# GST REPORT FOR 2022 MIDWINTER CONVENTION



As the Global Service Team Coordinator, I would like to take this opportunity to thank all the Lions & Leos in our District 5M7 for the service work they have done since July 1st, 2021.

The goal for the year, as set by the Global Action Team, is to have 79% of the Lions & Leos clubs reporting their service projects to Lions Clubs International. As of 11:30AM January 21, 2022, we have 59% of the clubs reporting their service activity. This is up substantially from last year's 42% at years end. Being the Global Service Team Coordinator I would like to see our reporting hit 79% and beyond. Currently there are 24 clubs not reporting any service activity. I will contact these clubs and work with them to hopefully get the service projects reported.

Once this is completed, I wish to move on to ways of exchanging information on new and current fundraising activities in the district. I would like to share information on activities that have worked well for clubs and those that have bombed as well, then clubs can review the outcomes and determine if any of these projects would work for them. Remember, membership growth and service work go hand in hand.

Once again, I want to thank all the Lions and Leos for their service activities. Remember the Lions slogan "We Serve" and International President Douglas X. We reviewed the requirements from Lions Clubs International (shown below) and found that a candidate did NOT meet the BASIC requirements to be qualified for a position. That is why the candidate was not acceptable for the election

\*Candidate has submitted sufficient evidence showing that he/she has met the following Requirements:

\*Candidate is an Active Member in good standing of a chartered Lions Club in Good Standing\* in his/her single or sub-district.

\*Candidate endorsed by his/her Lions Club or a majority of the Lions Clubs in the District.

(It is to be understood that the Candidate should provide the motion, second, if the motion carried or not, and minutes from regular club meeting where the Club is supporting and sponsoring the candidate for office)

\*Club President: Year Served

(It is to be understood that the Candidate should have been a successful club president)

\*Club Board of Directors: Two (2) Years Served

\*District Cabinet (check one)

\*Zone or Region Chairperson Year Served

\*With none of the above being accomplished concurrently

\*The Candidate is required to serve as Club President before Zone Chair in that order and not concurrently

We have reviewed this checklist and certify that the candidate listed has not met the requirements for Second Vice District Governor in accordance with the International By-Laws, Article IX, Section 6(c).

## A CLEANER FUTURE.....

Legislative changes and consumer pressure could certainly create more of a mar-



for at least some of the plastic that is now going straight into incinerators and landfills. A legal requirement or company commitments to use more recycled material in plastic products, including those made of less frequently recycled plastics, could create incentives for manufacturers to make more recyclable products and for recycling facilities to do a better job sorting, processing, and actually recycling that material.

The high demand for type 1 plastic used in PET beverage bottles is largely due to consumers pressuring beverage companies to improve recycling processes and lawmakers requiring them to use a certain percentage of recycled plastic in their products. A California law passed last year requires beverage bottles to be made of 15% recycled plastic which will increase to 25% by 2025 and 50% by 2030. Requirements like these force manufacturers to change the makeup of their products, to use more recyclable plastic or more environmentally friendly materials.

Consumers can change and push a market! Plastic companies are actively looking into better recycling methods and how to design plastics to be more easily recyclable because they know this is such an important consumer issue. There is support for all plastic packaging to contain at least 30% recyclable material by 2030.

Another part of the solution is to extend producer responsibility [EPR] which would require plastic makers and sellers to be responsible in some way for the life cycle of their products, including cleanup after theya re sold. An EPR system in jBritish Columba increased the share of plastic wast collected for recycling from 42% in 2018 to 52% in 2020.

In 2021 Main became the first state in the U.S. to pass EPR legislation addressing packaging waste. The law will levy fees on companies that create or use packaging; fees will be lower for practices with less environmental impact like using more recyclable materials. The fees will also be used to fun local recycling efforts. Oregon and six other states have EPR bills in the works.

Another worthy goal is eliminating single-use plastics, like plastic bags and polystyrene foam. But for this change to happen, the items that replace them have to actually be reused and often. If you go to the grocery store and forget your reusable bag and buys another one, one is creating a more harmful single use item.

Any real shift we consumers need to make rather than avoiding plastic is to evaluate our behavior and move away from unnecessary consump-

tion and living a throwaway lifestyle. Any solution will require the consumer to analyze their own consumption to try and understand what we're consuming and why and whether there are ways to reduce our individual consumption and that's a tall order for people. It's much easier to say "I can con-

sume anything I want. I'll just recycle it".

## Minnesota Lions Missions

In April, 2017, while on a exploratory trip to Cuba, I was asked to start a Mission Group in Minnesota to conduct eyeglass missions to Guatemala. I began by contacting the District Governor in Guatemala and about that time one of the Wisconsin Lions Mission members volunteered to help me. We went to Guatemala, met the District Governor and made some other contacts. After a lot of work including Council of Governor meetings, conventions, meetings with the Wisconsin Lions Missions, we had our first mission organized.

We had 8 Lions from Minnesota and 15 from the established Wisconsin Lions Missions. We improved the sight and improved the lives of about 2300 people. When we arrived on the site the first morning, the line of people waiting was about 3 blocks long. It was like that every day. By the way, Guatemala has the second poorest economy in our hemisphere. We returned to the U.S. on the 23rd of Feb. 2020.
