# LCIF responds to the Earthquake and Tsunami in Indonesia

On Friday, September 28, 2018, a 7.5 magnitude earthquake struck the Indonesian island of Sulawesi and triggered a tsunami.

Today, five days later, the situation for survivors is dire. As of October 2, the death toll is at 1,300 and still rising. Tens of thousands of structures have been obliterated, electrical poles are down throughout the region and many roads are impassable. Survivors are begging on the roadside for food and water and sleeping outside because of the risk of aftershocks.

Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) has awarded a


US\$100,000 grant to assist with relief efforts. We will continue to mobilize donations for this disaster to provide additional grant funds as Lions on the ground assess and identify needs.

Thanks to the support Lions provide to LCIF on an ongoing basis, Emergency Grants are available to provide for basic immediate needs including food, water, clothing and medicine. We have learned from experience that when a disaster victim receives aid quickly, it provides strength needed to survive the shock and loss, and even a little hope for the future.

After immediate needs are met, victims of disasters are not forgotten. LCIF remains committed to the important rebuilding of homes and lives that must happen, often long after a disaster occurs.

Through Major Catastrophe grants, LCIF helps with long-term reconstruction projects to help victims begin to return to their lives and regain their independence.

At the heart of LCIF's disaster relief programs are the individuals and families your donations reach.



# Why the Fight against Diabetes Is One of Our Global Causes

Diabetes is one of the most pervasive and fastest-growing diseases in the world today. It affects people of all races, income levels, and ages—even children.

Lions Clubs International Foundation is responding to this global epidemic by committing to help prevent diabetes and improve quality of life for those who have been diagnosed through multifaceted, comprehensive health initiatives.

# IDF and Lions Clubs International come together to tackle diabetes





#### 24 March 2018

On Saturday, March 24, 2018, Lions Clubs International (LCI) and the International Diabetes Federation (IDF) signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU), on the occasion of Lions Day at the UN, to establish a cooperative alliance in the global fight against diabetes.

The two organizations will come together to help prevent diabetes and improve the quality of life for those living with diabetes worldwide.

Diabetes affects 425 million adults worldwide, with the total set to reach 629 million by 2045. An estimated 90% are affected by type 2 diabetes, which is largely preventable. One in two people with diabetes has not yet been diagnosed and their diabetes is not controlled. When diabetes is uncontrolled, it can have dire consequences for health and well-being and result in a number of serious complications that impact harshly on the finances of individuals, their families, and the economies of nations. People with diabetes who depend on life-saving insulin and regular monitoring to manage their condition pay the ultimate price when they cannot access affordable medication and equipment.

The signing of the MOU solidifies a partnership that will operate at the national, regional and global level. The two organizations agree to cooperate in good faith to achieve common goals:

- Prevent diabetes and improve the quality of life for those diagnosed
- Raise diabetes awareness and provide education where it is needed
- Develop holistic diabetes-service projects to improve care
- Elevate the issue of diabetes onto the national and global political agenda

Last Sunday 14 LCIF Club Coordinators and members of 7 - Zone 2 & 3 Lions Clubs met in Blenheim for the second Lions Clubs International Foundation's "Campaign 100" Workshop. A third workshop is planned for Zone 1 in the near future.

LCIF Club Coordinators are now familiar with the Campaign and its objectives. I urge clubs to ensure your Club Coordinator is accorded time on a regular basis to bring members up to date on the latest information on the progress of Campaign 100 and the work of Lions Clubs International Foundation. The reason for Campaign 100 is to replenish funds to allow the Foundation to be able to continue its work assisting humanitarian causes around the world. Assistance from your Foundation over the past 10 years to this District for project assistance and disaster relief is 4 times the money donated by 202E clubs over the same period. LCIF wants to be able to continue this assistance if and when required.

As at the October 9, 2018 the Cumulative Funds Raised to Date in USD is \$68,362,325.00. Unfortunately Constitutional Area VII – (Australia, New Zealand, Papua New Guinea, Indonesia) are dragging their feet with only \$US243,209.00 raised. 


