GREATEST NEED BY IPDG LYNDON HARRIMAN


Whew! The holidays are over for another year. As we bask in the afterglow of the happy season and the memories of the people and the charities we helped this past year, we need to look ahead.

Today, right now clubs should be planning for the remainder of this Lions year. Service projects, fund raisers and activities should be at the top of our planning list, and we should be ready to act on these plans. We should be aware that February 13, 2020, is the deadline to apply for matching grants for three of our pillars of Lionism; Diabetes, childhood cancer and Hunger.

Speaking of hunger, food banks across our district are hurting. Food stocks are at an all-time low, and food donations are not on the forefront of clubs' minds. It should be. The need is greatest right now, and the public remembers how they donated turkeys, food and money for Thanksgiving and Christmas. It's not a priority at this time, but the need is at its highest.

What can we (Lions Clubs) do? Donate money to your local food bank. Money given can often be parleyed into three to four times what you or I could buy with the same amount of money. Another option is to plan and execute a food drive. Contact your local grocery stores and hold a food drive to collect both money and food during a weekend. Often a food bank can supply you with lists of items they are in desperate need of.

Whatever your club decides to do, during your planning for the remainder of the Lions Year, don't forget your local food bank. Your community depends on it!

What can your club do to when a member is considering quitting?

Sit down and talk one on one...

Here are some questions you might want to ask.

Did you feel you were not making a difference? Did you feel you did not belong? Were there too many conflicts among members? Did you not receive recognition for your achievements? Were the meetings boring?

I'm sure there are many more questions that will come to mind as you sit and talk. Talking one on one is just one way to bring out problems that need to be addressed. When you see their answers, it will show you where your club, as a whole, need to work and improve to retain members new and old.

ADMINISTRATION NOTES

As we go into February there are some important items club should be aware of.

<u>DUES</u>: Club Treasurers should have in hand dues billing statements from MD19. Dues are due and payable by February 28, 2020. If a Club Treasurer did not receive either an email or hard copy statement it is your responsibility to contact the MD Office.

"I think of dues paying to MD similar to what would happen if you worked for a Company that one day they just decided not to pay you. No explanation or other information. Think how that would affect your household. The MD and LCI are no different when dues are not payed forward."

Your club has likely already collected the funds, so there should not be a reason the dues cannot be paid by the deadline.

There are some clubs that have not paid their 1st half dues. You should know who you are. If there are questions you should review your accounts and if you are one of the club please pay those back dues immediately.

<u>NOMINATIONS & ELECTIONS</u>: LCI recommends Club Presidents form a nominating committee in February. The nominating committee then can present the list of candidates to club membership March. Elections of officers for the 2020-2021 year should held no later than April 15, 2020 and reported to LCI by April 30, 2020. This time frame allows for club contact information used by LCI, MD19 and District 19E to be readily available at the start of the new year. The contact information for Club President, Club Secretary and Club Treasurer is extremely beneficial to a District Governor when developing visitation schedule, to know who Club Secretary is to enable contact to provide important information regarding districts events and the Club Treasurer for LCI and MD19 for dues billing statements.

<u>TRAINING</u>: Club officers that will be new to the 2020-2021 need to be aware that at each 19E Spring Conference training seminars are offered for Club Presidents, club Secretaries, Club Treasurers and Club Membership Directors. This is done to provide information about the positions and to provide a platform to answer questions you may have about your position. New officers are encouraged to attend. Possibly your club has funds that can help with expenses.

Nothing I have presented above differs from information and requirements stated in the Club Constitution and By Laws that govern how every club functions for these matters.

With 5 months remaining in our fiscal year donations are basically even with same time last year. To date we have \$20,656 in donations which is \$224 behind last year. I know that clubs in district E can make up that difference. Here are a couple of ideas.

Camp STIX. Such a great camp for kids with diabetes. We will be celebrating our 20th year June 21-27, 2020. Camp's theme this year is: Class of 2020. Our district has been such a wonderful support of this amazing adventure for kids in many ways: clubs providing scholarships, volunteering, attending the Camp STIX auction and attending Lions Day at Camp STIX.

Camp STIX has expanded now: **We are now called: STIX Diabetes Programs**. We are a unique nonprofit organization which offers an unparalleled camp experience and community for children living with Type 1 Diabetes (T1D). STIX fosters the ability for these youth to build relationships and community, realizing they are not alone in living with T1D.

The reason for the change of name is that we now have 3 camps: **Camp STIX**, for kids 9-18; **Camp TWIGS**, a day camp for kids 6-9 and **Adventure Camp**, focusing on diabetic management and the unique challenges diabetics face during the transitional years from being a teenager to becoming an adult (ages 16-19). The 2019 Adventure Camp was hosted in West Glacier, Montana at Great Northern Resort 275 miles outside of Spokane for a 4 day weekend retreat.
