The Lions are now playing catch up and more screeners are needed than before. Lions clubs are changing kids lives everyday by catching eye issues even before kids would be screened in school. Lives are being changed by catching eye issues early and allowing children to see better to learn. There are many different issues that effect a child's eyes which are correctible if issues are found early enough. Lions we can change lives with these screenings and we have.

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KidSight Certified Training Class has been scheduled for Lions in our District 5M7 on Saturday, April 9th!! The Certified Screening

training will be presented in a zoom format. You have the ability to join the training from your own home via a zoom link to be sent later. LAURA'S STORY



Laura's hearing loss as an adult didn't keep her from enjoying life and exploring new things. As a wife, mother of four, employee and volunteer, she kept very busy. She even learned to salsa dance by following the beat of the music through the vibrations on the floor. Then she received cochlear implants at University of Minnesota Medical Center, and everything changed.

Patients with cochlear implants have to re-associate the sounds they perceive with their auditory memory, and they use visual cues in the process. As Laura explains, "Engineered hearing is very different. For example, I couldn't tell the difference between the faucet running and my dog lapping water. Making the visual connection helped."

She even had to re-learn to dance. When she could hear the music, she had to train herself differently. It took hours of listening to the music and practicing dancing at home in her living room. Her positive attitude and determination paid off—she continues to dance and assists the instructor, too.

Thanks to all the Lions who donate to the Minnesota Lions Hearing Foundation. You are helping to change the lives of many with hearing loss—and changing the world.

Rebecca and Hearing Assist Dog Jasper

Training her fourth successful successor assistance dog has been an adventure for Becky Thomas, who was partnered with three dogs from Can Do Canines before Jasper came into her life.

It all started back in the early 2000s. Becky's father had been a Lion in Ham Lake, and the

club had done some fundraising for Can Do Canines. Having learned about their assistance dogs, he suggested that Becky apply for a Hearing Assist Dog, and her journey began!

Jasper, now a 5-year-old miniature Australian Shepherd, has been with Becky since he was 12 weeks old. Becky loved her previous Hearing Assist Dog, a mini-Aussie named Caremyl, so she purchased Jasper from the same breeder who had donated Caremyl to Can Do Canines. Her goal to train him as a Hearing Assist Dog worked perfectly because Jasper joined the family as his female predecessor was easing into retirement. Jasper watched Caremyl's alert work and would copy her behaviors, eventually taking over the job while she napped. Becky continued training with him to sharpen his assistance dog behavioral and public skills. After years of an evolving assistance dog experience with the organization, Becky was still nervous about being accepted with Jasper because she knew it took a lot of work to succeed as an owner-provided team.

Becky is late-deafened; she grew up hard of hearing until she was about 21, when she lost most of her hearing. Even though she was accepting of the change, she got frustrated with missing innumerable important sounds, and she felt her independence slipping away. She relied on people all the time, but others wouldn't always let her know of a sound because they simply didn't realize just how much she needed their help. Her first Can Do Canines dog was placed while she was living alone and had to use a lot of unreliable adaptive equipment. Now, she has a family that she gets to take care of rather than depending on them to communicate environmental noises to her, thanks to Jasper's enthusiastic alert skills.

Becky calls Jasper her "wild child" and loves seeing his lightbulb moments when he gets a behavior right. She says, "I enjoy the challenge of his high energy because it makes me grow as a trainer." Jasper alerts Becky to the microwave, the phone, a knock at the door, the smoke alarm, her children when they call her name, and a falling item. After prompting her with the touch of his paw, he rushes to the source of the sound to let her know what needs attention. Another special skill he learned was to wake up Becky when her lamp alarm starts flashing in the morning.

Becky's family and friends are so happy for Jasper to be a part of her world, helping to expand it for her. She also feels "more included and safe" thanks to his vigilant presence. He's even been alerting to new sounds they had not trained for, and she didn't know existed until he responded to the noise. Without Jasper, Becky says she would be constantly frustrated because she would be unaware of noises and missing information. Life would be a dangerous mystery of unknown sounds, but Becky explains, "[Jasper] fills in that puzzle for me."

ENVIRONMENTAL NEWS

OUR ENVIRONMENT faces several problems and many of these seem to be worsening with time, bringing us into a time of a true environmental crisis It is therefore be-

coming increasingly important to raise awareness of the existence of these issues, a well as what can be done to reduce their negative impact. Some of the key issues are:

- Pollution. Pollution of the air, water and soil caused by toxins such as plastics, heavy metals and nitrates, caused by factors such as toxins and gases released by factories, combustion of fossil fuels, acid rain, oil spill and industrial waste.
- 2] Global Warming. The emission of greenhouse gases due to human activity causes global warming, which in turn causes an increase in temperature that then leads to rising sea levels, melting of polar ice caps, flash floods and desertification.
- 3] Overpopulation. We are facing a shortage of resources such as food, water and fuel to sustain the rising global population, particularly in developing countries. Intensive agriculture attempting to lessen the problem actually leads to more damage through the use of chemical fertilizers, pesticides, and insecticides.
- 4] Waste Disposal. An excessive amount of waste is produced and dumped in the oceans. Nuclear waste is particularly dangerous, as well as plastic and electronic waste.
- 5] Ocean acidification. The increase in the production of carbon dioxide by humans causes the oceans' acidity to rise, which has a negative impact on marine life.
- 6] Loss of biodiversity. Species and habitats are becoming extinct due to human activity. This causes an imbalance in natural processes like pollination and poses a threat to ecosystems; coral reef destruction is particularly affected.
- 7] Deforestation. Loss of trees in order to make space for residential, industrial or commercial projects means that less oxygen is produced and temperature and rainfall are affected.
- 8] Ozone layer depletion. Pollution caused by chlorofluorocarbons [CFCs] in the air creates a hole in the ozone layer, which protects the early from harmful UV radiation.
- 9] Acid Rain. Pollutants in the atmosphere such as sulfur dioxide and nitrogen oxides cause acid rain, which has a negative consequences for humans, wildlife, and aquatic species.

10] Public health issues. Lack of clean water is one of the leading environmental problems currently. Pollutants in the air also cause issues such as respiratory disease and cardiovascular disease.

HERE ARE A FEW IMPORTANT DATES IN APRIL

1st April – Aprils Fools' Day April Fools' Day is also known as All Fools' Day and is celebrated for centuries but its origins are uncertain. According to some historians, it was first celebrated in 1852, when France switched from the Julian calendar to the Gregorian calendar and some say that it is related to the turn of the seasons.

2nd April - Good Friday

This year Good Friday is celebrated on 2nd April, This day is considered an auspicious day in Christianity. Good Friday is observed by Christians to commemorate the crucifixion of Jesus Christ and is observed on the Friday before Easter Sunday. On this occasion, people observe fast visit the church and remember the sacrifice of Jesus Christ. It is also known as Black Friday, Holy Friday, Great Friday, or Easter Friday

17 April - Easter Festival

Easter festival commemorates the resurrection of Jesus from the dead and is celebrated across the world. It begins from Lent and ends with Holy Week, which includes Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and finally Easter Sunday. In Latin Easter is known as Pascha. It is celebrated annually but the date of the festival is not fixed, it varies every year.
