Greetings 5m7 Lions and Leos,

Minnesota Lions Diabetes Foundation Update: At our quarterly meeting March 18, trustees voted to approve funds for two grants.



- \$5,000 for Camp Sweet Life. The funds will be used to improve technology for the camp's electronic medical record system and to provide for medical, program and nutritional supplies. Camp Sweet Life provides children and young adults who have Type 1 Diabetes a mix of fun recreational and educational opportunities.
- \$100,000 supporting the following four research projects at the University of Minnesota.

>Development of a drug to fight type 2 diabetes by targeting adipose (body fat) tissue thereby blocking inflammation and cellular senescence (cells multiplying but do not die off as they should).

>Find and control only "inflammatory" immune cells that destroy insulin producing cells.

>Promote survival of pancreatic islet cell and kidney transplants without the need for drugs that suppress transplant recipients' immune systems

>Support a breeding program for genetically engineered pigs to provide donor organs (islet cells, kidneys, and hearts) for clinical trials of porcine (pig) to human transplantation.

Diabetes Service Project: Perform a club Diabetes Service project by sharing the Diabetes Screening Test. Ask club members to share the screening link with family, friends, neighbors, etc. Or share our brochure that includes the screening test. Have club members track how many people they shared the test with and how much time was spent sharing and report that information to your club secretary for recording on MyLion. Click on: https://www.cdc.gov/prediabetes/takethetest to take the test.



Mobility Assist Dog ION Brings Positive Charge to Carrie's Life

Carrie, who battles juvenile rheumatoid arthritis and osteoporosis, first applied to Can Do Canines while in college in the early 2000s. She was accepted for a Mobility Assist Dog, but with the stress of graduating, moving, finding a job, etc., she decided to defer going through the process.

In 2019, Carrie had a major neck surgery, which "really changed things for me," she says. "Mobility has been getting harder the last few years." She explains that with continual bone deterioration and the use of crutches, she has difficulty picking up items and performing other needed motions. Carrie lives alone and was feeling less and less comfortable doing so. She explains that sometimes if she dropped something, "I'd have to wait until somebody came over or call somebody over to have them help me pick it up." Of course, if it was her phone on the ground, she couldn't even make a call. "I was very dependent on others," she states.

So she reapplied with Can Do Canines and was matched with a yellow Lab named Ion. She remembers how nerve -wracking it felt waiting for the initial introduction with him, but was quickly put at ease. "When I actually got to meet him, when I actually saw him walk in, it just all went away," she says.

With matching laid-back personalities, Carrie and Ion clicked from the get-go. Carrie says, "Our relationship is building so quickly." Perhaps that is partly because Ion is so eager to help Carrie with whatever she needs. Whether it is carrying her bag, tugging open drawers and cupboards, removing her shoes and socks, or yes, picking up anything Carrie drops, Ion is ready to work. "Even if it looks like he's in a deep sleep, he is always kind of listening and paying attention," says Carrie.

Ion gets Carrie's attention, in return, with his expressive emotions. Carrie describes, "He always has puppy eyes. It doesn't matter if he's excited or if he's tired or whatever, he just always looks up at you, you know, with his little puppy eyes, and ... oh, it's hard to resist him."

Ion is equally expressive when going to work with Carrie. As a programmer at Schwan's Company, Carrie brings him to the office the four days each week she goes there. She explains how Ion is charged and ready when approaching the building, saying, "He gets super excited to push the buttons to open up the doors when we go in and out. He's just always like, 'Okay, is it time yet? Is it time yet?" After the button-pushing fun, he follows up by looking at Carrie, seeming to ask, "Did I do a good job?" Ion is also fine with Carrie's computer mouse in his mouth anytime she needs it picked up, and Carrie is relieved not to have to find another human anymore for assistance—whether at the office or elsewhere. She shares, "He is really helping to ease my anxiety about going out and doing things because I know he'll be there to help me."

Carrie is especially grateful for Can Do Canines, and admits that when considering other options for service dogs, "There's no way I could have afforded that." Although the amount of information to consume during the process of welcoming an assistance dog can be overwhelming, Carrie appreciates the comprehensive client manual and says notes that "the relationship that I have with the team there at Can Do (Canines) is a huge help."

Also of help to Carrie is Ion. "He's helped me in more ways than I anticipated," she says.

ENVIROMENTAL NEWS.....

Remember as a child running about in the yard and picking all the dandelions you could hold to bring back to your mother and show her. Remember putting them under her nose to smell and seeing all the yellow 'dust' under her nose (and yours!)

Dandelion – the ubiquitous weed – is a flowering plant belonging to the Asteraceae family. There are several fun and interesting dandelion facts that shed light on different aspects of this plant.

Taraxacum officinale, dandelion's botanical name, has been derived from some Greek words referring to the medicinal characteristics of this species. 'Dandelion', their common name, has been derived from the French phrase 'dents de lion', which means lion tooth. The shape of this plant's leaves resembles a lion's tooth. Dandelion is known by various other names in different regions around the world, the popular ones being cankerwort, wild endive, pissenlit, yellow gowan, puff ball, blow ball and more.

Dandelions have around 30 species and can be found throughout the world. They inhabit different habitats which offer them adequate sunlight, like meadows, forest edges, grasslands, lawns, and gardens.

Dandelions have been a vital element in the field of traditional Chinese medicine for around a thousand years. Considered as a native to Mediterranean, dandelion plants were known quite well by ancient Egyptians, Romans, and Greeks. The leaves and roots of the plant were medicinally used as a tonic for removing toxins from bloodstream, as they serve as a mild diuretic to improve the digestive system functioning.

Ancient physicians were not much aware of vitamin and nutrition deficiencies. However, they found that dandelions were beneficial in many problems, including fevers, toothaches, constipation, anemia, arthritis, diabetes, gall bladder problems, heartburn, skin irritations, and liver, stomach and kidney disorders. Modern herbalists now realize that growing dandelions are enriched with Vitamins A, E, and C, as well as iron, zinc, and calcium.

The beauty of the plants was also appreciated. Making dye was a common application of the plants – pale yellow dye was made from the yellow dandelion flower and a purplish hue was derived from inner ribs of dandelion leaves.

Botanists state that some dandelion species are originally from North America. However, according to historians, early European settlers had introduced the plant's two most familiar species – common dandelion (Taraxacum officinale) and red-seeded dandelion (Taraxacum erythrospermum) – to the New World owing to their medicinal and nutritional benefits. Both of these dandelion types have naturalized and are found abundantly across the country.

Here are some fun facts about dandelions:

• Dandelion makes the only flower representing three

celestial bodies during different phases of its life cycle – sun, moon, stars. The yellow flower of the plant resembles the sun, the dispersing seeds of the plant resemble stars, and the puff ball of dandelion plant resembles the moon.

- The dandelion plant's every part is useful roots, leaves, flower. Its uses include dye for coloring, food, and medicine.
- Dandelion seeds can be carried away to up to 5 miles from their place of origin.
- The dandelion flower has a yellow-orange hue and comprises many individual, miniature flowers called ray florets. The dandelion flower opens at the time of sunrise and closes at night.
- Animals like butterflies, insects, and birds consume the seeds or nectar of dandelion.
- The dandelion leaves are 2 to 10 inches long. A rosette is formed by these green leaves at the stem's base. Dandelion leaves appear tooth-like at the edges.
- Dandelion plants can reach a height of 17 inches.
- Dandelions are pollinated by various types of insects. Yellow flower of the plant becomes a puff ball which comprises many fruits known as achenes. Dandelion seeds have a disk-like extension which serves as a parachute and helps dispersal by wind.
- Consuming or touching dandelion can lead to allergic reaction for some people. However, the pollen of the plant cannot cause allergies as the grains are way too large in size to bother, but the milky sap (latex) contained by the plant may cause contact dermatitis.
- In folk medicine, dandelions are used for treating liver disorders and infections. Tea made from dandelion serves as a diuretic i.e., facilitates urine excretion. And let's not forget the taste of a good dandelion wine!
- Dandelions are also called pioneer plants or ruderals

 the first plants to colonize any disturbed lands (like land after a wildfire).

So, the dandelion has a fascinating history and several exciting facts associated with it. These dandelion facts reveal many interesting things about the commonly occurring weed. And maybe, just maybe, its food for thought in keeping the dandelion growing in our yards and fields.
