit— start today and encourage others to do the same. Recycling not only saves natural resources, but also saves energy!
- 2. Remember the other important "Rs"- Reduce and Reuse. Help to lessen the amount of waste by buying items that use little or no packaging, or "buying in bulk" which reduces unnecessary and excessive packaging; and, find ways to use items over and over again (e.g. refilling your empty water bottles).
- 3. Buy recycled-content products. Remember to "look for it, ask for it." Resolve to "buy green" by purchasing at least one recycled-content product on a regular basis, such as paper towels or computer paper, that is made with post consumer content.
- 4. Free your home from toxins. Don't flush paints, solvents or chemicals down the toilet. Toilet bowl deodorizers, cleaning solutions with lye and many spot removers contain harmful solvents. Baking soda and vinegar substitute as great all-purpose cleaners. A wide variety of non-toxic cleaners, such as Seventh Generation, can be found at stores like Whole Foods Market and Trader Joe's. Cut down on pesticides and fertilizers in your garden and limit what you wash into rivers, bays and oceans.
- 5. Spare the Air. Resolve to minimize using your car whenever possible. Use public transportation, carpool or bicycle once or twice a week for more exercise and cleaner air.
- 6. Learn to Compost. Convert yard clippings and vegetable peelings into nature's fertilizer. Your garden will love you for it. Many cities and counties offer composting workshops and free or discounted compost bins.
- 7. See the Great Outdoors. Whether city, county, regional or state/province visit parks. Park volunteer or docent opportunities and special programs geared to kids represent ways to contribute to your community and enjoy nature at the same time.


