RECOGNITION IS A POWERFUL MOTIVATOR

"A simple, straightforward word of appreciation to somebody who has done an especially good job is one of the greatest human motivators you'll find anywhere." That's the primary finding of a two-year, nationwide study among 5,000 managers, supervisors and human resources personnel. Why is this true? Because the hunger among colleagues and peers is one of the most powerful forces in human nature, the surveyors found.

<u>Some things you can do</u> to give your fellow Lion members or volunteers that experts say means so much:

- Jot down a brief, personal note to one of your members, recognizing his or her superior performance on a particular task/project.
- When speaking to all your club members as a group, remember to give credit to those who have come up with especially good ideas, solutions, suggestions for improvement. The only thing better than getting a "pat on the back" is receiving it from the President in front of your fellow members and friends.
- Look for <u>opportunities</u> to introduce your top-performing team members to higher <u>office</u> so that effective team building and positive recognition can occur.
- Establish a special 'bulletin board' in your club bulletin; use it exclusively to recognize high performing team members through pictures, thank you notes, letters, memos, etc.
- Where appropriate, <u>send a 'letter of appreciation'</u> to a team member's family thanking them for their understanding and support when a member has put in long hours of their free time or has been away from home for an extended period taking training or other time needed for their position.
- Refer to people by name. The most welcome words in the English language are the words that constitute a person's name. Whenever you can, call people by their names - and be sure you pronounce the name correctly.
