



Minnesota Lions Eye Surgery Center

Since the opening of the first phase in September 2016, the **Minnesota Lions Eye Surgery Center (MLESC)** has been a welcomed additional to the University of Minnesota's Department of Ophthalmology & Visual Neurosciences. After not having on-campus surgical space for several decades, the MLESC now allows for the eye surgeons to perform their procedures without the hassle of traveling off-site to the Phillips Eye Institute or Fairview Hospital – Southdale. This off-site scheduling created inefficiencies with the doctors and took up the patients' time. Having this new part of the department at the U of M means better use of time and more opportunities to handle patients.

With the U of M being a medical school, the eye doctors and surgeons of tomorrow are able to receive their surgical training at the same place where the rest of their lessons occur. By getting this overall experience, these new doctors and researchers can return home to their local communities to begin their practices. Many of the eye doctors and surgeons from around the state received their education at the U of M. By having the Minnesota Lions Vision Foundation provide the funding to improve their educational experience, it benefits us all in Minnesota as well as those patients visiting from neighboring states.

Currently, the MLESC is handling four to five surgeries per day. It may not seem like much now but, considering the U of M wasn't doing any on-campus procedures until just a few months ago, it is actually great progress. Having this surgery center required the need to acquire equipment and get staff in place. In addition, the doctors at the U of M have begun shifting their surgeries from off-site locations to the new surgery center. As more and more procedures are scheduled, the daily use of the surgery center will increase. If things go according to plan, the MLESC will be the site of 20 to 25 surgeries per day within several months. We have paid **\$750,000** towards our **\$4 Million pledge** to the Minnesota Lions Eye Surgery Center. By the end of June, the MLVF will have added another **\$250,000 payment to the total. This will mean we will have covered \$1 Million overall, which is 25 percent of the pledge.** This is all due to the contributions that Lions across Minnesota have made to the MLVF. We can't do this without you and we thank you for your generosity. Please keep the eye surgery center in mind when you are making you donations towards the MLVF. Let's keep supporting the efforts at the U of M in helping those with visual impairments and for the search to cure blindness or low-vision problems.

Legacy Gifts

There are several ways that someone can make a contribution towards the Minnesota Lions Vision Foundation. Many people make an annual charitable donation for a tax deduction. You can hear all the latest developments on research and treatments being done at the U of M, as well as how your club is sitting with Helen Keller Sight Awards. We hope to come visit all of you in the very near future so, please contact us to book us for your event.

Members and Associates,

We now have numbers for our Senate bill, SF419. It was authored by Senator Carla Nelson. If Senator Nelson is your Senator, please thank her. Please ask your Senator to support this bill. Since only six Senators can sign onto a bill, ACM will take care of filling out the authors. Bill is attached. This bill is slated to go directly to the Senate Tax Committee.

House file 226 is getting additional authors, but not very fast. To date Representative Dettmer, Representative Davids, Representative Lucero and Representative Lien are on the bill. Yesterday Representatives Drazkowski and Knoblach agreed to sign on as well. If any of these are your Representative please remember to thank them for their support. We need many more to sign up. If you have not asked your Representative to sign on, you need to do that. Bill is attached. This bill is headed to the House Commerce Committee.

Last week in the House Commerce Committee there were overviews given by Director Barrett of the GCB and myself. I had hoped to have the audio for you, but it has not been posted. Attached are my comments.

I would like to make a comment here. This session promises to be very interesting and will have lots of ups and downs. I want to stress to "We Serve" you that the GCB and the MN DOR enforce laws, they do not make them. Our issue on taxes must be dealt with by the House, Senate and Governor. Those three alone will determine our destiny. Putting focus on any other group diverts the attention from where it belongs. If our elected officials are not hearing from us there will be no change for us. It is as simple as that.






