

Dear Lions and Leos,

Does your club have a membership chairperson whose focus is on mem-

bership? If not, who in your club is focusing on membership? I really want to encourage your club to elect a membership chairperson who works with all things membership.

What does a membership chairperson do? Membership entails all kinds of things. It is way more than just getting new members. Here is the description of a membership chairperson in the LCI Standard Club Constitution:

MEMBERSHIP CHAIRPERSON. The responsibilities for this position shall be as follows:

(a) Serve as a key member of the club's Global Action Team as the club Membership Chairperson.

(b) Collaborate with the District Global Action Team on membership initiatives, and participate in relevant district, region and zone meetings and events.

(c) Develop and lead a membership committee to help implement action plans to achieve the club's membership goals and to positively increase the member experience.

(d) Encourage all members to participate in membership growth by inviting prospective members to the club. Follow up with prospective members promptly.

(e) Promote a harmonious club atmosphere by listening to and addressing, with the support of the club board of directors, concerns that prevent a positive member experience. This may include a survey or other opportunities for feedback.

(f) Engage new members in activities that are of interest to the member.

(g) Collaborate with the club service chairperson as well as other club committees to promote membership opportunities.

(h) Understand the different membership types and programs offered and promote membership programs to club members.

(i) Ensure that new members are provided with an effective orientation so new members understand how the club operates within its district, multiple district and Lions Clubs International, with the support of the Club First Vice President/Club Leadership Chairperson.

(j) Attend the district governor's advisory committee meeting of the zone in which this club is located when appropriate.

Many whom I've spoken with this year believe that as a membership chair they would be in charge of getting all the new members for your club. Reading letters a-j above tells us that isn't true at all. A membership chair encourages all members to invite prospective members. A membership chair provides a harmonious club atmosphere to make a positive member experience in your club. This position invites and engages new members in service projects, promotes membership programs to club members, ensures members are provided an effective orientation so

that new members understand how your club operates within the district. If this sounds interesting to you, please let your club nominating committee know this. If your club doesn't have a designated membership chair, is your club getting these things done?



- 3. We continue to ask you to share what your club diabetes projects are so that we can share these projects far and wide for all to consider. We hope to have a large list for our clubs to choose from when you are considering a project for diabetes.

Minnesota Lions Diabetes Foundation Update: Minnesota Lions Diabetes Foundation has a dream – Life without Diabetes. We are, with your support, providing funding devoted to finding a cure for diabetes. That research is also leading to treatments for diabetes – improving the quality of life for people who live with diabetes.

Improving Health: There are steps each of us can take to improve our health and possibly prevent Type 2 diabetes:

- Maintain an A1C blood (a blood test that measures average blood sugar levels during the past 3 months level of 5.7 % or below for a normal range.
- Be aware of what we are eating and drinking. Read Nutrition Fact Labels on packaging of foods and drinks for information about calories, carbohydrates, added sugars, vitamins, etc. Eating and drinking in moderation is key.
- Maintain a healthy weight. Get good amount of sleep (7 to 9 hours per night).
- Be physically active (a minimum of 150 minutes a week/ averaging 22 minutes a day of moderation intensity activity).

Diabetes Research: Minnesota Lions Diabetes Foundation is committed to supporting research for treatments and a cure for diabetes. MLDF recently provided additional funding to the University of Minnesota for Type 1 and Type 2 diabetes. In Type 1 diabetes, the body's immune system mistakenly attacks and destroys insulin-producing cells. The body needs insulin to help blood sugars convert to energy. Without insulin, the human body cannot survive. To combat the destruction of these cells, and cure Type 1 diabetes, U of M researchers are creating "firefighters" that will be introduced to the body and protect the insulin-producing cells. Researchers at the U of M have also identified a molecule that reduces the amount of glucose in mice, a discovery that may lead to better treatments for obesitylinked Type 2 diabetes. The goal is to determine if this molecule, if used in a drug, can prevent the development of Type 2 diabetes or reverse the condition in current patients. Support from MLDF may allow scientists to translate this research from animal models to humans to develop the next generation of a drug to fight Type 2 diabetes.

NEWBORN HEARING SCREENING



Hearing helps a baby to talk. If hearing loss is discovered early, babies have the best chance of

learning to speak and doing well in school.

In 1999, only 8% of babies born in Minnesota were screened for hearing loss. Together with their partners, the Department of Otolaryngology at the University of Minnesota, the 5M Hearing Foundation established the Lions Newborn Hearing Screening Program. Within five years, every baby born in Minnesota could be screened for hearing loss –that's about 70,000 children every year! In 2007, newborn hearing screening was mandated and the Lions Newborn Screening Program was handed over to the Department of Health.

If your baby does not pass the first hearing screen, it does not mean he/she has a hearing loss. Some common reasons are:

- birth debris in the ear canal
- fussy baby
- too much noise in the room
- middle ear fluid



Nonetheless, it's important to schedule a follow-up screen. Speech and Hearing Milestones to watch for:

- around 0-3 months: startles at loud noises, reacts to a familiar person, makes "coo" or "aah" sounds
- around 3-6 months: ,stops playing when sound is heard, reacts to his/her name, babbles, laughs when happy
- around 6-9 months: turns head to source of sound, responds to "no" and facial expressions, says "mama" and "dada"

Ali and Zach, despite living out of state while Zach serves in the military, try to return to Minnesota every summer to attend the Minnesota State Fair. When they visited in 2019, they brought their baby Audrey and stopped by the Lions Club KidSight booth at Health Fair 11 at the Fair for a quick child vision screening. The couple now have three young daughters, and when they came to the fair in 2022, they made a point to visit Health Fair 11 once again for vision screening. To their surprise, 3-year-old Audrey did not do well, despite passing her vision test at her check-up eight months prior.

Audrey's next step was a visit to the ophthalmologist, and she got her first pair of glasses. Her mom emailed the fair to find out how she could contact the Lions Club to thank them for doing vision screenings as part of Health Fair 11. "There were no other indications Audrey needed glasses, so the doctor told us that we are lucky to find this vision issue at such a young age," Ali wrote. With her new glasses, "we have noticed an increase in her confidence, and she has shown a greater interest in reading books and drawing. We are so grateful! We plan to continue visiting the Heath Fair 11 booth each year specifically for the vision screening for our younger two daughters as well."

Health Fair 11 at the Fair has offered free or low-cost health checks and health education for all guests attending the State Fair since 2001. This year, more than 77,000 screenings and connections were made by 17 health-related organizations that filled the Health Fair 11 exhibit. Nearly 2,900 of these were Lions Club KidSight free vision screenings for kids 6 months to 16 years old. In all, Health Fair 11 reports 1,380,897 health connections made in the exhibit's 21 years at the fair!

IAN AND DEWEY

Ian lives in a full house with a busy family, which includes his parents, an older brother, a younger sister, and several family pets. Yet making room for Autism Assist Dog Dewey was no problem for this 8 year old and his family.



Ian's parents, Laura and Chadd, heard about Can Do Canines from friends whose son received an Autism Assist Dog from us not long ago. They were excited, but the moment Ian met Dewey was even more thrilling than they expected. Laura says, "I knew that Ian would love Dewey, because I had seen him around dogs, but it was fun to see Dewey's reaction to Ian and the bond they developed so quickly."


Just as their emotional bond is significant, the physical bond between them when Ian holds Dewey's handle is crucial. Laura explains, "If he has Dewey with him, he feels more secure. He just knows he has his buddy and he's more grounded."

For Ian, wrapping his hand around Dewey's handle came easily. For the past few years, Ian has been participating in hippotherapy, a type of horseback-riding therapy for individuals with disabilities. "During that," Laura describes, "he holds the handle on the saddle and he tells the horse to 'walk on.' And so with Dewey, it just kind of was a nice transition into him because he has a handle. And so Ian holds Dewey's handle and just tells him to 'walk on.'" "Walking on" also means more "walking in." Before Ian had Dewey, he often preferred to stay near the doors of stores, not wanting to go in any further. Laura says, "Now that we have Dewey, it's really fun to be able to take (Ian) to Target and he can go pick out a package of Oreos, or go look at the Roombas that are on display, or just be out in public and experience seeing new things."

Increased experiences can also mean increased stress. Not to worry. Dewey can help with that, too, by what Laura calls "redirecting lan's upsets." She says, "If we know that something's going to potentially get him, then we'll get Dewey to interact with him." And lan adores Dewey's interactions, relishing every kiss and snuggle. In fact, when sleeping together they are "totally intertwined," according to Laura, who has the photos to prove it. She admits, "I take a picture every night of the two of them, so I have lots."

As the pair is up moving about the world together, there are even more benefits. Ian is able to work on his gross motor skills, which are important for his physical health. Plus, the family can leave Ian's wheelchair/ stroller at home, since Dewey allows Ian to be more a part of the action when they are out on the town. Laura stresses that having Dewey "has been truly life changing for us as a family and for Ian." She and the rest of the family are heartened by the "opportunities that Ian will have to experience life more fully and to be able to participate in more family activities and more fun things with his peers and just have a sense of calmness when he's with Dewey."

Understanding that amazing partnerships like this don't simply happen, Laura says, "We are just incredibly grateful to the whole organization and to everyone who contributes in any way. We just really, really appreciate all the time and energy that is put into raising these amazing animals that help fulfill all these people's lives. It's just wonderful."




