

WAYS TO CONDUCT MEETINGS DURING SOCIAL DISTANCING

Third International Vice President Patti Hill said during a COVID-19 webinar presented by LCI in March that Lions need to "calmly find our way forward without being part of the panic or anxiety."

During the "COVID-19: How Do We Serve? How Do We Meet? How Do We Engage New Leaders?" webinar hosted by PID Jerome Thompson, Global Action Team Leader for Constitutional Area 1, Lions discussed ways to serve and ways to meet while maintaining a social distance of at least 6 feet apart.

There are many free programs Lions can use to hold their meetings and hold their constitutionally required elections. These include:

Facebook Groups – most people these days have Facebook, either on their smartphones or computers. Set up a private Facebook group for your Lions club. You can make it by invite only so only the club members can see posts and comments. You can hold both meetings and elections in this manner.

Free Conference Call – offers video and teleconferencing through its free app. It is possible to do shared screens and record conference calls. To set up a conference call requires an account, but there are free accounts. You do not have to have an account to participate in a call, just the call-in number or URL and the meeting code. There is no limit on time or the number of participants on a call.

Google Hangouts – a free video conferencing and conference calling program for people with Google accounts. It allows group chats for up to 150 people and can be used via an app by smartphone or computer.

Microsoft Teams – available in Office 365, which is available for free to any Lion member in Iowa. It does have a limit of 15 people per meeting, but also has tools for file and screen sharing.

Zoom – has both free and paid plans. The basic (free) plan allows group calls of up to 100 participants with a 40-minute time limit per meeting. Paid accounts allow longer meetings and more features.

These are just a few options to use for conducting meetings during social distancing. If you need help, most of these have great you tube videos. I am familiar with both GoTo Meeting and Zoom. I can assist you with those.

DISTRICT GOVERNOR JOB DESCRIPTION IPDG Lyndon Harriman

Many Lions are hesitant to become District Governors due to the time required and the potential expenses and cost. I am attempting to address these concerns.

The duties and responsibilities of a District Governor.

Realize that to be a District Governor, you have to be ready for the job. This readiness naturally involves training and education to smooth the way for the duties of the position. Trainings and education are provided by the Multiple District and Lions Club International (LCI) in the form of online and in-person. In February, the 1st Vice District Governor will go to St. Charles, Illinois for three days of training. Travel expenses (including airline tickets) to and returning from, lodging and food are covered for training by LCI. Other educational opportunities are available online as power points followed by competency quizzes. Learning experiences are available over a two-year period, starting as a 2nd VDG and then 1st VDG.

Induction as District Governor will occur at the International Lions Convention. You will be expected to attend. Your travel and hotel expenses are covered by the International. Your personnel expenses, food, entertainment and souvenirs are your own responsibility. If your spouse wishes to attend the International will cover their hotel and \$500.00 US towards travel. This is a once in a lifetime experience and will create lasting memories of your achievement. The out of pocket costs are dependent upon you and your spending habits.

Once your term as DG begins, there are several duties you are required to fulfill. You must visit each club in your district **ONCE.** Our District E currently has forty- seven (47) clubs. Your travel to the club and your return home is reimbursed at 0.50 U.S. per mile. If you spend the night, your lodging is reimbursed at the rate of \$75 U.S. per night, food is up to 25.00 per day. **NOTE** many clubs if not all will pay for your dinner, and often you can stay at a Lion members house (cannot submit expenses to LCI) or the club will provide a room for you to stay in, cost to you then is little to nothing. Also realize many clubs will invite you back for a second or third visit to install officers, induct new members and present awards. Only one visit is required, the others are at your expense; however, you can now be reimbursed for visits that are deemed necessary for the health of clubs as long as the expenses do not exceed the annual established budget. Debt incurred by the DG is lessened by the club donations collected prior to the district convention.

As a District Governor you are required to participate in the leadership and direction of the Multiple District. This will require your attendance at the Council of Governors Quarterly (3) meetings. The COG meetings usually are an evening and the following day. Travel, hotel and food is reimbursed by LCI at the above-mentioned rates. Cost to you is once again minimal and dependent upon your typical spending habits.

The DG is also the leader of your district and as such you will appoint leaders to form your cabinet. The District Cabinet is also expected to meet quarterly 3 times per year. You choose the venue; food, location and attendance, so costs are low to minimal and reimbursement is at the usual rate. Cabinet positions typically are acknowledged by the DG with an award at the conclusion of the District Conference. The DG chooses the award and the cost up to \$30 per award is covered through the District Escrow Account. Typically, the DG also has a PIN that they have designed and will present to leaders in every club, every cabinet member and Lions of your choice. A usual order of 400 pins is paid for out of the District Escrow Account as well.

The most memorable event of your term of office as DG is the District Spring Conference. This conference is held at a location determined by you and the costs associated with it are covered by the admission cost paid by the participants. You will appoint a committee to make decisions on the venue, program agenda and activities available. Startup expenses are paid for out of the District Escrow Account as well. Out of pocket expenses to you again should be minimal.

DISTRICT GOVERNOR JOB DESCRIPTION (Cont.)

There are other duties of a DG that cost nothing, such as writing an article for the monthly District Newsletter. On occasion you will be asked to contribute to the Multiple District Newsletter MD 19. Your attendance at the MD 19 Convention is expected and reimbursed at the usual rate. This is usually held in conjunction with the fall COG meeting.

Once your term is finished, you will be expected to remain a member of the COG for an additional year. Expenses at that time will be reimbursed by MD19 at .30 a mile and \$40.00 per night for a hotel.

In closing, it is my experience that no DG should have to expend large amounts of money from their own pocket. The net cost to you personally is dependent on your personal spending and the generosity of funds collected from the district Lions and clubs and presented to you at the Spring Conference. This will also help to defray the total out of pocket expenses covered by you.

Requirements to become a District Governor:

- 1. Be a member in good standing.
- 2. Be a member of a Lions club in good standing.
- 3. Must have served as President of a Lions Club in good standing for a full term or major portion thereof, and a member of the Board of Directors of a Lions Club for no less than two (2) additional years
- 4. Have served as a zone chair for 1 year or major portion thereof.
- 5. USUALLY, not always a District Governor starts off as a 2nd VDG and then becomes a 1st VDG before assuming office as District Governor. These two years give you the opportunity to gradually become used to the duties and expectations of a DG. Realize the costs and time requirements of the 1st and 2nd DG are

TASK

- 1. Attend ZC training before or immediately after taking office.
- 2. LCI Club Officer Report Forms sent to MD 19 office (NEW OFFICERS)
- 3. Attend MD 19 Annual convention.
- 4. Attend District Spring Conference.
- 5. Attend District Cabinet Meetings.
- 6. Hold 3 Zone Meetings. *
- 7. Attend a club meeting prior to official District Governor visit.**
- 8. Accompany District Governor to Club Visitations to Formally Introduce DG.
- 9. Send out monthly newsletters to clubs, cc to DG, Council Chair, Vice Council Chair, and MD 19 office:
- 10. Make sure clubs submit monthly reports W/MMR's and SAR's
- 11. Keep in contact with your clubs; congratulate successes and offer help if needed.
- 12. Promote upcoming Trainings; ZC, Club Officer, Leadership, etc.
- 13. Check that clubs are current with dues, encourage those that aren't to pay their dues. First half dues paid by August 31st, and Second half dues paid by February 28th. Report clubs not in good financial standing to MD 19 office by June 30.
- 14. Send information to your successor (Officer Report forms and verification).
- 15. Alert MD 19 of your successor by June 30th.
- 16. Additional opportunities to serve your district: Read the district constitution and by-laws, the MD 19 constitution and by-laws; urge clubs to participate in contests and awards, review rules with each club and explore their strengths. Encourage inter club visitations.
 - *Report attendance, including club Presidents and Secretaries and alternates to leadership personnel. Additional Zone meeting can be held at the District Conference.
 - **Explain proper protocol and courtesies to extend to the DG. For example, no other business should be conducted, sitting for the DG and partner, ZC introduced by the Club President, and the ZC introduces the DG and partner.
