You qualify for RLLI training if you:

- · have an interest in becoming a better Lions member.
- · meeting other Lions and sharing ideas
- have not attended RLLI in the past five years.
- like having FUN!!!!

RLLI Participants are required to:

- · Attend all sessions of the three-day institute.
- · You may commute to RLLI if you attend all sessions and can do so safely.
- Complete pre-assignments prior to beginning of RLLI.
- Pay \$150 participation fee.
- Participants who complete all sessions and required assignments will receive a \$100 rebate upon completion of RLLI.

RLLI will be held at the Hampton Inn & Suites in Bemidji, MN October 13 - 15, 2023.

Room rate is \$119 plus tax

Did you know that in 2022-2023 our district screened 4,967 kids! Out of those, 676 were referrals because some type of vision impairment was detected. That is 676 kids that hopefully see better now because the problem was detected early!

Our goal is to double this number of 2023-2024. How can we do that? By getting more clubs involved and working with the schools in their towns.

Schools are starting up for the 2023-2024 year. Vision screenings will be in full force. There are a few clubs that have a direct line with their schools and are partnering with them to provide KidSight Vision screenings. There a lot more schools in our district that would like to partner with us, all we need are clubs willing to work with them. This is one of the most rewarding service projects a club can do. It is so important to catch vision issues when they are young. If your club is interested in getting more involved with KidSight, please contact us so we can work with you. 



REBEKAH AND CASTLE

Rebekah, who was matched with Seizure Assist Dog Castle in late 2022, has a history with working dogs. She says,

"I had a Golden Retriever growing up as a kid. He was a trained therapy dog." Without knowing this history, Can Do Canines selected Castle for Rebekah, who also happens to be a Golden Retriever. Referring to this coincidence, Rebekah says, "Having Castle is almost like he's living on through her."

Compared to her previous dog, Castle is trained to help Rebekah with new challenges in her life. When Rebekah applied to Can Do Canines, she had what she called a "trifecta" of disorders: postural orthostatic tachycardia syndrome, Ehlers-Danlos syndrome, and mast cell activation syndrome. "Migraines and pseudo-seizures frequently 'compliment' these diagnoses," she adds. On any given day, she might experience chronic fatigue, loss of consciousness from standing up, joint dislocation from leaning down, difficulty with loud noises or flashing lights, and more. She tried to manage these challenges as best she could, but in 2019, a concussion intensified Rebekah's symptoms.


Working toward a bachelor's degree in neuroscience, Rebekah had a full plate, so fatigue, alone, made life difficult. She explains, "When I was trying to live on my own and do full-time school, I slept a lot. And I mean a lot. At my very worst, I slept about 15-18 hours every 24-hour period. I would basically go to the gym (for my blood pressure), go to class, and then sleep the rest of the day, just waking up to cook and do a few assignments."

When she was able to be up and around, unusually low blood pressure often brought fear. It was not uncommon for Rebekah to faint in her apartment, on the sidewalk, on the way to class, or even in class. She says, "I was very careful to sit in places I thought would be 'safe' to pass out; I failed sometimes and would hit my head."

Now, Castle not only helps to keep her safe, but also has given her a new "leash" on life. Once they officially got matched and Castle moved in, Rebekah says, "For the first time in a long time, I was excited to wake up and take on the day... I have a reason to live. I couldn't have answered that before."

Castle is equally excited to be the working dog in Rebekah's life. Rebekah comments, "When Castle looks at me, she looks at me with pure love." Then, when it's time to work, "her teeth literally start chattering out of excitement when she realizes we get to start training." By picking up items for Rebekah, Castle helps minimize Rebekah's episodes. "She also provides visibility," says Rebekah. "In the past, a lot of people thought maybe I was drunk when I was having pre-seizure activity (or passed out). Having Castle around shows, 'Hey! She might need help!" Also, Castle's deep-pressure therapy prevents blood pressure crashes for Rebekah, and the sensory stimulation from petting her fluffy Golden Retriever can help Rebekah snap out of an episode.

Being less scared to live life, Rebekah now takes daily walks, accepts social invitations, and has future plans of living with Castle together in the city. She sums up her new situation, saying, "Castle helps me see a future where I can and will do things. (She) is the reason I have started dreaming big again. I am most grateful for a second chance at life. Last year, I could barely see any future. I thought of my life in terms of endings, not beginnings. Castle is my beginning: to life, to love, to opportunity."

Joe and Wendy Graves from Stanchfield who hosted Tim from Germany during his stay in the states this past July. I had an opportunity to connect with the Graves about their years of hosting



How long have you hosted youth coming with Youth Exchange?

We hosted for the first time with the Youth Exchange in 2018 when we hosted Marius from Denmark. He was wonderful and we enjoyed both getting to know him and spending time with him while we shared our beautiful state. We keep in touch with Marius and all of our former students, and we hope to visit them someday.

How did you discover this opportunity for hosting?

I have very dear friends, Michael and Brenda Reeves, who have been active with this program for many years, so I learned of the program through them. They are active Lions members. I had the chance to meet youths they hosted and thought it would be a good match for our family.

What have you learned from hosting youth from other countries over the years?

I believe we have learned a great deal from the students that have spent time with us. We usually ask each student to cook one meal for our family, and that has been a fun tradition. We now eat Marius Spaghetti, also known as Bolognese sauce, and Eglantine's crepes for example. Also, we get a chance to view our beautiful state through the eyes of others and it has led to us having much deeper appreciation for the state. We do many more family activities in July each year and our kids enjoy that we all take a break from our individual activities and spend more time as a family when our student is here. This has been a wonderful way to share other cultures with our children. And the students are always so respectful and appreciative, that is a wonderful example for my teens.

What advice would you give other potential host families to encourage others to host?

Have a list of ideas for activities and allow the student to pick one or two things from the list so they feel they have input in the activities you choose. We now have a long list of options that I can refer back to and it makes it easier, say if we need to alter plans due to weather. It's really fun if you can hook up with one or two other host families and share activities. We usually do that with the Reeves family and last year a neighbor hosted so we were able to jointly entertain our students, that was really fun.

Anything else you would like others to know?

We initially did a traditional student exchange with a private company that was a full school year in length. While that was also enjoyable, we are a very active family with diverse interests and we found that a full school year was a bit much for us, the month of July is a perfect fit for us. We purposely make it a point to keep our schedules clear, so we have time to do things together during our host month.

We will start taking applications for youth to come to Minnesota for the month of July starting in January 2024. We thank you to Wendy and Joe for opening their homes and adventures for the past six years. Let me know if you want to host this next summer.

Environmental concerns are defined as any change or disturbance to the environment perceived to be deleterious or undesirable. Environmental concerns can be defined as the negative effects of any human activity on the environment. The biological as well as the physical features of the environment are included.

So, to that end, Lions International has added environment to it's list of global causes. The information below is from Lions International.....

THE ENVIROMENT: The Earth sustains human life. That's why LCIF is dedicated to helping Lions take on large-scale ● projects that will create a sustainable and healthy future for generations to come. From recycling programs to ensuring all areas have access to clean water, we're working hard to keep the earth in its best condition. Temperature Up/GDP Down: Average annual .072[™]F global temperature rise = 7.22[%] reduced world GDP per capita by 2100. 500 million people+ live in areas affected by erosion linked to climate change. 7 million lives lost annually from air pollution.

LCIF GRANT AWARDS: From July 2022 to August 2022, LCIF has awarded 3 environment-related grants totaling US\$111,500. Go to the LCI website and view the grants empowering Lions to create a sustainable and healthy future for generations to come.

DCG PROGRAM: District and clubs qualifying for the program will have the option to use earned funds to carry out local projects and access those funds through the submission of a DCG Application or use them as part of the local matching funds component of other LCIF grant program applications.

MATCHING GRANTS: Matching grants are large-scale humanitarian projects that address unmet needs. The project must serve a large population. Grants awarded are between US\$10,000 and US\$100,000.

Matching grants provide capital funding to help establish or expand Lions-initiated humanitarian service projects that address critical and diverse human and social needs around the globe. Funding is prioritized for the equipment and infrastructure needs of such projects. All grant proposals should be humanitarian in nature, in keeping with LCIF's mission: "To support the efforts of Lions clubs and partners in serving communities locally and globally, giving hope and impacting lives through humanitarian service projects and grants." Humanitarian service projects are charitable in nature and include vital health and

human service needs not adequately addressed by governments and other funding sources.

Project examples include but are not limited to:

- Projects impacting the lives of youth in developing countries, including schools, orphanages and centers for street children.
- Projects impacting the lives of the disabled, including physical rehabilitation and the provision of facilities and equipment to help address the specific educational and vocational training needs of the disabled.
- Projects that strengthen access to and improve the provision of medical care in communities, including expanding and equipping charitable or not-for-profit medical facilities.
- Projects to address the needs of at-risk and vulnerable populations in the community, such as expansion of nursing homes, hospices, facilities for the elderly, food banks, and clean water and sanitation installation in developing countries.
- Projects that support long-term disaster reconstruction of important public and community facilities damaged or destroyed by natural disasters after all other LCIF funding has been fully expended (such as major catastrophe grants and designated disaster grants).

The applications for matching grants are due no later than 90 days prior to the start of the Board of Trustees meetings, which take place in January, May, and August.

My goals for the 2023-24 district as environmental chair are as follows:

- ◊ Research environmental issues that would be of interest to readers of the 5m7 Gram.
- Motivate and educate clubs on conducting meaningful environmental and service activities/projects.
- Encourage member participation in their community committees dealing with sustainability and/or environmental issues.
- Encourage clubs to designate an environmental chairperson.
- Provide information from Lions International as available on environmental issues.
- Assist clubs as needed in reporting environmental projects in their club report.

So let's do our part to protect human health and the environment by investing in any means or methods that will work to better our overall health and the health of our communities.



ROBBINSDALE, Minn. -- A Minnesota family is living through unspeakable tragedy after a mother and father were victims of a car crash this weekend.

The family has identified the two victims as Emily and John Gerding. A 20-year-old driver from Minneapolis allegedly ran through a red light and slammed into their minivan Saturday night, killing 34-year-old Emily, and critically injuring her husband, John. Both victims were special education teachers at Coon Rapids Middle School.

According to Robbinsdale police, it all started on 42nd Avenue North near Highway 100 at 8:15 p.m. Saturday night. An officer spotted a white Tesla going 55 mph on the 30 mph road.



The officer followed, eventually turning on

lights and sirens. Police said the driver of the Tesla took off and the officer ended the chase just blocks away from the crash. "The suspect vehicle crossed 36th Avenue North at a very high rate of speed, striking a vehicle traveling on 36th," said Capt. John Elder with the Robbinsdale Police Department.

Police said the suspect was going between 70 and 90 mph when he crashed into the unsuspecting couple. The suspect is expected to survive and is being held on probable cause for criminal vehicular operation.

Emily Gerding had been planning her daughter's Elton John-themed 3rd birthday party. Her family says she was the kind of person who was always making sure everyone was having a good time. "She's the one that I turn to about everything and she was always there for me," said Samantha Pherson, Emily's sister. "She was there for all of us all the time. She was the glue that held our family together." Now, Emily Gerding's two young girls [6 and 3] will grow up without their mother.

"We will carry on as normal as we possibly can so they can be happy little girls like they were before this tragedy," said Linda Darmer, Emily's mother. Darmer says her daughter's 34 years of life were short, but full and happy. Her family will remember her silly personality.

"There was a pool in the backyard (of her aunt's house)," Darmer said. "Instead of visiting with the adults, (Emily) was in the pool having a water fight. Then she brought the water fight to the adults." John Gerding is in critical condition with several broken bones and a traumatic brain injury. As a teacher, his mother-in-law says he finds the positive and leaves the negative behind.

A fundraiser the family started has brought in more than \$80,000 to go toward medical bills and the girls' futures.
