

Global Membership Chair



In attendance were the President of the NSLC, Helen Mazier, the Immediate Past President and supervisor of the project, Steve Umling, Past Council Chair Bud Byrd, Leo Liaison Kevin Parr, Leo Rome, Club Treasurer Chris Umling, Lion Joseph Haltom, and yours truly, Council Chair Scott Harkey.

Due to the good planning and coordination of Lion Steve, we had three much needed pieces of equipment on hand to do the deed. We owe many thanks to Lion Joseph for not only bringing his company excavator, but for providing excellent skills in the operation of the unit. Lion Steve also showed his skill in working his tractor with attached tiller in leveling and grading the area. I was there on a skid steer moving dirt from one area to another. We removed left over bricks from the site, took down a hill on one side of the path, and redistributed the dirt around the Lions Pavilion.

The Lions Pavilion is completed. Dedication of the project is June 5th. The 800 brick pavers still have may spots that can be changed out with memorial bricks. Lions cannot afford to sit on the sidelines any longer. We cannot continue to blame this or that for the reason we are not DOING. Looking into and talking about is NOT doing. We are spending a lot of time figuring out why we can't do things instead of doing them, and our district is failing, along with our multiple district, our nation and the whole of North America.

Physicists would tell you the four strongest forces in the universe are, in their order of strength.

1) the strong nuclear force, 2) the electromagnetic force, 3) the weak nuclear force, and 4) gravity, but I would ague there is one stronger than all of these! It is STATUS QUO. As Lions, we are not innovating, evolving, and moving forward. We are stuck in our usual routines and traditions.

Two mindsets are hindering our growth of membership, leadership, and service. These two are provincial clubs and uncommitted members.

What is a provincial club? This is a club that never looks outside of their community. They don't participate in zone meetings, cabinet meetings, conferences, or conventions. They do not realize the advantages of involvement with the district and LCI. There are literally hundreds of ways to utilize our international organization. There are dozens of grants available to assist with projects for your community. Without communication with the zone chair, the district governor is not aware of needs of the clubs and doesn't offer assistance. The value of "we" is lost to this kind of club. And there are large provincial clubs that are remarkably successful locally, but do not realize their potential could be extended even further! They have the depth of membership to provide leaders.

Uncommitted members are those who attend (or not) and volunteer (or not) but are not committed to Lionism. We don't want to get rid of these members, we want them to evolve!! I am issuing a challenge to every Lion in District 8L. It has 6 parts:

- Poke your head up and look around to see what other clubs are doing. (This happens at almost every zone meeting!)
- Examine your club operations. Find something you think you can improve and target that.
- Attend club board, zone, cabinet meetings and strongly encourage others to do the same.
- Expand YOUR knowledge. There are dozens of courses available for free on LCI. You can get training for an office that maybe needs to be improved.
- If you have been a club president, step up your game and become a zone chair. Zones are a critical element to district operations. We need a new one every year!
- Change from being an observer to a participant. Your job is to move forward to the next level whatever level that is. Don't be afraid to change.

If you can do at least 50% of this, you will see a dramatic change in your club FOR THE BETTER. Lions Clubs International is an incredible service organization. We do not want ours to be the generation that lets it die for lack of commitment. Step up and serve.




