



☐ LIONS, LET'S HEAR YOUR ROAR!

The International Association of Lions Clubs has a program of Commercial General Liability Insurance that covers Lions on a worldwide basis. All Clubs and Districts are automatically insured. the coverage amount is One Million Dollars.

Our Multiple (MD5M) provided an Additional Liability Umbrella Policy for 1 million dollars. We were informed at our recent Council of Governors meeting that our broker decided in October not to renew our policy. After this notification, multiple individuals attempted to obtain a \$1 million liability insurance policy for events held in Minnesota's municipal areas but were unsuccessful.



The stated reason for all this is that Minnesota with all its clubs is too large of an area for a company to bid.

The cabinet deliberated on investigating an additional umbrella policy and resolved not to proceed with seeking and offering this coverage. For event venues requiring insurance coverage exceeding one million dollars, it is necessary to procure an independent insurance policy of your own.

The additional liability insurance was billed to clubs on your July 2024 dues statement. Since it was not spent, these funds are being refunded to our District Treasurer. The decision was made to refund this amount to you on your July 2025 billing statements. The policy for club officer bonding and insurance is still intact.
