STATE FAIR REPORT

We had 40 clubs working this year from Districts 5M1, 5M2, 5M5, & amp; 5M7 for a total of 288 scheduled volunteer spots over the 12 days of the fair. That comes out to 24 spots per day over the three booths 2, 3, and 4 with 12 per shift. I would like to welcome the Arlington Lions, Brooklyn Center Lions, Plymouth Rotary and Rivers of Hope of Elk River in addition to the Leos from Cambridge and Patrick Henry that stepped up and took spots this past year. Also a few people and clubs really stepped up and helped out; Monica Sage from St Louis Park, the Elk River Lions, my traveling companion Bev Edling from Clear Lake, the Edina Club, the Ham Lake Club and Karen Strong.

Can Do Canines to Host Open House November 11

Can Do Canines invites you to attend an open house on Saturday, November 11, from 12-2 p.m., at its Can Do Canines campus (9440 Science Center Drive, New Hope, Minnesota). Potential volunteers, clients, or anyone who might be interested in supporting the organization are invited to attend to learn how an assistance dog changes the life of a person with a disability.

Through a self-guided tour, attendees will be able to watch a trainer working with an assistance dog, hear from a volunteer dog host, talk with staff members from the volunteer



department, pose questions to client services coordinators about the application process, and meet graduate teams from each of the five types of areas Can Do Canines trains dogs: hearing, mobility, seizure, diabetes, and childhood autism. The assistance dog demonstrations will be held at 12:15, 1:55, and 1:35, and the dog host will speak at 12:15, 12:35, and 1:15.

There is no pre-registration for this event, though attendees will be asked to share some contact information when arriving.

The program is personalized for each client. Thanks to sophisticated breeding, puppy raising and dog training programs, we are able to match clients with a dog that best fits your lifestyle, travel pace, physical size, stamina and other considerations. Clients have the opportunity to train with their guide dog in a wide variety of situations to fit current and future needs, including urban, suburban and rural locations; college campuses; busy stores and malls; public transit and other environments.

The Guide Dog program at Leader Dog is available for people who are: legally blind, at least 16 years old, able to care for a dog, efficient with orientation and mobility skills We offer our Guide Dog program in a variety of formats: on-campus training (our most popular option), in-home delivery, flex training, urban training, warm weather training, and training specifically for individuals who are Deaf-Blind.



Natalie and Jacqui

Out of the shadows and into the light. That's how Natalie describes the impact of a Hearing Assist Dog on her life.

Natalie was born with severe to profound bilateral sensorineural hearing loss, but it wasn't diagnosed until she was 2 years old. She began wearing hearing aids at age 3. Her mother helped her catch up with language development and American Sign Language (ASL) classes, and at school, she had an ASL interpreter. But Natalie resisted using ASL and struggled to fit into the hearing world.

By young adulthood, her hearing had declined, and she was becoming more withdrawn. She agreed to get a cochlear implant in her left ear and a hearing aid in the right. Nevertheless, she felt isolated.

"Before a Hearing Assist Dog, a typical day was a cycle of fear, anxiety, planning, isolation, and exhaustion," Natalie explains. She relied on family and friends to coordinate a few activities they could do together so she wouldn't be alone. But she still wasn't living a full life or pursuing things she most enjoyed, such as outdoor activities.

Her mother suggested that a service dog might give her greater freedom and applied to Can Do Canines on Natalie's behalf. In 2015, a Hearing Assist Dog named Nadia came into Natalie's life. "It was life-changing. Nadia gave me the confidence to live and thrive," she says.

For seven years, she and Nadia worked together, bringing Natalie newfound confidence and independence. And then, heartache. In 2022, Nadia contracted a lifethreatening illness and passed away.

With the loss of Nadia came the loss of confidence and independence. Natalie began to experience the same cycle of fear and isolation she had in the past. She didn't feel safe at home, going to the store, or taking a walk – even with friends – because she couldn't decipher sounds. "I stopped doing the things that brought me joy," she says.

Can Do Canines arranged for another Hearing Assist Dog. Natalie knew it was essential to her quality of life, yet she was still grieving. "When I first received the news about my new Hearing Assist Dog, Jacqui, I was scared to meet her. I was afraid of moving on," she explained.

But when the two met, it was an instant connection. Natalie describes the black Lab, Golden Retriever mix as a loving, sassy, and sophisticated lady with expressive brown eyes and a tail that wags like a propeller going in all directions. But for all that exuberance, Jacqui is also gentle and quiet. When she's alone with Natalie, she doesn't make a sound. Rather, she gets right to work, helping Natalie in countless ways: She alerts her to sounds, such as the timer, smoke alarm, door knock, and alarm clock, as well as helps to retrieve items on the floor. As they continue to work together to master new tasks, Jacqui persists until she gets it right. "In the morning, Jacqui jumps onto my bed to nudge me awake, and then she sticks around to snuggle," Natalie said. "It's the best way to start the day!"

Natalie has noticed a significant change in her mood since Jacqui came into her life. She is waking up with a sense of purpose again, taking walks and playing in the snow. She is also starting to venture out again and is eager to resume her favorite activities, such as hiking, rollerblading, gardening, reading, and taking road trips – all with Jacqui at her side.

Natalie is full of gratitude for the Can Do Canines staff and volunteers who raise and train assistance dogs like Jacqui. "Having a service dog (has) taught me the blessing of my disability: that I am just as capable as anyone else, I don't have to hide in the shadows or live in fear, and I can shine. Thanks to Nadia and now to Jacqui, I'm not just surviving, I'm living my life and learning to thrive."

Gone are the days of blasting away fallen leaves with the powerful scent of exhaust fumes. Instead, we'll have to stick to pumpkin spice as the scent of the season — and explore the numerous benefits of all-electric yard tools, which are quickly becoming mainstream.

In the past few years, over 150 cities have banned gaspowered leaf blowers. As concerns about noise and air pollution only get more serious, it seems likely that more bans on gas-powered yard tools will follow.

Dozens of cities, including Burlington, Vermont, Montclair, New Jersey, and Washington, D.C., have had enough of gas-powered leaf blowers. And even more partial or full bans are on the way — starting next year, you won't be able to buy a gas-powered lawn mower or leaf blower at any stores in California.

The reason? Gas-powered lawn tools make our air pretty freaking nasty. In just a half-hour, a traditional leaf blower can create as much air pollution as a pickup truck driving thousands of miles (cars and trucks feature more efficient engines and catalytic converters). In their place, electric leaf blowers are officially entering the chat. These gadgets come with a ton of benefits, including:

- Cost: Because they use electricity, they're often cheaper to power BUT consideration needs to be given to battery cost and disposal
- Safety: Zero direct air pollution and less overall pollution from the grid
- Peace: They're significantly quieter than gas-powered tools

When it comes to creating smog, gas-powered lawn equipment punches way above its weight class. One example: Operating a commercial leaf blower for an hour generates as much pollution as driving a small car about 1,100 miles, according to the California Air Resources Board.

That pollution — and the noise — are particularly hazardous to the people using the equipment. That's in part because about 30% of the oil-and-gas mix that powers socalled two-stroke engines, which often run tools like leaf blowers and string trimmers, isn't burned. Instead, it gets kicked off in tiny droplets that users of the equipment can then inhale.

Environmental groups have argued that lawns, in general, are the bigger problem. Our collective obsession with emerald-toned backdrops makes grass the largest irrigated crop in the US. It requires enormous amounts of water and synthetic fertilizers — all for something that isn't consumed by anyone but for a few lucky goats.

Some landscapers have objected that going electric can be an expensive switch and have said that newer gas models are quieter. A spokesperson for the nonprofit DC Sustainable Energy Utility, which has offered subsidies to help residents and the lawn companies that operate move to electric garden equipment, said there are challenges with shifting but they don't have to be dealbreakers. Companies can invest in charging infrastructure that goes in the back of a van or a work truck, and they can acquire extra batteries that can be swapped out when other ones run low.

Many landscapers do realize how much nicer the experience is for not only the person operating the equipment, but anybody else who has been subjected to the sound and the fumes of the gas.
