

ENVIRONMENTAL



OUR 10,000 MINNESOTA LAKES JAN DUBATS- ENVIRONMENTAL CHAIR

A couple days ago winter came to Minnesota with several inches of heavy, wet snow. This brings out the shovels, snowplows and salt. In recent news, we have learned that 56% Minnesota lakes are impaired.

In the winter, salt is applied to roads and sidewalks to melt ice and snow – this is where much of the chloride in our water comes from. The salt dissolves, runs into storm drains and most storm drains go into local waterways.

The problem with chloride is that it builds up over time, so waterways are getting saltier and saltier every year. That saltiness is hurting aquatic live and the health of our waterways- a truly valuable resource. Over time, chloride will work its way into ground water and other drinking water sources. It is difficult and expensive to remove chloride from tap water.

What can we do at our homes:

- Prevention is the first step! Shovel, sweep or blow snow off your surfaces before it builds and gets slippery.
- Use salt-free alternatives: sand, coffee grounds.
 - As I read further vinegar, beet juice, baking soda and other homemade remedies were suggested. I just may try some of these this winter.

If you need to use salt, make sure the salt is spread evenly and thinly – no big piles or clumps.

 More salt does not mean more melting – the excess just runs into our favorite lakes and rivers.

We in the Midwest are so fortunate to be blessed with lakes, rivers and streams. It is our responsibility to take care and protect this resource.

Helen Keller Sight Awards



In 1925, when Lions International was only seven years old, the legendary Helen Keller spoke to Lions members at their annual convention and challenged them to become "knights of the blind in the crusade against darkness." That speech set the Lions' course for their efforts in sight preservation. Since then, millions of Lions members worldwide have devoted their service careers to helping people with visual impairments. Looking at all that Helen Keller has accomplished, it is small wonder that the Lions are inspired by this exceptional woman and quite natural that the Minnesota Lions Vision Foundation developed the **Helen Keller Sight Award** as a tribute to her.

Established in 1992, more than 2,000 Helen Keller Awards have now been bestowed on deserving recipients who have distinguished themselves on behalf of sight. The awards are an excellent way to honor a Lion, Lioness, non-Lion individual, business, or organization. The

award recipient receives a beautiful plaque and pin, and the recipient's name is displayed on a Helen Keller board in the *University of Minnesota's Eye Clinic*. Both the donor and the recipient have the satisfaction of supporting worthwhile Lions projects.

PDG Terry and Lion Lyle are available to assist you with confirming your club's Helen Keller Sight Award balance, in ordering and in presenting the awards. Please consider honoring an individual, a group or a business that has supported your club by presenting them a Helen Keller Sight Award.

What is a service project?

This is a question we hear from many Lions. There are actually two types of reportable service activities: **DIRECT** and **INDIRECT**.

Direct service is when Lions plan and implement a service project to serve community needs and <u>interact directly with the people being</u> <u>served.</u> Examples are:

- A community event providing diabetes education and screening services
- An ongoing support group for those affected by childhood cancer
- An educational activity where children receive a healthy breakfast

Indirect service is when Lions serve but to not interact directly with the beneficiaries. Examples are:

- A fundraising event where funds/resources are donated to another organization
- A community improvement project such as a facility improvement or tree planting
- The collection/donation of canned food to a local food shelf or school pantry

What can I do to help your Club Secretary enter Activities at MyLion?

Improvements were recently made (July 1, 2019) to MyLion. Some of the notable improvements include: Meetings are reportable; fundraisers are reportable on the mobile app; funds donated have been added as a metric to a service activity; added a copy feature for duplicating recurring events; added the ability to tag an activity as a Signature Activity; expanded the selection of available service project types and others that have been made or are in process that you can read about on our district's Facebook page.

We are aware that because of the foregoing improvements, our Club Secretaries have to "catch up" with the new technical features of MyLion in order to access it and be successful in entering all your club's activities at the LCI website. Email me and I will send you either or both of the following files:

Minnesota Lions Diabetes Foundation Update MLDF Funded Research – Partners with the University of Minnesota

Happy Fall and Winter from the Minnesota Lion's Diabetes Foundation (MLDF)! As our days become shorter and we transition to winter, it's still a good time to be active outside. As you may know, exercise has been shown to improve overall heath in so many ways, including blood sugar control for individuals with diabetes.

With Mid-Winter meetings approaching, the MN Lions Diabetes Foundation wants you to know that your financial support to our Foundation supports critical diabetes research at the University of Minnesota.

The U of MN is one of the top diabetes research facilities in the world. Below is some information provided by the U of MN in support of that statement and the incredible progress made in diabetes research and treatments:

The U of MN has performed the first:

- Human-to-human islet transplantation
- Auto islet transplantation (transplanting one's islets back into one's own body to cure pancreatitis)
- Living-donor pancreas transplant
- Unrelated living-donor transplant
- Reversal of diabetes in twelve monkeys by transplanting islets from pigs
- Islet survival for more than one year without the use of immunosuppressive drugs in monkeys

Progress to date:

- One of only three sites chosen by the National Institute of Health to participate in the Clinical Islet Transplant consortium
- Since 2000, completed seven islet transplants trials with the following post-transplant results:
 - 70% of the recipients have become insulin independent
 - 67% remain insulin independent at one-year post transplant
 - 100% obtained immediate protection from hypoglycemia
 - 94% remain protected from hypoglycemia one year after their first transplant
 - 0% have experienced serious, unexpected adverse effects

Currently the U of MN is:

- Applying to the FDA for a Biologic License Agreement for the commercial manufacture of human islet as a treatment option for people with Type 1 diabetes
- Conducting numerous preclinical trials to translate the innovative research to the clinic

These statements of research confirm that the U of MN is a top diabetes research facility and the MLDF is confident your donated funds are going to the right place. On behalf of the Foundation, thank you. Because of you, we can realize our dream, life without diabetes!

LIONS INTERNATIONAL ESSAY CONTEST RULES



2019-2020

Journey of Peace

Your club can sponsor visually-impaired students in the Lions Clubs International Essay Contest!

The contest is open to students who are considered visually impaired according to their national guidelines, and will be 11, 12 or 13 years of age on November 15, 2019. Eligible birthdates are November 16, 2005 through November 15, 2008. One grand prize winner will receive an award and US\$5,000.

The contest theme is "Journey of Peace."

- Only a Lions club can sponsor the contest. The contest may be sponsored in a local school or organized, sponsored youth group, or individuals may be sponsored as well.
- Essays must be no longer than 500 words, submitted in English, typewritten in black ink and double spaced.
- Each essay must be submitted with a completed entry form. Essays submitted without completed entry forms will be disqualified.
- Only one entry per student per year, and each entry must be the work of only one student.
- Essay entries cannot have already been published.
- Any essays found to be plagiarized will be disqualified, and the student will be prohibited from entering any future Lions competitions.

DEADLINES

November 15, 2019 – Postmark deadline for a club to send one winning essay to the district governor. **Note:** A participating club should notify its district governor in advance of sending an entry.

December 1, 2019 – Postmark deadline for a club not belonging to a district to send one winning entry directly to Brand & Marketing Strategy at Lions Clubs International.

December 1, 2019 – Postmark deadline for a district to send one winning essay to the multiple district council chairperson. A district not belonging to a multiple district must send its entries directly to Brand & Marketing Strategy at Lions Clubs International (postmarked by December 1).

December 15, 2019 – Postmark deadline for a multiple district to send one winning essay to Brand & Marketing Strategy at Lions Clubs International.

February 1, 2020 – Club presidents of international winners will be notified on or before this date.

Participants accept all responsibility for late, lost, misdirected or illegible entries. Entries sent with insufficient postage will be disqualified. Lions Clubs International is not responsible for entries damaged, destroyed or lost during the judging process. Entries cannot be acknowledged or returned. They become property of Lions Clubs International upon receipt. Essays (partial or in their entirety) cannot be used without written permission from Lions Clubs International.






