Making speeches should come naturally and easily to almost everyone. That's because everyone is an expert in something, has an expertise or an experience no one else does. GLOBAL SERVICE TEAM (GST) PDG Kim DiRienz 2019-2020 District Service Award Winners Announced

A review of metrics provided by MyLion for District 19E revealed that five clubs had completed service projects in each of the global causes (Hunger, Environment, Diabetes, Vision, and Childhood Cancer). Those clubs are: Castlegar-Selkirk, Green Bluff, Hauser, Nelson and North Pend Oreille Valley. It was discovered, unfortunately after the drawing was completed, that Chewelah Valley Lions Club should have qualified as well but had reported a project for Childhood Cancer incorrectly.

The three clubs selected in a random drawing were Castlegar-Selkirk, Hauser and Nelson Lions Clubs. All clubs have been notified and are now required to submit documentation in order to receive up to \$200 each to help defray some of the projects they had completed.

The Castlegar Selkirk Lions Club has chosen to use their \$200 prize to help with the costs of projects the club completed to combat hunger.



The Nelson Lions Club chose to submit their Adopt-a-Highway project for reimbursement. That service project was proposed by President Paul Bogaard, and after consultation with the Highways Ministry, a stretch of highway just outside of Nelson was selected. 2020 was the inaugural year and this project will be a Signature

Activity for the club in future years. The Club makes no money whatsoever from this effort and had voted to purchase safety vests in order to provide visibility for our members during litter pick-up. Their \$200 prize will help to defray that expense.

Off, Get Wet and Provide Service to the Environment

It looks like Summer is finally here and we can go outside to get some fresh air and sunshine. During the hot days, many Lions will be looking for a way to cool off. Here's an idea for a new club project that can do just that. Consider adopting a stream or waterway and conducting a cleanup project.

The following stream cleanup tips are taken from the Adopt-a-Stream Foundation (www.streamkeeper.org):

The Starting Point - A Little Research

Before jumping into a creek and removing all debris, litter, logs, and anything else that catches your eye, ask yourself if you are doing more harm than good. All stream clean-up activities should be planned and carried out to help you realize your goal of improving the environment.

Wholesale removal of all materials in the streambed can actually cause damage. Pools form behind logs and other large organic debris, providing shade and resting places for migrating fish and other creatures. Even human-made material embedded in a stream may be performing a valuable function. When you consider doing a stream cleanup, we recommend that you be very selective in the material you choose to remove. A simple rule of thumb: if the object is more than half buried and a great deal of sediment would be stirred up by its removal, leave it there.

Occasionally you may encounter some items that could pose potential health hazards. If you come across 55 gallon barrels containing unknown substances, transformers from telephone/utility poles (these contain PCB's), syringes, or any other suspicious items, DO NOT TOUCH THEM. Contact your local Health District Office or State Environmental Department for assistance.

Before You "Get Your Feet Wet"

The following are key tasks to be completed before the stream cleanup:

- 1. Obtain the property owner's permission to access your adopted stream.
- 2. Obtain a permit approval from your local Department of Fisheries and Wildlife if required.
- 3. Arrange for garbage cans and bins at the clean-up site. Also ask people to bring trucks and wheelbarrows to haul trash and debris.
- 4. Find temporary locations for storing collected debris near the stream and secure the property owner's permission for that purpose.
- 5. Arrange in advance for the ultimate destination of the debris collected and the means to get it there. (Your friends' and neighbors' pick-up trucks generally work quite well.) If an entire community or neighborhood is involved, your city or county solid waste departments may provide assistance and free disposal. Contact them well before the event to enlist their help and cooperation.
- 6. Advertise the clean-up to your community. Send press releases to your local media. You may end up recruiting more help and support.

On the Day of the Clean-up

- 1. Pick a "staging area" and keep it staffed at all times. Keep first aid supplies, water, and, if possible, provide rest room facilities.
- 2. Have the volunteers sign in as they arrive. Get names and addresses.
- 3. Make everyone aware of safety issues, such as:
- work in pairs, wear rubber gloves, don't pick up hazardous wastes, lift with your legs not your back, don't pick up things that are too heavy, don't walk in the stream in water higher than your knees, etc.
- 4. Make a map of where people will be working and keep track of everyone involved in the clean-up.
- 5. Make the volunteer effort as festive as possible. Bring refreshments and other treats for when the work is done. Take pictures of the stream and your volunteers before, during, and after the event.
- 6. Keep the day down to about 4 hours.

Cool Off, Get Wet and Provide Service to the Environment (Cont.)

After You "Dry Your Feet Off"

- 1. Follow up by recording, in simple terms, the amount and types of debris collected (i.e. truckloads or tons of debris). Take photographs.
- 2. Provide this information to the media in a press release. This last step will likely result in a well deserved pat on the back for the people who helped in the project and make the public more aware that we should not use our streams as dumping grounds.
- 3. Send thank you notes to your volunteers.
- 4. Set up a "Watershed Watch" to prevent more garbage from being dumped into your creek. Sounds like a great way to cool off and chalk up another successful service project.

CHILDHOOD CANCER

It's been 20 years since I heard the words "I'm so sorry, your child has cancer", and I can still feel the stab of terror that zapped through my whole being. I vividly remember the stress and worries over the next 7 years, not just about Amanda's health, but also the tremendous strain on our finances. I also remember the amazing emotional and financial support from family, friends, complete strangers and several very caring non-profit organizations that helped us through that nightmare.

With that in mind, my heart goes out to families currently facing similar challenges with the added complications of the Covid-19 pandemic. While many of us are getting tired of months of isolation, having to wear masks, having raw hands from constant washing and using hand sanitizer, and some struggling with loss of income, childhood cancer families have been dealing with these issues for years while their child is in treatment and beyond. Treatment protocols can last several years, and too often stretch into 6 or more years due to relapses. Long-term isolation is common due to the child's compromised immune system. Even very young children frequently have to wear a mask. Many times parents have to quit their job to stay with their sick child. The stories I've heard firsthand over the years are truly heartbreaking. Even after treatment, 2/3 of childhood cancer survivors will have longlasting, chronic conditions from treatments, including heart and lung damage, growth deficits, hearing loss, infertility and second cancers.

And now they have the added fear and stress of a highly contagious virus that would most likely be disastrous for their child and possibly the rest of the family. To make matters worse, they're cut off from support systems crucial to their ability to cope with this family trauma. Sometimes only one parent can stay in the hospital with their child, and siblings and other family and friends can't visit. Hospitals and non-profits that serve these families have had to find new ways to provide support that will minimize the families' exposure to the coronavirus. Just one challenging aspect has been how to offer toys and play activities for distraction and cheer. At Sacred Heart Children's Hospital in Spokane, the playroom has been stripped of all toys, books and craft supplies. Some of these items can be delivered to patient rooms on request after being sanitized.

I've just touched on some of the challenges these special kids and their families face during "normal" times and the current extraordinary times. For National Childhood Cancer Awareness Month, next month I'll give additional pediatric cancer statistics and feature a wonderful nonprofit that provides invaluable assistance to Inland NW families.



Lions Club International Foundation (LCIF) 2019-2020 Final Figures

The final figures for club and individual donations came out this past week. While this past fiscal year we all experienced the difficulties of dealing with Covid-19, the Lions of District 19 again raised to the occasion. Total donations for the district were \$39,284 which is the best year yet in supporting our premier Foundation. This is an increase of \$22,542 the last 4 years, FANTASTIC!!!!!. The district had 43 members donate a total of \$9000 which is an average of \$203.30 per donating member. Thank You from myself, LCIF and all the you have helped locally* and around the world.

For a \$100.00 donation, 100 children can be vaccinated against measles, 18 at risk individuals are tested for diabetes, provides cataract surgery for two individuals. Eight hundred million people go to bed hungry every night. A \$100.00 donation will feed 14 disabled, elderly, low income individuals on a regular basis.

I want to encourage those clubs to put LCIF in your budgets or plan a special fundraising event with proceeds going to LCIF. District Governor Peggy Harriman has a goal for all clubs to donate to LCIF this year. Let's all help her achieve this goal.

*The district received an emergency grant for just under \$10,000. These funds are being used to purchase PPEs that will be distributed to nursing homes, senior centers, Spokane Veterans Home and more.

Cooperative for Assistance and Relief Everywhere (CARE)

During the past 4+ months our lives have been changed dramatically by Covid-19. It has changed how we meet, shop, visit, worship and more. Covid-19 has also had a devastating effect on the people of Honduras which is our CARE project for this year. Please read how the people of Honduras have been affected and why we are shifting our emphasis from planting gardens to supplying food.

In the dry corridor of Honduras, where there is the highest concentration of poverty in the country, the rates of malnutrition among children are very high. There is limited availability of food due to recurrent droughts in the region. Through this project, Multiple District 19 Lions have chosen to fund CARE's work to increase nutrition through the establishment of school gardens. Now, because of the COVID-19 pandemic and spread of the virus, there is an added urgency to address hunger in the targeted communities.

The incorporation of humanitarian actions into the project will benefit families in El Paraiso with school-age children who currently are unable to access food due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The MD19 grant will benefit families from four schools in the municipalities of Soledad, Vado Ancho and Texiguat, within the dry corridor. In addition to providing food to families, the grant from MD19 Lions will also be used to provide education about the coronavirus and how to prevent the spread of the virus, such as by implementing good hygiene practices.

<u>Building Upgrade</u>: The building has been power washed (thank you Ben and Sheena), the outside wiring has been relocated (thank you Fred and Lonnie), damaged trim and fascia has been replaced (thank you Ben and Sheena), the new stove is in and the three bad stoves removed (thank you Ben, Lonnie, Frank, Ken, Joe, Mary. Fred) and all signs removed from the building (thank you Lonnie). Painting is waiting on the weather to be agreeable. Under coating has been started. On July 3rd, the building was painted.





Cemetery Fence: The old fence was taken down and Frank cut all the railings in half with the chain saw and Lonnie took the old fence to the Pleasant View Transfer Station. Maximum of 8' for the rails is allowed so Frank cut them all in half. The wood was purchased from North Idaho Post & Poles and they knocked off \$150. Gravel was donated by Daniels Landscaping. Work party began at 10:00 on the 3rd. Gary, Ben, Fred, Sheena, Lonnie, Mary, Matthew and Frank did the work. Well, part of the work. The holes were dug deeper by Matthew and gravel was put in by Mary. The first three posts were put in and the rails added. At the same time we all realized Lonnie's mistake. He ordered 4 corner posts with 90 degree holes (for a rectangle) and what was needed were 8 posts with 45 degree angles (for an octagon shape). After Lonnie was tarred and feathered, he cleaned himself up and said he would get the right stuff on Monday and we'll start again.

Out and About in the District

NELSON LIONS CLUB recently held a Drive-In Movie event on June 28 & 29.

This opportunity came to us from Fresh Air Cinema (Vancouver based firm) who have been contracted by Fortis BC (BC based hydro company) to hold Drive-In events in 30 locations this summer – all in aid of local food banks.

Our annual Canada Day 67th Pancake Breakfast was cancelled due to COVID so our Club was excited to give the Drive-In movie a try.

The Club managed to prepare and hold this event on a very short timeline of 3 weeks. The location was secured, a community partner (our local credit union) agreed to match gate receipts. And we offered 30 second video spots to local businesses for \$500 per spot.

The gate receipts, plus the matching credit union grant raised a total of \$4,365. Each of the 3 local food banks received \$1,455.

In addition to the sale of preshow video spots, the Club received other local grants, donations and the offer of complementary portable toilets from a local firm – a total of \$2,400 which came directly to the Club. We had a few expenses but were pleased to raise about \$1,500.
