An update from Lion Jim Kugler

What IF

We have three conventions that I'm aware of: International, multiple district and district. I've never been to an international convention, but that is on my schedule for 2019. I've been to several multiple district conventions, but will save my thoughts until a later time. What I'd like to do is discuss my observations on district conventions (our mid-winter).

There are close the 2,000 members in this district. We probably have about 250 to 300 members of the district present at the memorial service this past January. We had about 140 members present for the lunch on Saturday. I ask the question, why is attendance so low with a membership of close to 2,000?

Over the past few weeks I've gone out to see what other districts are doing at their conventions. Most of the conventions are the same. What struck me was attendance at the Saturday lunches. One had about 135 in attendance, the second had close to 200 and the third had over 300. In talking with the members from that district, they expected to have that number again for the dinner on Saturday night. With approximately the same number of members in each district, I asked myself why could other districts get a greater attendance at some of their functions.

In the back of my mind, I'm using attendance as a criteria to judge the success of a convention. There are probably more criteria, but my focus is on increasing attendance. So, with that thought in mind, I am asking for some feedback as to what think we should do to increase attendance. Some of the things that come to mind include: lowering the cost, changing location, making the event a day and one half and starting the meeting on Saturday morning and ending on Sunday morning, bringing in a motivational speaker, hiring entertainment, making it more family friendly by shortening or eliminating hospitality suites and the list could go on. What I'd like to do is engage in a dialog about we should do to increase attendance. Maybe, the answer to the question is, the size of the mid-winter is the correct size for the district.

Second Annual One Stop Donation Drop and Blood Drive Sponsored by the Forest Lake-Scandia Leos

One Stop Donation Drop:

The One Stop Donation Drop will be hosted by the Forest Lake-Scandia Leo Club. Our purpose is to collect a variety of donations for non-profits locally and globally that will benefit both people and animals.

This year, there will be 26 non-profits that are either attending in person, will have a collections bin present, and/or are doing a hands-on service project at the event.

Help Support these Non-Profits by Bringing Items:

- **African Library Project**: New or gently used children's books. Financial gifts also are needed to help ship the books and/or purchase ones to meet our 1,000-book goal to establish a library in Malawi, Africa.
- **The Baby Blanket**: Diapers, baby wipes, children's clothing sizes newborn to size 6, or maternity clothing.
- **Bridge for Youth**: DVDs (rated PG or PG-13), hand soap, towels, pajama pants and pajamas (for teens), shower curtains, slippers, flip flops, boys/girls hoodies (S-XXL), boys/girls socks, sports bras (S-XXL), and bed in a bag items (duffle bags, new twin sheet sets, new comforters, and new pillows).
- **Children's Hospital**: All items need to be new. Games (Sorry, Memory, Headbanz, Connect 4, Trouble, Jenga, Cribbage, Sequence, Yahtzee, Apples to Apples, Guess Who and Monopoly), Duplo kits and small Lego sets, Hot Wheels, deck of playing cards (Uno, Skip-bo and Phase 10), fleece blankets, adult coloring books, harmonicas in the Key of C (Brand: Hohner Kids), and egg shakers for music therapy.
- Christian Community Home (nursing home/assisted living in Osceola): All items need to be new. Items for welcome baskets for new residents (e.g., shampoo, conditioner, soap, combs, brushes, toothbrushes, toothpaste, non-slip fuzzy socks, simple puzzles (50-100 pieces), activity books (e.g., word finds, crossword puzzles), inspirational book, and inspirational/pretty items to decorate a nightstand.

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- Forest Lake Lions Club: Used ink cartridges.
- **Northwoods Humane Society**: Canned and dry cat/kitten food, soft dog treats, clay cat litter, and medium and large exam gloves. (Northwoods may bring a dog who is waiting to be adopted.)
- **Pine Ridge Reservation in South Dakota**: All items need to be new. Any styles, colors, patterns, are ok with the exception of anything depicting owls since owls are a symbol of death in the Lakota culture.
- The OST Child Protective Services at PRR needs bedding and blankets (twin/full/queen), blank journals for writing, kids pillowcases (home-sewn are welcome), children's socks, underwear, and sleepwear, stuffed animals, or dolls.
- Backpacks, duffel bags, sports bags, diaper bags, or drawstring bags also are needed so the children can carry their belongings in something other than a trash bag.
- Scandia-Marine Food Shelf: Non-perishable food.
- **Scandia-Marine Lions Club**: Eyeglasses and hearing aids.- Wildlife Science Center: White office paper, carabiners, metal poop scoops, 32 gallon heavy duty garbage cans, paper towels, garden shovels (spades), 3 mil contractor bags (black plastic), bleach, spray bottles, scouring pads, and 5 gallon buckets with metal handles. (The Wildlife Science Center will be bringing a live raptor either a hawk or owl. Guests also can touch pelts from different animals.)

Help Support these Non-Profits by Purchasing Items

- **Community Homestead**: A variety of handmade craft items that were created by adults with developmental disabilities will be available for sale along with organic baked and canned goods. Also, there will be information and the opportunity to sign up for receiving fresh, organic produce, canned goods, and baked items through the CSA.
- **Lions International**: Purchase a variety of snacks, food, and beverages. The proceeds benefit One Shot One Life, a program of Lions International that provides vaccines against measles with the hope of eradicating the disease.
- Scandia Farmers Market/Green Grocery Shares: Learn about the Green Grocery Shares program and ways to support it.
- Scandia-Marine Lions Club: Super Saver Books will be available for purchase. These books have discounts at 99 businesses; and the proceeds help support scholarships for high school seniors going to college as well as other community projects.

This time of the year is when blood shortages are the most common. With the flu going around, blood donations have dropped even more. Please schedule your appointment today by clicking on the link and entering LEOS into the search box.

Health Fair:

- **National Marrow Donor Program**: Sign up to become a bone marrow donor and help those including children who have leukemia, lymphoma, and other life-threatening diseases. Learn how Lion Tom Welsch, who had leukemia, received a bone marrow transplant that saved his life.
- Lions Gift of Sight: Learn how you can sign up to be an eye, tissue, or organ donor; and give someone the gift of sight.
- **Minnesota Lions Diabetes Foundation**: Learn about what the Lions are doing within Minnesota to help raise awareness and prevent diabetes.
- Osceola Medical Center: Learn about diabetes prevention as well as living with the disease. Talk with medical professionals about oral health, eye care, and foot care as it relates to diabetes.

Service Projects:

- **Plant milkweed seeds** in containers with Butterflies from Janie to nurture until the Spring and plant in your yard to attract monarchs. (10 a.m. 12 noon)
- Make no-tie hats for pediatric cancer patients at Children's Hospital.
- **Crochet mats** for the homeless using plarn (plastic yarn made from plastic bags) under the guidance of volunteers from Christ Lutheran Church. (9 a.m. 12 noon)
- **Color-a-Smile**: Color pictures that will be sent to Color-a-Smile who then sends them to seniors who are homebound or in nursing homes; veterans; and those in the military.
- Knit hats for babies born at Fairview Lakes Medical Center using a round loom.
- Make fleece-tied blankets for a child and teenager through Project Linus.



COMMUNITY SERVICE

I'm happy to let you know that the Community Service Project Room will be back again at the 2019 Lion's 5M-7 Mid-Winter Convention. Therefore, if you want, you and your clubs can start collecting the following items now!! More details and items needed will be published in future 5M-7 Grams.

- Eye glasses/sunglasses, hearing aids, cell phones and ink cartridges A challenge has been made to see if we can collect even more of these four items at the 2019 Mid-Winter convention than we did this year!! I, personally, think it can be done!! Please note: please keep any eye glass cases that you get and just donate the glasses!
- Plastic grocery bags that will be cut & made into "plarn" (plastic yarn) to crochet into mats for the homeless. NOTE: If any individual, or club, wants to take on the project of cutting the bags and making the actual plarn to bring to the convention, here are a few links with instructions on how it is done:

- Knitted or crocheted hats, scarves and/or mittens, afghans, or 6"x6" squares for a blanket

In discussing the number of eye glass cases that we received in the Community Service Project room, ID Lion Don Norland mentioned that a club he knows makes them into little first aid kits to give out. We brainstormed about what we could do with all the cases we received at the convention. Some ideas, in addition to the mini first aid kits, were mini tackle boxes, mini beauty kits, mini manicure kits, mini personal care kits, mini jewelry boxes, mini purses/clutches and mini treasure boxes. Your club could do this project with any cases you receive. To use the cases that we have, we are asking clubs to donate the following items for these cases at the 2019 5M-7 Mid-Winter Convention:

- Dollar Store items such as multi-sizes of band-aids, Q-tips, fingernail and toenail clippers, nail files, gum, chap stick, tweezers, etc. that can be put into a miniature personal care kit.
- If anyone has contact with medical clinics or hospitals and can get sample size antibiotic ointments that come in small rectangular packs, alcohol pads, sample 2-pack of Tylenol and anything else that could be put in a miniature first aid kit.
- If anyone has contact with an Avon Rep, Mary Kay or other make-up company and can get samples of lipsticks, eye shadows, perfumes, face cleansers, etc. that could be put in a miniature beauty kit.
- Small bobbers, fish hooks, daredevils, fake worms/bait, sinkers, etc. (can be extra that you already have in your tackle box(es)!!

Thank you for your donation of used eyeglasses for recycling. We appreciate your collection efforts and bringing those glasses to the Mid-Winter convention where we picked them up to continue their cycle of the "gift of sight".

After receiving the eyeglasses we sort out the cases, broken plastic frames and loose lenses. These are not recyclable at this time and end up in a dumpster. A special thank you to everyone who sorts out the garbage before we receive your boxes!

We pack the glasses in apple boxes and store them until we have a trailer load to go to the WI Lions Recycling Center in Rosholt, WI. There they are sorted, cleaned, categorized, bagged and boxed in preparation for shipment to developing countries. At the mission site, trained Lion volunteers and eye care professionals perform vision screenings and dispense the appropriate recycled glasses, free of charge, to needy children and adults.

Brooklyn Park, MN February 16, 2018: Brooklyn Park Lions Club is proud to announce the 56th Annual "World's Largest" Art Kvamme Memorial All You Can Eat Smelt Fry. This year's event to be held April 24, 25, 26 and 27 from 5 – 8 p.m. at the Brooklyn Park Community Center, 5600 85th Avenue N., Brooklyn Park. The event will be held at the Brooklyn Park Garden Room this year while the Armory is renovated. Meal includes all you can eat breaded, deep fried smelt and one serving of coleslaw, beans, chips, dinner roll and beverage. Beer is available for an additional cost.

The event will be in honor of Lion Art Kvamme, longtime resident of Brooklyn Park and the original organizer of the BP Lions Smelt Fry event. Lion Art was 94 at the time of his death February 1, 2018 and participated in every BP Lions Smelt Fry event. He was mayor of Brooklyn Park from 1963-1964. Art was a Charter member of the Brooklyn Park Lions for 56 years. He was a recipient of the John Lutter and Melvin Jones awards which are the highest achievable within the Lions club. Kvamme, who traveled for his work in the steel building business, copied the idea for the fundraiser from an event he went to in the early 1960s on Minnesota Point in Duluth. Kvamme brought the idea back to the relatively new Brooklyn Park Lions group, which was looking for projects, and he knew it would become a big event.




