If you are responsible for reporting service, accessing member data and other key data, your access will remain the same as always. If all goes as planned, from May 13 and beyond, if you are accessing the previous portal, you will be automatically redirected to the new Lion Portal. Please be aware that these dates are subject to change. If LCI determines they require more time to ensure the new portal is functioning optimally, the dates may be adjusted accordingly. 



I'd like to thank the Columbus Lions Club for inviting me to their club meeting to talk about Minnesota Lions Vision Foundation. To my surprise the Columbus City Council and the Mayor were attending the meeting! I show a short video on Lions Gift of Sight Tour. Because of Covid tours of Lions Gift of Sight have been put on hold for the time being.

Lions Macular Degeneration Center: Age-related macular degeneration is the leading cause of vision loss in Americans 60 and older. A disease that causes damage to the macula (the part of the retina responsible for central vision) age-related macular degeneration (AMD) erodes our ability to recognize faces, read, view a painting, or perform intricate tasks. Over 3 million people in the United States will have AMD by the year 2021.

The Minnesota Lions Vision Foundation and the University of Minnesota changing the outlook for those who suffer from macular degeneration. Together, they established the Minnesota Lions Macular Degeneration Research and Rehabilitation Center (the MAC) and the Lions Advanced Retinal Imaging Center. The MAC is a collaboration of people, organizations, and resources working to find new treatments and a cure for macular degeneration.

Retina Clinic: University of Minnesota ophthalmologists who specialize in vitreoretinal conditions are dedicated to examining and aggressively treating patients with macular degeneration.

Visual Rehabilitation Center: This state-of-the-art lowvision center uses advanced technology and education to help people remain independent in the home, school, workplace, and community. Visual rehabilitation specialists teach people with low vision they still have.

Macular Degeneration Research: Laboratories dedicated to macular degeneration and retinal research are housed in the Lions Research Building. Scientists study many aspects of retinal disease, including the biology of aging. They collaborate with colleagues from other University departments, as well as from around the country. Research is critical to finding new medical options to treat and cure macular degeneration.

Karen and Ulla

"I used to fall 2 or 3 times a week," says Karen, referring to the effects of having her leg amputated below the right knee in 2020.

In late 2013, a joint in Karen's foot collapsed, prompting a series of reconstruction surgeries—several of which were unsuccessful. She then developed type 2 complex regional pain syndrome, a neurological condition associated with intense or prolonged pain. By the time the amputation was necessary, mobility was a real challenge. "I had not walked in six years, Karen explains. "It was like having to learn how to walk again, and now I'm having an amputation. So I'm having to maneuver and learn all those skills to get me to walking again."

Thus, all the falling. Not to mention the frustration. Karen recalls, "I actually had become a shut-in. I stopped doing anything, going anywhere. I was giving up on life."

That's when Karen's husband, Calvin, told her about a conversation he had with his boss, whose wife, Hannah, was in the application process for a Can Do Canine. Based on their experience, he suggested the same course of action for Karen. Learning about an upcoming open house, Karen attended. "Once I went to the open house, I did see where having an assistance dog would help me very much in my everyday life and routines."

Karen promptly applied but felt a bit nervous when, about nine months later, she was told she was matched with a female yellow Lab mix named Ulla (YOU-la). "I was hoping she would like me. When I saw her, that was it. She walked through the door with the trainer. I called her name, and she wagged her tail and came right to me, and that was it at that point. That sealed the deal."

It's as if they both fell for each other. Yet, it's Karen who is falling less now, saying that Ulla helps her by picking up items she drops. Whether Karen is using her manual wheelchair, her walker, her cane, or her electric scooter, Ulla is close at hand, ready to help—even bringing some of those mobility aids to get Karen moving. Karen explains that only once in the three months that she has had Ulla so far has she stumbled to the ground. "I had fallen in the hall. My wheelchair was in the living room, and the way it was turned, Ulla was able to tug it right to me." Without Ulla, Karen would have had to crawl—an especially painful and unadvised activity with her replaced left knee. "It's just been so good not to fall as much," remarks Karen.

Ulla does more than just keep Karen upright, though. She loves getting the phone for Karen and grabbing a bath towel out of a drawer for her. She also helps with laundry,

pulling clothes out of the dryer, placing them in a basket, and tugging the basket for Karen. "All the tasks that she can perform really help me get through my day much easier than I could have without her. Without her, I would have had tons of falls, not being able to walk far, not going outside walking at all. So she has changed my life for the better."

Their life together also includes going to appointments and listening to music. Karen is a reading enthusiast too... but luckily, a flexible one, as it is Ulla who makes the selection from the bookcase. Karen discloses, "Whatever book she retrieves is the choice for the day."

Karen's partnership with Ulla is a bit of a fairytale, bringing Karen to tears. "I love Ulla so much. She's been an angel in my life to be able to help me so much daily. She makes my life so worth living." Everything is really falling into place to make this a special long-term partnership

Lions and Leos

In the last of our three-part series, we'll continue to look at our biggest environmental problems affecting us in 2024. I hope you've found this series interesting and enlightening.

9. Melting Ice Caps and Sea Level Rise: Today, sea levels are rising more than twice as quickly as they did for most of the 20th century as a result of increasing temperatures on Earth. Seas are now rising an average of 3.2 mm per year globally and they will continue to grow up to about 0.7 meters by the end of this century. In the Arctic, the Greenland Ice Sheet poses the greatest risk for sea levels because melting land ice is the main cause of rising sea levels. Last year's summer triggered the loss of 60 billion tons of ice from Greenland, enough to raise global sea levels by 2.2mm in just two months. According to satellite data, the Greenland ice sheet lost a record amount of ice in 2019: an average of a million tons per minute throughout the year, one of the biggest environmental problems that has cascading effects. If the entire Greenland ice sheet melts, sea level would rise by six meters.

The Antarctic continent contributes about 1 millimeter per year to sea level rise, which is one-third of the annual global increase. According to 2023 data, the continent has lost approximately 7.5 trillion tons of ice since 1997. Additionally, the last fully intact ice shelf in Canada in the Arctic recently collapsed, having lost 40% of its area over a two-day period.

Sea level rise will have a devastating impact on those living in coastal regions. Sea level rise this century could flood coastal areas that are now home to 340 million to 480 million people, forcing them to migrate to safer areas and contributing to overpopulation and strain of resources in the areas they migrate to. Bangkok (Thailand), Ho Chi Minh City (Vietnam), Manila (Philippines), and Dubai (United Arab Emirates) are among the cities most at risk of sea level rise and flooding.

10. Ocean Acidification: Global temperature rise has not only affected the surface, but it is the main cause of ocean acidification. Our oceans absorb about 30% of carbon dioxide that is released into the Earth's atmosphere. As higher concentrations of carbon emissions are released thanks to human activities such as burning fossil fuels as well as effects of global climate change such as increased rates of wildfires, so do the amount of carbon dioxide that is absorbed back into the sea.

The smallest change in the pH scale can have a significant impact on the acidity of the ocean. Ocean acidification has devastating impacts on marine ecosystems and species, its food webs, and provoke irreversible changes in habitat quality. Once pH levels reach too low, marine organisms such as oysters, their shells and skeleton could even start to dissolve.

However, one of the biggest environmental problems from ocean acidification is coral bleaching and subsequent coral reef loss. This is a phenomenon that occurs when rising ocean temperatures disrupt the relationship between the reefs and algae that lives within it, driving away the algae and causing coral reefs to lose their natural vibrant colors. Some scientists have estimated coral reefs are at risk of being completely wiped by 2050. Higher acidity in the ocean would obstruct coral reef systems' ability to rebuild their exoskeletons and recover from these coral bleaching events. Some studies have also found that ocean acidification can be linked as one of the effects of plastic pollution in the ocean. The accumulating bacteria and microorganisms derived from plastic garbage dumped in the ocean to damage marine ecosystems and contribute towards coral bleaching.

11. Food and Water Insecurity: Rising temperatures and unsustainable farming practices have resulted in increasing water and food insecurity. Globally, more than 68 billion tons of top-soil is eroded every year at a rate 100 times faster than it can naturally be replenished. Laden with biocides and fertilizer, the soil ends up in waterways where it contaminates drinking water and protected areas downstream.

Exposed and lifeless soil is more vulnerable to wind and water erosion due to lack of root system that hold it together. A key contributor to soil erosion is over-tilling which short term will increase production but is physically destructive to the soil's structure and in the long-term leads to soil compaction, loss of fertility and surface crust formation that worsens topsoil erosion. With the global population expected to reach 9 billion people by midcentury, projections are that global food demand may increase by 70% by 2050.

Around the world, more than 820 million people do not get enough to eat. It is clear that there is an impending global food security emergency that could have long term impacts on hundreds of millions of adults and children. Countries need to rethink their food systems and encouraged more sustainable farming practices.

In terms of water security, only 3% of the world's water is freshwater, and two-thirds of that is tucked away in frozen glaciers or otherwise unavailable for our use. As a result, some 1.1 billion people worldwide lack access to water, and a total of 2.7 billion find water scarce for at least one month of the year. By 2025, two-thirds of the world's population may face water shortages.

12. Fast Fashion and Textile Waste: The global demand for fashion and clothing has risen at an unprecedented rate that the fashion industry now accounts for 10% of global carbon emissions, becoming one of the biggest environmental problems of our time.

Fashion alone produces more greenhouse gas emissions than both the aviation and shipping sectors combined, and nearly 20% of global wastewater, or around 93 billion cubic meters from textile dyeing. The world generated an estimated 92 million tons of textiles waste every year and that number is expected to soar up to 134 million tons a year by 2030. Discarded clothing and textile waste, most of which is non-biodegradable, ends up in landfills, while microplastics from clothing materials such as polyester, nylon, polyamide, acrylic and other synthetic materials, is leeched into soil and nearby water sources. Monumental amounts of clothing textile are also dumped in less developed countries as seen with Chile's Atacama, the driest desert in the world, where at least 39,000 tons of textile waste from other nations are left there to rot.

This rapidly growing issue is exacerbated by the everexpanding fast fashion business model, in which companies relies on cheap and speedy production of low quality clothing to meet the latest and newest trends. Unfortunately a majority of businesses around the world have yet to address their roles in climate change.

13. Overfishing: Over three billion people around the world rely on fish as their primary source of protein. About 12% of the world relies upon fisheries in some form or another, with 90% of these being small-scale fishermen – think a small crew in a boat, not a ship, using small nets or even rods and reels and lures not too different from the kind you probably use. Of the 18.9 million fishermen in the world, 90% of them fall under the latter category.

Most people consume approximately twice as much food as they did 50 years ago and there are four times as many people on earth as there were at the close of the 1960s. This is one driver of the 30% of commercially fished waters being classified as being 'overfished'. This means that the stock of available fishing waters is being depleted faster than it can be replaced. Overfishing comes with detrimental effects on the environment, including increased algae in the water, destruction of fishing communities, ocean littering as well as extremely high rates of biodiversity loss.

14. Cobalt Mining: Cobalt is quickly becoming the defining example of the mineral conundrum at the heart of the renewable energy transition. As a key component of battery materials that power electric vehicles (EVs), cobalt is facing a sustained surge in demand as decarbonization efforts progress. The world's largest cobalt supplier is the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC), where it is estimated that up to a fifth of the production is produced through small scale miners not affiliated with a mining company.

Cobalt mining is associated with dangerous workers' exploitation and other serious environmental and social issues. Southern regions of the DRC are not only home to cobalt and copper, but also large amounts of uranium where scientists have noted high radioactivity levels. In addition, mineral mining, similar to other industrial mining efforts, often produces pollution that leaches into neighboring rivers and water sources.

15. Soil Degradation: Organic matter is a crucial component of soil as it allows it to absorb carbon from the atmosphere. Plants absorb CO2 from the air naturally and effectively through photosynthesis and part of this carbon is stored in the soil as soil organic carbon (SOC). Healthy soil has a minimum of 3-6% organic matter. However, almost everywhere in the world, the content is much lower than that.

About 40% of the planet's soil is degraded. Soil degradation refers to the loss of organic matter, changes in its structural condition and/or decline in soil fertility and it is often the result of human activities, such as traditional farming practices including the use of toxic chemicals and pollutants. If business as usual continued through 2050, experts project additional degradation of an area almost the size of South America. But there is more to it. If we do not change our reckless practices and step up to preserve soil health, food security for billions of people around the world will be irreversibly compromised, with an estimated 40% less food expected to be produced in 20 years' time despite the world's population projected to reach 9.3 billion people.

In addition to supporting replanting efforts on certified sustainably harvested DNR-managed land, your donations to the Future Forest Fund help replace trees lost to disease, fire, storms, insects, and other elements. Foresters plant millions of seedlings on state lands each year. They then nurture, protect, and ensure those trees are wisely used.

Forest facts: Our Minnesota State Forests aren't just beautiful to look at, they play a critical role in our way of life. For example:

- One acre of trees, which is about the size of a football field, produces enough oxygen each year for 18 people. Each year, an acre of trees can remove roughly the same amount of carbon emitted by two cars.
- On a hot day, a tree in full leaf can give off 900 gallons (7,500 pounds) of water vapor into the air, which is equivalent to cooling as much air as six room-size air conditioners.

- a) if the logo has a red tongue, it is the wrong logo,
- b) if the logo is multi-colored and not the two-colored version, it is the wrong logo,
- c) if the logo is not smooth across the top, it is the wrong logo, and $\,$
- d) if the I and the L in the word International are illegible, it is the wrong logo.






