Happy Holidays Lions and Leos!

"Tis the season" to be jolly and I feel especially jolly and fortunate! I've had the opportunity to take two incredible trips that were life-changing.

On November 9th I left for Guatemala City to join 24 Lions from Minnesota and Wisconsin who volunteered for the Minnesota Lions Missions trip. Our mission site was Santa Lucia Milpas Altas in the Sacatepéquez region of Guatemala. The New Century Lions of Guatemala City and Lions from Antigua and San Lucas were our hosts and helped us with all the arrangements. They did an incredible job handling the local logistics and meeting our every need. They were amazing!

We provided nearly 1800 children and adults with glasses over a 4-day period. The impact that a simple pair of glasses can have in changing a life is immeasurable. In addition to the vision screening, the local Lions performed diabetes and hypertension screenings. Our Dr. Jim Molde and two Guatemalan optometrists screened patients for more severe vision problems and started a referral network for a cataract surgery team who will come in May of 2025.

On Friday afternoon, November 15, we returned to Guatemala City where the New Century Lions treated us to a farewell dinner and closing ceremony. It was a very successful mission, so much so that we have already been invited to return next year. This is the second mission trip I've been on and I can't wait to go back next year. For me, these mission trips are life-changing. If you would like to participate in a mission trip please reach out to me. I'd love for you to join our team of volunteers.

On Saturday, August 24th, I had the privilege of visiting the Leader Dogs for the Blind Campus in Rochester Hills, Michigan. Me and over eighty 1st Vice District Governors were in attendance. Annually, Leader Dogs invites 1VDGs to visit this incredible organization that is life-changing and life-saving. Their mission is to empower people who are blind or visually impaired with lifelong skills for safe and independent daily travel.

I had the opportunity to tour the campus and experienced what it was like to be blind. On several occasions we were blindfolded and experienced walking with a human guide, walking with a white cane and being led by a guide dog. We also had dinner in the dark! Needless to say, I didn't eat very much at dinner. When I removed my blindfold, a good portion of my meal was on the table!



At dinner, Timothy Cuneio and his leader dog, Glacier joined us. Timothy shared his story and had us in tears. He was diagnosed with retinitis pigmentosa when he was 12 years old and over time his vision continued to deteriorate. In 2018 he lost his job and wasn't able to get employment and felt his life was over. He was extremely depressed and considered suicide, Fortunately, he heard about Leader Dogs



and completed the Orien-

tation, Mobility and Guide Dog programs and received his amazing dog, Glacier. Leader Dogs saved his life. Timothy is now a co-host of Leader Dogs Taking the Lead podcast and a Leader Dog Ambassador traveling across the country sharing his story.

After visiting Leader Dogs and learning that they provide all their services including transportation, mobility training and a guide dog **free** to individuals that are blind or visually impaired, I will definitely be a Leader Dogs Ambassador! I encourage you and your club to support this vital organization.

I wish you and yours a very happy holiday season and I look forward to seeing you at our Mid-Winter Convention, January 24-26 at the Kelly Inn, St. Cloud.

Our Lions KidSight State Fair Director Dennis Kelly sent this message:

Good morning, Lions and friends. Thank you all for your hard work and dedication that made this year's State Fair project a great success. You screened 3,158 kids for a new record in this the sixth year of this project. 325 were referred for evaluation by an eye care professional.

You should be proud that you were a part of changing their lives. I hope that you will consider volunteering again next year and spread the word we always need more help.

Out of the 3,158 kids, District 5M7 screened 451 children with 37 referrals!

WHAT'S HAPPENING NOW?

We have been busy the first half of the year (July 1 to December 18, 2024). We have had 14 Lions Clubs screen a total of 5,210 children with 622 of them being referred to eye care professionals. Each district has been given a challenge to have at least 50% of their clubs actively screening kids. We are 12 clubs shy of this goal. Please contact us if you would like us to come and talk to your club or if you would like us to help do screenings at events you have. WE REALLY WOULD LIKE TO MEET THIS CHALLENGE BUT NEED YOUR HELP!

Hearing Foundation News— New Hearing Screening Devices

The Minnesota Hearing Foundation is in the process of rolling out a new hearing screening program that will be available to all Lions clubs in the multiple.

The foundation has recently purchased one hearing screening devices for each of the 11 Lions district in our state. The devices are easy to use with purpose of helping to screen individuals who potentially have hearing deficiencies. The plan is to make at least two devices available to clubs who would like to offer hearing screening in their communities. Individual Lions clubs will have numerous opportunities to help screen for hearing in a variety of different formats. Some clubs may use the devices to help the schools screen students, other clubs may offer screening to different organizations in their communities, such as senior citizen groups, local service organizations, local business and their employees, or the screening may be built into various local Lions events.

Individual Lions clubs and some Districts have already decided to purchase additional devices to help service their local needs. Cost per machine is approximately \$2,000.

More information regarding this new program will be available at breakout sessions at our Mid Winter convention in January.

MN Lions Diabetes Foundation



THANK YOU to all of our 5m7 clubs and individuals who generously support the MN Lions Diabetes Foundation (MLDF)! Every dollar counts to further our mission as lions for our foundation. Our mission states, "The Minnesota Lions Diabetes Foundation, Inc. is dedicated to improving the quality of life for people with diabetes by funding research to cure diabetes, providing education and sponsoring preventive health activities."

Please remember MLDF when you are discussing your donations for the Parade of Green in your clubs. The MLDF is funded by donations like ours in partnership with other entities.

Our most recent foundation meeting took place on December 7th in St Cloud. It is there that our foundation voted to fund certain projects being done by our researchers who are working so hard to find a cure for diabetes. Our MN Lions Diabetes Foundation has chosen to fund a few projects which our researchers have proposed.

- Survival of Pancreatic Islet Cells and Kidney Transplants without the need for drugs that suppress the recipient's immune system. \$50,000
- Control the Inflammatory immune cells that destroy the insulin producing cells causing type 1 Diabetes, leaving the remaining immune system to fight viruses, bacteria and cancer. \$75,000
- Identify potential patients currently on human organ transplant lists who could benefit from future clinical trials of xenotransplantation of pig cells, tissue or organs for the treatment of Diabetes. \$75,000

This funding is a total of 200,000. MLDF is hoping to fund even more proposals from our researchers when we meet in the Spring.

When your club donates \$1,000.00, it becomes eligible to give a Dream Catcher Award. Your 5m7 trustees Lions Mike Edwards and Judy Herrala have records of the totals that each club has donated to the foundation. We can help you determine how much more your club needs to get to that \$1,000.00. Please ask us for your club donation totals.

We would like to share some SERVICE PROJECT ideas for diabetes that your club can very easily do.

Donate a diabetes magazine subscription or diabetes-related books to your local library. Sponsor a child to attend a diabetes camp and/or supply a camp with needed supplies.

Post monthly notices on your club website and social media, sharing available community resources for people with or at risk of diabetes.

Organize a Strides: Lions for Diabetes Awareness event in your community.

Develop a list of patient resources and services and distribute them to Lions and the public. Find a Diabetes educator to visit your local senior citizens group.

Hand out the Diabetes Risk Assessment to the public at your club events.

TEAM SHEEHAN CHARITABLE FOUNDATION UPDATE DECEMBER 18, 2024

The mission of the TEAM Sheehan Charitable Foundation (501c3) is to empower MD5M Lions clubs to provide greater service by boosting their ability to complete community projects with matching grants.

The first two Matching Grants were awarded during the August 27th Board Meeting. A matching grant for \$1,875 awarded to the Princeton Lions Club in District 5M8 to assist the Club in purchasing a new commercial refrigerator for the Princeton Food Pantry. The grant for \$3,000 was awarded to the Sauk Rapids Lions Club in District 5M8 to help them commission a 6-foot Lion Sculpture to be placed in the Lions Sculpture Garden in Sauk Rapids.



Some clarifications have been made.

1. The Lions Club putting forth the grant application is required to contribute one half of the matching amount requested from the Club's own fundraising account. For example, if a Club is asking for a matching grant of \$3,000, the Club needs to contribute \$1,500 from their own fund.

2. When a grant application is not awarded during the quarter it was submitted, it will need to be resubmitted and updated for the next quarter for further consideration. It will not automatically carry over. There is no limit for how many times the application can be submitted

3. The grant checks will be mailed to the District Director whose club is being awarded the grant. A photograph of the completed project should be sent to the foundation.

In November, three grants were approved for second quarter. The TSCF supplied matching funds with the Kimball Lions for a device to enhance the vision of a young woman. The second grant went towards improving the Age Friendly Park in the Lamberton Lions area. The third grant helped purchase a splash pad for a park sponsored by the Buffalo Lions.

During our December meeting, we discussed some upcoming updates for the website. The online grant application indicates the need to request the application from the District Board Member.
