New Technology for our Blind Students

Technology is changing the lives of our students at the South Carolina School for the Deaf and the Blind. A brief description of some of the new technology is found below.

Ruby is an on-the-go video magnifier with a 4.3-inch screen that allows the low vision student to magnify items from 2 to 14 times the original size. The 4.3-inch full color, bright screen makes it outstanding for reading books, bills, checks, etc. It is about the size of a smart phone and can view items and read text in light or dark rooms.





WeWalk is an amazing new digital product that combines a traditional white cane with smart phone technology. It can detect obstacles that are above the chest and head levels through its ultrasonic sensor. It can be integrated with a smart phone and is able to receive turn-by-turn Google Maps navigation. It is an open platform, meaning that it will be able to gain new features with integrations such as Uber, Lyft and Amazon Alexa. SCSDB Foundation bought two of them for our Orientation and Mobility team to test and two students have been identified who will receive them once the staff has familiarized themselves with its functions and capabilities.

The Orion TI-84 Plus Talking Graphing Calculator consists of a compact accessory that is attached to the top of the TI-84 Plus that enables a visually impaired person the ability to interact with the TI-84 Plus using speech, audio and haptic (vibration) feedback. The high-quality synthesized speech reads out all textual and symbolic information on the LCD screen as well as each key press. It is fully expandable with hardware accessories through a USB port and can print or emboss graphs when connected to a printer or an embosser.



FROM THE DESK OF PCC PAUL DOVE, GLOBAL SERVICE CHAIR

Some of us remember and are more adept with numbers than we are with words. Numbers, figures, statistics, data, units, quantities, symbols, counts, enumerations, metrics, whatever you prefer.

Well, to us as Lions, numbers—or as MyLION calls them, "metrics"—are vital data. Why? Because they tabulate how we serve, especially when those data are reported to and recorded by MyLION. These metrics are shown as raw numbers and in graphs to chart our successes---or lack thereof.

Our service metrics include a) number of people served, b) number of service activities, c) number of volunteers delivering services, and d) number of hours invested in service. We report service activities, meetings, fundraising, and donations.

What counts?

Stay tuned.

Here is the Palmetto State we have 128 Lions clubs, with 3,060 members in total, providing a host of service activities. Remember our motto is "We Serve!"

We Lions in MD 32 deliver hot meals to older or ill neighbors via "Meals on Wheels" and as individuals taking meals to shut-ins, ailing neighbors, and families when there has been the death of a loved one.

We drive home-bound friends and neighbors to medical appointments, and we grocery shop for these and other citizens. We staff food banks, and we conduct food drives. We run soup kitchens and bake cookies for public safety officers and other first responders. We cook hot dogs and hamburgers for civic functions.

We conduct vision screenings for children and adults. One of our stalwarts has personally logged over 45,000 vision screenings, for example. We collect and recycle used eyeglasses. We fund eye exams and glasses for indigent students and adults, and, through our Lions Vision Services of South Carolina, we negotiate and fund eye surgeries for those who cannot afford such treatments.

We recycle glass bottles and jars and aluminum cans and plastic containers and cardboard. We use "best practices" waste management. We do river cleanups. We pick up litter along our highways and streets.

We volunteer at "Blessing Box" distributions, and we help with "Young Lives Matter," a program for pregnant teenagers. We read to school children. We sponsor a library at the children's clinic at MUSC's Storm Eye Institute. We led efforts to build an educational outdoor learning area at our South Carolina School for the Deaf and Blind. We have provided e-sight equipment for legally blind students and adults. We help with blind fishing tournaments. We help sponsor Leader Dogs for the Blind. We conduct diabetes awareness programs and assist diabetics in various ways. We support Lions International Youth Exchange and serve as host families.

We serve on civic committees, commissions, boards, clubs, and other groups. We lead some of these civic activities. Some of us are elected officials or government program volunteers. We provide a safe Halloween experience for children during "Trunk or Treat" evenings. We plant trees and support other environmental causes. We build ramps for handicapped neighbors and friends and anybody else needing a ramp. We volunteer with "Salkehatchie," a South Carolina United Methodist home repair program. We work with "Habitat for Humanity." We volunteer with blood drives.

We call "Home Alone" neighbors to check on them. During this pandemic we call other Lions to ensure they are okay. We hold club meetings via conference call or virtually during the pandemic for those clubs which do not yet wish to meet face-to-face.

And there are literally scores of other service activities our 128 clubs are providing right now.

Why is this important, these "metrics?"

Club health assessments rely on various reports from club secretaries and club service chairs. When accumulated, these numbers are impressive and document what we as Lions are doing worldwide to help our neighbors and communities. Metrics are lagging at present due to inactivity in clubs and reservations about being out and about delivering our services. Hopefully, your club will identify new service opportunities each quarter as we strive to be there during what has become a time of crisis in too many of our communities. Food banks are stretched to their limits, for example. First responders are pushed to their utmost. We have massive wildfires out west, COVID everywhere and more prevalent, and recurring tropical storms and hurricanes coming ashore in our Texas, Louisiana, Mississippi, and Alabama region, plus civil unrest and political polarization. Some areas are experiencing severe unemployment, leading to myriad problems with supporting their families, buying groceries, paying rent, etc.


We have a unique opportunity to step up and deliver the service for which we are known worldwide. After all, we are the world's largest volunteer service organization. Remember our five primary focus areas are hunger, the environment, vision, childhood cancer, and diabetes. But all service activities can and should be counted.

Please cogitate and collaborate on these opportunities and inspire/lead/activate your club to do everything possible to address present and urgent humanitarian needs out there.

Academy (<u>Click her for additional information</u>): Often Lions are hesitant to step up to a position because fear of failure, or not knowing exactly what is expected of them. The Lions Learning Academy is designed to overcome these two obstacles plus others that a Lion might have. The Academy is not designed to take the place of the District and Club Officer Training. It is designed to enhance it. This year will be especially helpful. They can choose an office, or know what office they will be assigned, for the coming Lions year, have the initial training in April before the district training, then the District Training, followed by a session in August to make sure they are on the right track, then another follow-up in October to guide them for the rest of the year.

The dates are April 24, 2021, August 28, 2021, and October 23, 2021. The hours are from 10:00am to 3:30pm with lunch included. The cost will be \$30.00 per Lion (not the \$25.00 as reported in the PL). This covers about a third of the cost for materials and meals. The Liaison should call them frequently, update them on club activities, and encourage them to attend a meeting or service event. Lions who have withdrawn from club participation should be reminded of the importance of our mission and needs in the community. It may help to send them a short note thanking them for their time and service in
