

BENEFITS OF A CCTV MAGNIFIER



According to the CDC, approximately 12 million Americans, ages 40 and over have some form of vision impairment. Melanie (left) is a 43-year-old single mom and grandmother of one. She is legally blind due to past trauma to her eyes, having only 10% of her vision in her left eye. Legally blind means a person has a corrected vision of 20/200 in their best-seeing eye. Her vision impairment cannot be fully corrected with glasses or contacts. However, there are a wide array of devices to help people like Melanie.

When her grandson's school nurse reached out to Lions Vision Services for assistance, we were eager to help. Melanie is tasked each day with helping her grandson with his schoolwork, but she was struggling to read the papers that were sent home. Within a couple of days, LVS delivered a

CCTV and magnifier to her home.

The benefits of a CCTV magnifier are many, as the versatility provided allows for independence through visual magnification and technology. The handheld magnifier gives her the freedom to use it anywhere she goes. Melanie is truly grateful for these devices and is excited that homework time will now be a better experience for her and her grandson.

How do we attract members, specifically younger members?

• Tell your story about Lions.

• Use online media to connect with younger people.

• Use Zoom format to connect with younger audience and those who are not connected in person right now. Zoom lowers the barrier to entry for the younger audience.

- Go to Chamber of Commerce and other groups like that to talk about Lions and tell your story (see a theme here?).
- Check out the resources at <u>lionsclubs.org</u> especially Young Adult Recruiting Guide for ideas.
- Connect with local schools and universities who want to offer their students service oppor-

tunities- often sports teams, academic teams like Beta Club, etc are looking for service opportunities.

- Form a team in your club to promote membership.
- Make your club welcoming to families, involving children in making a card during a meeting and giving them some service opportunities.
- Make your club inclusive even to those with some challenges.
- Communication is important: websites, Facebook, newsletters, postcard invitations and reminders to community members.



- Decide on your target audience. Do you have nephews, nieces, grandchildren, etc who you can connect with to encourage membership? Those younger ones can connect with others their age.
- Don't forget your retired friends too. They have more time to devote.

FROM THE DESK OF PCC PAUL DOVE, GLOBAL SERVICE CHAIR

As we conclude the first quarter of this Lions' fiscal year, how do we, MD 32, compare with our previous year service reporting and with national and international numbers?

Last year we reported 3,480 service activities and served 493, 678 people through these tabulated service activities. That is the upside; the downside is, of our 128 clubs last year, only 81 are recorded on MyLion as having reported service work. That is a pitiful sixty-three percent. When I went to school, a few years ago, 63 was a grade "F."

Thus far—September 22-- into our first quarter, forty clubs have posted FY 2020-2021 service activities. Our last year's poor rate of 63% now sinks to a low of 31% of 128 "active," and I use the word very loosely, clubs.

When district officers visit clubs, we hear all about the wonderful service work each club provides in its community. The unfortunate situation is that, while we are delivering wonderful and needed services, we are not giving ourselves and our international organization the credit due for what we have done and are doing.

In Global Service Team goals for this year, as cited in last month's Palmetto Lion, we set 75% as the benchmark for clubs reporting service activities, or 96 of our clubs. We also set a 20% increase for reported activities.

As important as providing these services is, reporting them to MyLion is also critical. With your help, we will meet these goals. Our MD is ahead of our constitutional area MD average, 542 to 443 service activities, which is impressive. However, worldwide, we are at an unimpressive 37% of what worldwide average multiple districts post to date this fiscal year.

Bottom line? Congratulations on your service work—we topped our July 2019 statistics by some six percent this July 2020. Now, please report every activity to your club service chair (or secretary if no CSC) so that he or she can take a few minutes to input your vital service numbers onto MyLion. See pages 40 and 41 of the summer issue of *LION Magazine* to be amazed by the number of people served last year by category, for a total of 250,000,000. Also, see attached chart for our MD data to date.

From the Desk of PCC Rick Pressly, MD32 GMT

"We Serve"

I have been a member of the Abbeville Lions Club and of Lions Clubs International for 26 years. When I first joined the only Service we were providing our Community was providing a pair of glasses for 15 to 25 members of our community on an annual basis. The only way, other than the Club Secretary, that we knew we were providing that service was when the Club Secretary informed us at our monthly meeting that it had been accomplished. Yes, we were selling brooms and calendars and we were doing Candy Day in the fall to raise funds to support providing glasses and Lions Vison Services and other Lions supported causes. Other than that, and sponsoring Farmers Night and the High School Athletic Banquet in the spring (with the help of our Local Merchants), we were not PROVIDING SERVICE TO OUR COMMUNITY!

In 1917, when Melvin Jones and our founding Fathers, organized the International Association of Lions Clubs, their vision was to develop an organization to reach out to their communities and provide service to the needy in the community. Somewhere, thru the years, we lost sight of the "We Serve" and the fucus seemed to switch to "We do Fund Raising to help pay for glasses and support other activities with the funds we raise"! Service to the community became a thing of the past.

In 2009, with the help of a much more Senior Lion than myself, as one of those Lions that did not understand the difference between "Service and Fund Raising", I came to the realization that my dissatisfaction with Lions, at the time, was we were NOT providing service in our community, we were just meeting, eating, and doing fund raising! It was at that point that I made the decision to help make that change. And we began finding ways to provide SERVICE to our local Community!

As of today (9/20/20), for this Lions Year, our club members have provided SERVICE to 2948 members of our community thru 98 service activities thru 1,033 Volunteer hours! Those services have been recorded due to the individual efforts of our Club members in their own ways of serving the community thru efforts to prevent Hunger, Vision problems, support for youth, or just Old Fashion Kindness to their neighbors. We Serve!

My purpose in writing this article is to point out to you that, in regards to the vast majority of our Lions Clubs across the state, we have lost sight of our motto and have slowly but surely put the curse of death on the majority of Lions Clubs in South Carolina. Our purpose is to SERVE, not raise funds to write checks to help. One is Lions with hands on DOING something to help, the other is the Secretary or Treasurer writing a check to help in some way. Without SERVICE there is nothing to ATTRACT and RETAIN members in our Clubs.

I do not like to ASSUME things (you know what that does for us) and we have been assuming that even though our Clubs are not reporting Service Activities on a monthly basis, that they are providing service in their communities. Well, I think the time has come to STOP that assumption and focus on the facts! The facts are, in accordance with the most recent "Club Health Assessment (that is the report that all members of the District and MD Leadership Team get monthly) that 42 of 67 clubs in District 32S and 41 of 61 clubs in District 32C have not reported any Service Activity this Lions year and the majority of them have not reported any activity in a year or more. Question is: Are these Lions Clubs not reporting Service Activities because they are not doing any OR are their Members providing Service to the Community and it is just not being reported? I personally believe it is because the majority of these Clubs are like I was in the past; they believe that their Fund Raising efforts are really Service Work and do not understand (again like myself) the difference!

Now we can find reasons for this not happening; however, we still need to keep in mind that 45 Clubs in the MD32 are reporting Service activities and that only means that ALL of us COULD be reporting SERVICE IF YOU ARE PROVIDING IT IN YOUR COMMUNITY!

This needs to change if the clubs NOT doing SERVICE are to survive. Without SERVICE from Our Lions Clubs, there is NO reason to have a Lions Club! Think about it!

You will learn the complete duties of your office as described in the club, district, or multiple district constitution. There are some requirements you will need to complete to receive a Certificate of Achievement. Come with a willingness to learn and work attitude.

New Lions Symposium: This is for Lions who have been a member for less than 5 years. For our new clubs, this would mean every member. This Symposium goes beyond the club orientation, that you may or may not have received. It is designed to give you a much broader understanding of Lions Clubs International and your duties and opportunities as a Lion at the club, district, and multiple district level.

Combined Academy/Symposium: For this year we are combining the two into one event. We will have a time together then separate into two groups. News from SCSDB

Good afternoon! I trust you are well and staying healthy. COVID-19 continues to be a challenge for all of us. One piece of good news is that through the generosity of South Carolina Lions and the Lions Club International Foundation, the South Carolina School for the Blind has four new Embossers. These machines translate English text into Braille. They are now installed and being used to help our blind students navigate the daily lessons prepared for them by our teachers. I am sending you two pictures of the Embossers. Once we get through the current pandemic we will have a celebration to formally recognize the generosity of the Lions, the Lions Clubs in South Carolina and Lions Club International Foundation.

Let me give you an update on how we are handling the COVID-19 pandemic at the School. We are back in class five days a week with some very strict protocols. All students, faculty and staff are required to wear a mask at all times except when they are eating, sleeping, or are inside their office or dorm room. Our students are assigned to individual dorm rooms and they are required to wear a mask if they are outside of their dorm room. All buses, dining halls and instructional areas are sanitized on a daily basis. The SCSDB Foundation purchased sanitation equipment for every area of the school. We are not allowing visitors to come on campus and for the first time since 1934 we will not be hosting the Spartanburg Lions Club Annual Christmas luncheon. Hopefully, we can continue this long-standing tradition next year.

This year's convention is a "COVID SAFE" meeting. By that we mean that we have taken great precautions to follow both State and CDC guidelines including limiting seating in all venues according to social distancing capacity, requiring face masks, and the serving of a boxed lunch and a plated dinner. Therefore, we may have limited seating capability for educational sessions at the Hilton Garden Inn Hotel but unlimited capacity at the Gala Awards Dinner, (due to the large size of the Convention Center ballrooms) at the Florence Center, one block from the Hilton.
