For the Seminars we did something different this year, we offered 8 different seminars on Saturday morning. We gave the presenters 15-20 minutes each to showcase their program. 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At the Saturday Luncheon, we were treated to the Dassel-Cokato Marching Band. This band will be the official Marching band representing us at the 2018 Lions International Convention in Las Vegas. Under the direction of Brian Veith, the band did an outstanding job of keeping us entertained for our luncheon. The Lions of 5M7 raised over \$1700 from tail-twisting for the bands upcoming expenses. We also celebrated my grandson's 7th birthday with singing to him when the band was still there. I appreciate all those that were able to share this with us.

The Lioness/Alternate Program was going on during our business meeting and was a good time for those that attended. KidSight made a presentation to them and requested that they help get the word out on the wonderful program that we have for our communities. They also heard from Camp Confidence on what they are able to do with the children that attend their camp. The meeting finished up with a band called the "Farmers Daughters", an excellent country band that played for the crowd and even brought some in from the hallway.

During the Convention, Deb O'Flanagan, Lion Pete Yelle, volunteers, and Leos for again setting up and operating the Community Service Room. A lot of eyeglasses were collected and sorted, collection of coats, clothing for homeless shelters and many other things were done. A big thank you for all of those that helped with this service event. This is what Lions is all about.

At the Governor's Banquet we had an excellent stimulating speech from International Director Noland on the "Power of We" and what we can do to make our own Lions Clubs and our lives even better.

Lion Virginia Hestekind, Circle Pines/Lexington Lions, was presented with an International President's Certificate of Appreciation for her work with the youth in our district. Lion Ginny has kept the District focused with the Peace Poster and Drug Awareness Contests for many years besides keeping in the forefront youth hunger and homelessness. Besides serving as the clubs president, she also is there for a lot of the clubs fundraisers and service activities. Earlier at the noon luncheon Lion Ginny presented the prize to our Peace Poster winner which was sponsored by the Waverley Lions. The winner of the poster contest was Macy Hertzog a sixth grader from the Howard Lake /Waverly/Winsted School District. The Student and her family were not able to attend, so a special presentation will be held by the neighboring Lions Clubs

Lions Ann and Tim Kaduce, of Spring Lake Park Lions, were both presented with International President's Certificates of Appreciation for their work with Kidsight. This program has screened about 1,000 youth in the District with close to 13% of children screened needing further medical/vision treatment. This program is touching the lives of so many in our communities it's unbelievable.

The Leadership Metal for outstanding job done by a Lion was presented to Lion Mary Curtis, again from the Spring Lake Park Lions. She has shown leadership in being a Zone Chair, for Zone 6, for the last couple years along with her work with KidSight. We need more Lions like, Lion Mary to continue to step out of their comfort zone and further the presence of Lions.

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Finally the Presidential Metal was awarded to Lion Vicki Violet of the Anoka Lions. Besides Lion Vicki being a Zone Chair for Zone 5, Lion Vicki is also the Executive Secretary for Multiple District 5M. Even with her other duties Lion Vicki has found the time to help the Centennial Celebration Committee find a location and available date for our event at the Anoka Fair Grounds on June 10, 2018.

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Minnesota Lions Eye Surgery Center

We are proud to say the Minnesota Lions Eye Surgery Center (MLESC) has become a rousing success. PDG Paul & Lion Lyle found out at the January foundation board meeting that the MLESC will see over eighty-five patients during the month. After not having on-campus surgical space for several decades, the MLESC now allows for the eye surgeons to perform their procedures without the hassle of traveling off-site to either the Phillips Eye Institute or Fairview Hospital – Southdale. This off-site scheduling created inefficiencies with the doctors and took up the patients' time. Having this new part of the department at the U of M means better use of time and more opportunities to handle patients. Please keep the eye surgery center in mind when you are making your donations towards the MLVF. Let's keep supporting the efforts at the U of M in helping those with visual impairments and for the search to cure blindness or low-vision problems.



Each one of you can point to a project in your club that has changed the lives of someone in your community, but did you know that same power exists within our district.

A nine-year-old girl is struck in the eye with a Lego shot from a cross bow. Her doctors are unwilling to do anything. But, mom will not be deterred. Mom finally finds a surgeon willing to take action and perform a cornea transplant. That transplant was done with a cornea from what was then the Lion's Eye Bank. The road to recovery was rocky what with multiple surgeries, but now, ten years later, the young lady is a college student and a lion. A single club could not have made that happen, but through the donations of the lion's in this district, she now has 20/20 vision. The Power of WE.

Bob is 16 and a high school wrestler. He had to pass a physical in order to participate in that sport. As part of his high school curriculum, he went through a health screening. There is where the Wellness Van comes into play. His screening showed something was wrong with his heart. After more extensive testing Bob was taken into surgery to correct a congenital defect. Without the surgery, that defect would have resulted into a sports related death. A single club cannot support the Wellness Van, but the district has been supporting that van for 30 years. The Power of We.

Martha, a young woman slipped and fell. The result of the fall was a traumatic brain injury. She's living but with multiple seizures and multiple medications. She's home bound. She's depressed. She's thinking about ending her own life. Her family is afraid of leaving her. An application is made to Can Do Canines. A suitable partner is found, Dempsey is his name. The number of seizures are now do to two to three a month. Her family can get on with their lives. She can now be a mom to her children. Her husband can now go to work knowing that she is not along. Dempsey can now anticipate her seizures so she can protect herself. Dempsey will stay with her until she recovers. A single club cannot afford to keep an organization like Can Do Canines operational year after year, but the district can. The Power of We.

Each of our clubs does great work in our communities, but when we band together we impact the iives of people most of whom we'll never meet and in ways we'll probably never see. Being a lion is about community and the world around us. Thanks for being a lion. Lion Jim

Defining "We Serve"

The Spring Lake Park Lions recently proved the motto of "We Serve" by saving, cleaning and donating 200 disposable prescription bottles to an organization called MATHEW 25 MINISTRIES in Cincinnati, Ohio.

MATHEW 25 will include the bottles along with other supplies to be forwarded to Malawi, Africa to be used as vessels for the patients of Doctors Without Borders The villagers wil now be able to carry medicines back to their villages without the medicines being contaminated before they get to ingest them as prescribed.

Currently, doctors have a problem providing a way for the patients to transport their medicines. Often they would have to wrap them in a rag or carry them in their pockets leaving room for some type of contamination. With clean bottles they can safely transport their medication insuring that they don't get some other infection as a result of dirty pills or powders. Already the Lions have started another batch for the next shipment. "We Serve"

I am SO IMPRESSED, BLESSED and AMAZED by the wonderful donations of coats, boots, clothes and personal care items for the homeless. The donations of plastic bags will keep us busy for a long time making plarn and crocheting 3' x 6' mats for the homeless. Plus, the donations of eye glasses, hearing aids, ink cartridges and cell phones were amazing. The group, Bundles of Love, were at our Mid-Winter Saturday afternoon and attendees could tie quilts that had already been sewed, choose pre-cut material pieces and put into stacks to be sewn into baby caps, and stuff toys and/or color pre-printed designs on quilt squares to be sewn into baby blankets. In addition, two Leo's learned how to make Plarn (plastic yarn) from plastic bags that they will take back to their Leo Clubs to teach the others and then do as a Service Project.

The Lion/Lioness/Leos Clubs are an extremely generous and community service oriented group. Each of you should be proud of your own and your club's accomplishments. Below are the numbers of what was donated in the Community Service room at the 5M-7 Mid-Winter Convention:

- 7,561 pairs of glasses (the Leo's sorted and counted these on Saturday morning)*
- 1,601 pairs of sunglasses (the Leo's sorted and counted these on Saturday morning)*
- 72 hearing aids
- 1 D-Dry for hearing aids
- 55 cell phones
- 48 ink cartridges

* The Minnesota Lion's Eye Bank stopped at the Marriott on Sunday morning of the convention to pick up all of the glasses.

• 345 personal care items (included travel size shampoo, conditioner, lotion, toothbrushes, toothpaste, dental floss, soaps, mouthwash, deodorant, body wash, hand sanitizer, powder, shower caps, nail polish, bandages, comb, note pad and a wallet)

- 3 blankets
- 3 pairs of winter boots

• 40 winter coats (special thanks to PDG Lions Dave & Nancy Schroeder and the Rush City Lions for the four large totes of coats)

• 235 clothing items (included pajamas, a robe, shorts, swim trunks, new underwear, 40 pairs of new socks, a snowmobile suit, tank top, dressier shirts, t-shirts, sweatshirts, hoodies, scarves, mittens, gloves, hats, face masks, ear muffs, head bands and snow pants)

March 26, 2018 has been chosen as a Lions Day at three FMSC Locations. The next page lists the locations, addresses, and primary packing location associated with each District.

The next page provides more details. It tells you how to register and the various time slots. Feel free, as a club, during your time slot to bring your club banner. Be proud to be a Lion!

Keep in mind there is an expectation that your club/team will provide a financial gift to help pay for the food material packed. The estimated cost of the food per participant/per session is around \$50.00. Bring the donations to your session where a Lion representative will collect and record them.

Any donation can be made by the club, individuals, local companies, or the result of some special fund raisers over the next three months. Tax deductible checks can be made out to Feed My Starving Children or by making an on-line donation at https://give.fmsc.org/LionsClub
