WHERE IS THE FUN IN FUNDRAISING?

Car washes, raffles, golf matches, dinner parties and many other activities helped give Lions a rapport with their communities.

Today, it is difficult to recapture those feeling of connectiveness with members of the community. Due to limited interactions, reduced numbers, social distancing and masking, Lions have had to resort to other methods of fundraising. Most of the alternative methods involve the Internet. Presales of many products hosted by the Lions can be very successful. Several companies cater specifically to organizations like the Lions to enable these sales. Examples include; Terry Lynn candies and nuts, order forms can be emailed to everyone on our contact lists, their replies with orders can be tabulated and the club can then order the exact amount and keep their net profit, no loss on inventory to keep and store. Another example is finding a local representative for a company. An example; would be Avon or Tupperware. A Zoom meeting attended by potential buyers, invited by Lions, would then watch demonstrations of products and make their selections. The dealer would then collect the cost of the items, send the club the profits and deliver the ordered products. Emailing friends, family and coworkers to sell raffle tickets is another way to connect through the Internet. Our job as Lions is to continue to support our local and international communities. Now we need to fundraise any way possible to keep our commitment: We Serve!

GLOBAL MEMBERSHIP TEAM (GMT)



LIONS CLUB INTERNATIONAL FOUNDATION (LCIF)

This past year has been like no other we have ever encountered. Health care systems have been stressed, economies halted and more than 1 billion worldwide staying home in order to stay safe. COVID-19 has caused millions to suffer physically, emotionally, and financially. Powerless against the deadly intruder hundreds of thousands have lost their lives.

Facing a disease of epic proportion would have been enough, but 2020 has seen many disasters. From January through September, the United States 16 weather relates disasters. These include wildfires, hurricanes, flooding and more. Losses top \$ 1 Billion dollars.

COVID-19 struggles continue, Natural disasters come like clockwork, globally stealing 90,000 lives annually and impacting another 160 million. For some of us it's hard to imagine while for others it is a reality. **It's imperative to deliver hope**.

Since 1990 Lions Club International Foundation SightFirst grant program has done just that, giving historic progress by restoring and improving vision for 488 million worldwide. More than \$371 million in LCIF SightFirst funding has created hope. Locally we have received 2 grants from LCIF in the last 7 months. First off we received a grant for PPEs, and just this month we received another grant to help replenish lost items in the Malden fire. Continue to work for a third grant to help replenish/supply needed items for firefighters in Zone 2.

That's why I continue to ask each club and member to support LCIF. All clubs should have in their budget to support LCIF. Asking all members to consider a one time donation that can be done online. Members can also set up monthly donations from their checking account. To donate online go to Lions Website and select DONATE.

Happy New Year---Let's hope 2021 is better than 2020.

The approval of the structure and elections took our full 90-minute time frame so we will have our ratification of the Constitution at our January 5th, 2021 meeting.

As the first Chair of the newly formed MD19 KOTB Committee I will be working with our elected District Representatives to contact all District Governors, Zone Chairs and Lions Club Presidents to inform them of what we are, who we are and the main purpose that we are striving to achieve as a committee, as noted in our Mission Statement: To accept and act upon the Helen Keller challenge made to Lions to become the "Knights Of The Blind," which includes the improvement of the quality of life for people who are blind and visually impaired.

Also, I will keep in contact via our District Representatives with the District Governors so that they will know the steps we are taking. It is also our plan that the District Representatives will communicate with the District Governors the workings of KOTB so that we will be transparent.

Some of our primary focus will be to help bring the information, be it websites, club applications, scholarship applications, etc. into an accessible format. We also would like to help educate the Lions about sight loss so that more Lions know the truth about what sight loss is all about, including the ability of their blind members when they have full access to Lions resources.




SPOKANE SHADLE NORTH
