#### PEACH, FETA & PECAN SALAD

Mixed greens (10 oz) 1/2 c. pecans 2 tbsp white wine vinegar 2 peaches – sliced 2 tbsp minced red onion 1 tsp honey

2 oz feta cheese - diced 4 tbsp olive oil dash of pepper

Wash and dry the mixed greens and set aside. Prepare peaches, feta and red onion.

Whisk together olive oil, white wine vinegar, honey and pepper.

Toss half the dressing over the mixed greens.

Add all the rest of the ingredients to the mixed greens and toss with remaining dressing.

Five years ago I moved to Leavenworth to be closer to my sister, Joyce Stevens, and shortly after joined the Leavenworth Lions. In 2017-2018 I completed my first stint as secretary of the club.

I look forward to working with Joe and all of you this year.

- **Easter Seals** was able to ensure a stable operation throughout the pandemic
- Due to a health order, we were not allowed to run our typical weekly camp program;
- Instead, the staff quickly pivoted with innovation to create an online Camp experience! Over 200 have signed up and attending weekly "camps", as close to a virtual camp experience we could create! Complete with camp fire sing songs, virtual field trips whale watching and the Calgary Zoo and the infamous Talent Night.
- Here is what a camper mom wrote to us last week;

I can't say enough in terms of how grateful both Tina and I are for all the time, effort and energy you all put into creating such an incredible experience. Tina lives for camp. It's the highlight of her year and it's beyond description to explain how significant it is in terms of the quality and enjoyment of her life camp experience brings to her.

She loves all of the leaders and all of the experiences she gets to enjoy. We generally don't tell her that she's been accepted to camp too early on because she literally will not sleep for weeks due to the excitement and anticipation.

This online experience was incredible and so greatly needed. She hasn't attended her day program for the past 6 months and the impact has been tremendous. She's become so lethargic without having her daily structure in place. Camp gave this back to her. She was up ready to go bright and alert each morning and enjoyed every moment of it. She was of course exhausted by the end of the day and even more so by the end of the week, however it was a tremendous experience for her.

- Although our plan is to offer "real" camp next year if safe to do so at all three camps, we will evaluate whether we might also offer an online option for those that may not be able to attend
- Our City Day Camp will go ahead as planned in person; manageable & safe with small groups; It will run for 4 weeks in August in Vancouver and Victoria
- Easter Seals House is celebrating it's 65<sup>th</sup> anniversary this year! 35years at the Oak Street location
- In march with all of people's medical appointments being cancelled, occupancy at the House dwindled rapidly. We ceased our regular operations temporarily and offered the facility as a "COVID crisis centre" to Vancouver Coastal Health; Due to the excellent isolating nature of the suite set up, they immediately took over operating it and it has served as a shelter for Woman and children fleeing violent homes, which unfortunately escalates in a time of crisis.
- Our regular Easter Seal House operations will start back up again August 1<sup>st</sup> with medical appointments and surgeries being restored
- Over the past few months, we have been working hard on doing a few upgrades to our camps as well as Easter Seals House, in February, we received a \$300,000 grant from the provincial government to do this work
- We continue to fundraise and need support from the Lions as much as ever
- We are so happy to let you know that the Lions Camp Improvement Committee Winfield recently donated \$50,000 to refurbish a men's and women's washroom and showers.
- Chrome & Cocktails Event has been moved to May 1<sup>st</sup>, watch for details
- Our Drop Zone event is a socially distanced safe event to run, the events will happen mid September in Vancouver & Surrey. Check out the website for more details
