I hope that you are enjoying your membership and your service to others. I also hope that each of you are finding your niche here in the Lions.

5m7 clubs I sent an individual email recently to each of our clubs letting you know about the brochure contest at convention. I hope that you are considering either an update to your current brochure or making a brochure for your club if you don't have one. Please contact me if you don't have a brochure yet and if you would like some guidance.

Brochures are just ONE way of marketing your club. There are many other ways, but just recently I have stumbled across another way of doing marketing in our clubs.

There are a few clubs who use signs in their communities. I have seen big signs being used by Lions and also smaller signs in smaller communities. Not everyone is on social media, not everyone spends a lot of time on email, not everyone picks up every brochure they can and reads it. But all of those methods of marketing exist.

We used signs. These signs sat at 3 different corners in Nowthen an people got used to looking at our signs to see what we were up to. We polled people as they attended our events and they said they knew about our events because of these signs at the corners. Back then,14 years ago, we were manually putting letters on signs to announce events.....but these days there are advanced signs out there if you can find them. Many are digital. How many of your clubs are in communities where a large digital sign exists? Think about this, because this can be quite the opportunity to market your club. There could be digital signs in your community and your club could partner with the local business or owner of the sign to advertise your club.

Does your club advertise on large bulletin boards in your community? Can you think of sign boards in your community that you could use if you have a partnership with the owner? If your club uses signs around town, please let me know.

Having many different ways to market your club is

better than just one way. Try holding a brainstorming session with all of your club members present to come up with more ideas. - If your club has not yet decided on your Parade of Green donations yet, please remember the MN Lions Diabetes Foundation with your giving.
- Please consider attending the Mid-winter Convention and when you do, come and learn more about Diabetes when you visit our Diabetes display at convention.
- We continue to ask you to share what your club diabetes projects are so that we can share these projects far and wide for all to consider. We hope to have a large list for our clubs to choose from when you are considering a project for diabetes.

Minnesota Lions Diabetes Foundation Update:

Minnesota Lions Diabetes Foundation has a dream – Life without Diabetes. We are, with your support, providing funding devoted to finding a cure for diabetes. That research is also leading to treatments for diabetes – improving the quality of life for people who live with diabetes

Improving Health:

There are steps each of us can take to improve our health and possibly prevent Type 2 diabetes:

- Maintain an A1C blood (a blood test that measures average blood sugar levels during the past 3 months) level of 5.7 % or below for a normal range.
- Be aware of what we are eating and drinking. Read Nutrition Fact Labels on packaging of foods and drinks for information about calories, carbohydrates, added sugars, vitamins, etc. Eating and drinking in moderation is key.
- Maintain a healthy weight.
- Be physically active (a minimum of 150 minutes a week / averaging 22 minutes a day of moderate intensity activity).
- Get good amount of sleep (7 to 9 hours per night).

Diabetes Research:

Minnesota Lions Diabetes Foundation is committed to supporting research for treatments and a cure for diabetes. MLDF recently provided additional funding to the University of Minnesota for Type 1 and Type 2 diabetes.

In Type 1 diabetes, the body's immune system mistakenly attacks and destroys insulin-producing cells. The body needs insulin to help blood sugars convert to energy. Without insulin, the human body cannot survive. To combat the destruction of these cells, and cure Type 1 diabetes, U of M researchers are creating "firefighters" that will be introduced to the body and protect the insulin-producing cells.

Researchers at the U of M have also identified a molecule that reduces the amount of glucose in mice, a discovery that may lead to better treatments for obesity-linked Type 2 diabetes. The goal is to determine if this molecule, if used in a drug, can prevent the development of Type 2 diabetes or reverse the condition in current patients. Support from MLDF may allow scientists to translate this research from animal models to humans to develop the next generation of a drug to fight Type 2 diabetes.

ERIC AND XAVI

When Kim and Eric began considering an Autism Assist Dog for their son, Noah, they were hoping not only for a wonderful companion Noah could have growing up, but also a calming presence in his life. Noah's autistic tendencies caused him to have what Kim describes as regular, lengthy meltdowns multiple times each day.

Can Do Canines knew that Xavi, a 3 ½-year-old black Lab, could be the perfect calm within any storm. So when Xavi entered Noah's life, the change was sudden and dramatic. Noah's meltdowns have drastically decreased and are shorter in duration. Kim says, "I won't even categorize them as meltdowns. As soon as you remind (Noah) to just hug Xavi, it's just instantly his body just kind of calms."

Xavi's assistance doesn't stop there, though. Trained for stim interruption, Xavi redirects Noah's focus when he engages in behavior that is not healthy, such as picking at his hands to the point of bleeding. Kim says, "We've noticed that Xavi will nudge him when she sees him doing that. So it's kind of starting to help break that, (giving him another) sensory input versus the picking."

Kim also explains that Noah, who is now entering fifth grade, was nonverbal when younger. Some people might have characterized him as being "tongue-tied." For Noah, however, his lack of speaking was literally from being tongue-tied—a condition of the tongue being tethered by tissue to the floor of the mouth. Even after surgery, Noah still struggled with communication and social skills. Additionally, Noah attempts to bolt from his parents when in public. Kim shares, "He would just wander or dart away really fast. And with him not being able to talk, that was a huge thing for us, safety-wise."

Now, being able to tether Noah to Xavi when out in public, the family feels downright adventurous. "She's accompanying us all over the place," says Kim of Xavi. Whether they're frequenting Walmart, Cabela's or even the Mall of America, anxiety is much less. Kim says that having Xavi has "definitely made going out feel safer."

More of a talker these days, Noah enjoys speaking to, and about, Xavi. One of his favorite pastimes is reading chapter books, including the Juney B. Jones series and Judy Bloom classics, to Xavi at bedtime. Kim observes, "It's very cute to watch as he's reading to her, like she loves to snuggle right up next to him and her eyes are

just like falling asleep as he's reading to her."

This Lab with soulful eyes has expressed other emotions to Kim too. Once, Noah was working on a puzzle with Xavi, who deployed the "visit" cue on her own while Kim was in the kitchen. Kim states, "All of a sudden, I just peeked my head around the corner and she was laying snuggled right up against his legs. Her head was just in his lap, just looking at him. And then she looked over at me like, 'Am I doing good?' And it was just that moment of like, 'Yeah.' You know, he's not alone."

During the same Mall of America shopping day, the family also stopped at the gravesites of Noah's grand-parents. There, he took the opportunity to sit at their headstones and tell them all about Xavi.

Noah's family wants to continue to enjoy life beyond their home boundaries, maybe even with a trip to Disney World someday soon. Yet, even at home, Noah and Xavi make the most of every playtime possibility, from pretending to be superheroes in the front yard together to having Xavi pick out the dinosaur figures from a set of fabric bins.

No matter the activity, Xavi is keeping this family grounded. Kim indicates that life "feels a little less chaotic and more calmed—a huge thing for our whole family." Adding that Xavi is allowing Noah more success and independence, Kim says, "Xavi has really changed our lives and Noah's life. Thank you. I couldn't imagine not having Xavi here now."

Do you have someone in your club who's interested in environmental issues/concerns? If so, have you considered asking them to be your clubs Environmental Leader. This person would motivate the club membership to positive action in areas of natural, social, and cultural environmental service. They would educate their club on conducting meaningful environmental activities and work in conjunction with other clubs to plan activities related to the environment.

We all have a vested interest in our environment and we all do our part, in some small way, to help reduce climate change. So, why not make it a CLUB ACTIVITY! We have clubs who do highway trash collection and clubs that help plant trees. We even had one club that collected plastic waste and made it into furniture for their local Lions Park. There are resources out there that we, as a club, could tap into that would help our community and work to reduce climate change.

We can and should take a leadership role in working with our communities on environmental issues. One way is to participate in our communities Sustainability Committee. Call and talk to your community's Public Works Department or your city Parks and Recreation Department on ways you can help. Ask other organizations in your community if they are working on an environmental project and how you can assist them. We can also turn to Lions International for additional literature and projects done by other clubs . Here are some beginner ideas for clubs:

- Plant trees. Consult your local environment authorities to determine the type and number of trees needed, as well as the location for planting. Download our Tree Planting Project Planner.
- Meet on a monthly basis and clean up a beach, community space/park or roadside area as a club.
- Hold an environment-themed photo contest at a local school. Reward the winner with a tree planted in their honor or another green form of recognition.
- Challenge all Lions in your club or district to add at least one green habit to their daily lives. Inspire others by sharing your actions on social media. Habits might include:
 - >Using a reusable water bottle or coffee mug rather than disposable products.
 - >Changing to energy-saving lightbulbs.
 - >Setting a time limit for your shower to reduce water consumption.

- >Volunteer with your local park service to maintain trails. You will help more people access and enjoy nature!
- >Collect used cellphones and donate them to individuals in need.

The point is, let's not 'talk the talk' but let's 'do the walk' and work together to help reduce in some way our climate crisis.

The Elk River Lions also combined the club Christmas party with Governor's Night, where 2 new members were inducted and Chevron awards were handed out. There was also a \$500 donation presented to Governor Mark for the Minnesota Lions Childhood Cancer Foundation.

Once again the **Rush City Lions Club** distributed fruit baskets to senior citizens. Members gathered to pack bags and take a delivery route. 13 Local Organizations help deliver 278 Holiday Baskets in the event's 10 year anniversary. Spring Lake Park, Minn. (December 17, 2022)

Over the last 10 years, Anoka County Community Action (ACCAP), the **Spring Lake Park Lions**, Spring Lake Park Schools and Southern Anoka Community Assistance (SACA Food Shelf) have partnered to provide holiday baskets to homebound seniors and school families who are facing food insecurity. In 2022, the total number of families asking for assistance increased by16% which brought the total up to 278 households from 236 the following year. To help make sure all families received a holiday basket, the Spring Lake Park Lions and SACA Food Shelf reached out to fellow civic and nonprofit groups to help deliver the food.

On Friday December 16th, members for the Spring Lake Park Lions, ACCAP, SACA Food Shelf and Spring lake Park High School Dance Team packed the 281 holiday baskets in preparation for the delivery the following day. On Saturday, over 80 volunteers from 12 organizations (SACA, ACCAP, Spring Lake Park Schools, Spring Lake Park Lions, Fridley Lions, Columbia Heights Lions, Ham Lake Lions, 1st Lutheran Church, Heights Community Church, Fridley Columbia Heights Kiwanis, Cars for Neighbors and Spring Lake Park Blaine Mounds View Fire Department) delivered the holiday baskets to 800 individuals throughout Anoka County and NE Minneapolis.

"This was truly a community event. It was amazing to be a part of the collaboration of many different organizations to help neighbors facing food insecurity," Pete Yelle, Spring Lake Park Lions and Lions 5m7 District Zone Chai. Since 1956, The Spring Lake Park Lions Club has been raising funds to support many initiatives and actively volunteering in the community. The Spring Lake Park Lions are a community service group who also run a charitable gambling operation. We serve our community by donating gambling proceeds back to the community. We help fund our local schools, food shelves, and homeless shelters. We support the sick, the elderly and help keep kids off the streets. We are huge advocates for the youth in our community by helping sponsor sports, eyeglasses, community events, and activities, scouts and suicide awareness.

SACA is a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization that provides basic needs services to individuals and families, including seniors, people with disabilities and majority BIOPIC, who are experiencing food insecurity. Last year, we served 51,600 individuals and distributed 800,000 pounds of food. Our clients primarily come from the cities of Columbia Heights, Fridley, Hilltop, Spring Lake Park, and Northeast Minneapolis; however, our services are available to anyone who needs them, and we never turn anyone away.

Food insecurity is increasing with 1 in every 9 Minnesotans, including 1 in 6 kids facing hunger. There has been a significant increase in the number of financially stressed households in our community, with the impact being disproportionately felt by people of color, seniors, and people with disabilities. Between 2019 and 2021, demand for SACA's services, which were already increasing yearly, jumped by 15%, or 7,701 additional individuals. Housing instability, job losses, and rising inflation caused by the pandemic will fuel high levels of food insecurity for years to come.




