News from Leader Dog:

Dear MD8 Lions,

I bring greetings from Leader Dog, Lions Liaison Beth Slade. Mrs. Slade told me that two districts in MD8 have made enough donations thus far in the Lions Year to qualify for free visitations to the Leader Dog Campus in Rochester, Michigan. Districts 8N and 8S had donated over \$4,000 each in April of 2018. Leader Dog will pay for the flight and hotel room along with meals including the famous chili and donuts they serve upon arrival at the facility. These are both cooked by the dietary staff at Leader Dog Campus on August 11th. Can we promote donations to Leader Dog from District 8 L, I and O? That way MD 8 can be fully represented at Leader Dog in the 2019-20 Lions Year. Please remember to promote Leader Dogs to legally blind people in Louisiana. It is by word of mouth from Lions that people will learn about the Leader Dogs. Training, 25 nights at the school, transportation to the school and back home along with the best trained dog guide are all offered to a legally blind person who can walk independently with a cane at no charge. A dog guide along with a head held, voice activated GPS unit are both given along with training instructions to a

Year in Review

District 8-0 has experienced an overall positive year. Clubs are engaging members as they provide service and activities for their local communities. We have sponsored campers to camp sessions, provided eye glasses to those in need and screened young children thru our Cub Sight program. This could not have been accomplished if not for the Lions of District 8-0 that see in their heart to give back and help others in time of need. WE SERVE.

In providing the service we all so well recognized for, we still have one hurdle to overcome – Membership. To continue to perform this level of service to our local communities, our Children's camp and the Cub Sight / Eye Foundation we must continue to strengthen our membership. This year we have roughly 15 new members, great job. Sadly, to say we will be possibly losing 3 clubs due to dwindling membership along with members that slide out the back door. Hopefully we can keep some of the members in the failing clubs by getting them involved in other surrounding clubs.

We all ask the questions as to why we are continually losing members. I hear the same issues from other civic organizations about membership concerns. So, why are we losing members. Are we not doing our job in orientating new member, are we not an inviting club. Are we not planning service activities for our clubs? It appears something is not working. ALL of us working together need to identify the problem and look at ways to change our way of doing things. I, personally am tired of hearing the response "That's the way we have done things in the past". The past worked back then, but things have change over the years and we now need to re-think our approach and change with the times.

Each club needs to look at where they see their club in the future. What changes do we need to incorporate to get there? A couple of items for discussion:

- <u>Club meetings</u> could we benefit from having only one meeting per month instead of two. Would a different day or time be more acceptable? Are meeting productive or boring. Do we encourage participation from the new members? Active clubs should be holding at least one service activity per quarter.
- <u>Branch Clubs</u> This is being pushed from LCI as an alternate idea for new growth. Branch clubs can be started with as few as 5 members. This could be local bikers group, professional organization, group of young adults. The list is endless on the opportunities that exist. The Branch Club pays dues, benefits from the LCI framework but does not have voting rights. A Branch Club, once it reaches 20 members can be recognized as a Lions Club.
- <u>Service</u> as we are all aware of, we were founded on the idea of providing a service for our community, where ever that may be. We have done a great job in fulfilling that challenge. What's next. How can we improve the service and opportunities we currently provide? Getting information out as to what the Lions Club organization is and does will not only open the doors for membership growth, it makes us visible in the eyes of the local communities. The more hands on task, means more service that can be provided.
- <u>Leadership</u> for any organization to grow and succeed, there needs to be leadership to guide the ship. As in the work place, we should always be looking to train that individual to replace us.
- To move forward we need to be looking for that Lions club member that is wanting to step and take an active role. You will be seeing more training opportunities available on the local level (RLLI for example) that provides information and direction for those interested in leadership not only on the club level, but the District and Multiple District level as well. New leaders bring new ideas to the table. I encourage all Lions members to take advantage of the training opportunities available. It will not only help in your growth as a Lion Club member, it will benefit you in the work place as well.

In closing, it has been a good year. I enjoyed working with my fellow governors as well as our council chair and secretary to the council. We voiced our opinions as spokesman for our districts on issues that needed to be addressed and in the end, came to agreement as the what was the best path forward for the Multiple of Louisiana. Hats off to the outgoing council.

The end is not over as I will continue to take an active role in my District and the Multiple District as mover forward in the next centennial of Lionism. Belinda and myself both enjoy helping and providing for others thru our club and District service activities. See you around

They always tell you that as District Governor that your year will fly by quickly......this year has zoomed by. Seems that we as MD 8 District Governors was just in Chicago for the 100th Lions Clubs International Convention, where we were able to hear tunes from the Beach Boys, and Charlie Daniels Band

Back in Louisiana we started making club visits and planning for our 2017-2018 Fall Leadership Conference where International Director visited from Bridgewater Massachusetts, and she talked to us about the jar of buttons (Members) and how we kept needing to replace our buttons in the jar as some were lost along the way (retention..i.e Death, and aging) and how to properly apply each button according to their skills and capabilities. Each button has a specific purpose and must be applied correctly.

District 8 N started the year with 951 members and 36 Clubs, and as of May 16, 2018 at this writing we have 972 members and 37 Clubs as we Chartered a new Club (Baton Rouge LSU Campus Club). District 8N set goals of gaining new members and reducing our Lost members, with a increase of 1% of Women Membership......today we have 87 added members (including 25 members from the Campus Club) and 66 lost members which includes 8 deceased members.

District 8 N supports both of our State Projects with many of our 37 clubs making donations to both......We have registered 41 Campers as of 5/6/18 for our Summer Camp this year, and has made donations to the Eye Foundation as well as 32% of our clubs had made contributions of over \$30,000 to Lions Clubs International Foundation this year.

District 8 N has screened over 9,400 children this year which equals about 33% of all children screened throughout the state through Cub Sight.

Past District Governor Zeke Dunaway received the Presidental Leadership Medal, and Past Council Chair Francoise Ratard and Lion **Billy Jeansonne** received Leadership Certificates from our International President Dr. Naresh **Aggarwal**. Congratulations to them for their achievements.

As we draw close to the end of this Fiscal Year...I am proud to have served as District Governor for District 8N, and looking forward to moving our District Forward in the coming years. DGE Scott Dudley has been to several different trainings throughout the year getting ready to become our District Governor and carry our momentum forward and putting together new clubs and increasing our membership in District 8N, but he needs your help.

In a few days he will travel to Las Vegas Nevada to further prepare for the new year, and I will join him there on the 28th of June.

Planning for Success

Getting ready for another LI-ONS Year means PLANNING RETREAT TIME.... IF you are serious about having a really

great year. We *"Failing to* have 5 NEW SERVICE AREAS that we can use to our advantage in reaching new markets (new members & volunteers). This year Lions International encourages all clubs to prepare more detailed plans to include multiples service projects, as well as how to use these projects in Public Relations, Membership recruiting, and Leadership Development. Obviously, this will require more than a one hour planning session.

Available on the website is the Club Quality Initiative which is a Strategic Planning Tool for club use. Anyone in your club could use it and facilitate your retreat. We recommend that you engage a facilitator who is <u>not</u> a member of your club. That way every one in your club can participate in the process without anyone being burdened with being facilitator. Your Global Leadership Team member would be happy to assist.

Planning for a Facilitated Meeting

 Set the Venue: meetings work best if the venue is conducive to a comfortable

"Failing to Plan is Planning to Fail" discussion.

- Set time Aside: Meetings should not be rushed. There is a specific process to be followed if it is to work well.
- Prepare a Facilitation Plan: This is not a blind process. Areas to be covered should be prearranged. The Club Quality Initiative provides all the required areas.
- Make Plans for Documentation: To better be able to follow up, and identify process issues in a group, it always helps if a meeting



is documented.

 Prepare Psychologically: It is important that everyone takes time to prepare internally if you are going to have a successful meeting; not just the Facilitator.



The Club Quality Initiative has 'homework' that should be prepared beforehand.

You should plan to consider

- Service Projects
- Service Projects with Youth
- Leadership Development
- Membership Drive
- Modifying your Club to attract Millennial members
- Enhancing Member Satisfaction.
- Enhancing your Club's Culture
- Contributions to State Projects
- Contributions to LCIF (Think Melvin Jones Fellowships!!)
- New Methods of Publicizing what your club does.
- What Works; What doesn't
- Start Something NEW
- Discard Something OLD

Good Planning takes time and thought. Don't shortcut.
