Dear Lions and Leos,

I have seen so many Fall events that our clubs are putting on in your communities. Did you have a membership table there? And did you get some prospective members? How about some new me



there? And did you get some prospective members? How about some new members for your club? With getting new members, there is something else to think about. That is ORIENTATION OF YOUR NEW MEMBERS!

I am hoping that all of our clubs hold a "New Member Orientation" for all of your new members. This is a very important part of the new member process. It helps them to understand how your club functions, what their role will be and gives them the big picture of their district and the association. When you were a new member how did you learn about your club? How did you learn what impact your club makes in your community?

A new member orientation gives your club a chance to talk about how your club operates and gives a new member a chance to ask questions in a smaller setting. New members don't always feel comfortable asking in a large group setting. When members are properly informed, they are way more likely to feel comfortable with your club, become active and remain a lion for years.

There are tools available to assist us with orienting our members! Lions International has a handy dandy New Member Orientation Guide which can guide you in orienting your new members. The book is amazing and there it is....all right there for you. All the information is there, you just tailor it to your own club information. Members can use the guide as a reference during their time as a lion.

Some ideas for your club orientations:

- Invite all members to each of your orientations. This way your new member can have a chance to meet many members. Not all will be able to make it, but it allows for the new member to get input from current members and meet them as well.
- Do an orientation over coffee. The orientee then feels as if you are focused on them and they feel they are able to ask questions one on one.
- Maybe your club has time set aside on your calendar monthly, or bi-monthly for this. If there are no new members, then you don't need to meet, but if so, there is already time set aside.
- There are clubs who have orientation time set aside one hour prior to their regular meetings so as not to add "another meeting night."

There are so many ways to get new member orientations completed. If your club does not do this, I encourage you to make this happen. Please let me know how I can assist your club with all things membership.

By the time all you avid Gram readers get this, the 2022 Minnesota Lions Vision Foundation (MLVF) EyeBall and Thanksgiving For Vision will be history, More on that in the next monthly Gram.

Lets talk about used eyeglasses! Here is the collection process we use once the 5M7 Lions Club places pails in Minnesota optical stores, banks, schools, city halls, etc. making it easy for the public to donate their old eyeglasses. When the Club collects the glasses, they will empty the collection pail into a cardboard box and the designated club member will contact either PDG Lion Steve Linder or myself to pick the box up. The glasses are then sent to the Minnesota Eyeglass recycling Center in Sauk Rapids, Mn.. From there they are periodically delivered to a recycling center in Rosholt Wisconsin. Optometrist-trained Lions members & others wash, repair, determine the prescriptions & pack the eyeglasses in prescription-labeled bags & inventoried in a computer database. The eyeglasses are destined for use in countries other than the USA. Groups can request eyeglasses for missions as well as international projects. Hearing aids placed in eyeglass collection pails will be given over to a Lions Hearing Foundation Trustee. Lions Clubs can make arrangements by calling : PDG Lion Steve Linder at 612-382-2236,

In nursing school, I took a statistic's course because I thought it would be fun and easy. I ended up disliking the course because at that time I found it boring. What I didn't realize was how important statistics are to us even in our every day lives and how the use of statistics in climate change shows how our climate is changing.

The world sweltered through a November that ranked as the fourth-warmest November in 142 years of climate records. The Northern Hemisphere saw its warmest land temperatures on record for meteorological autumn, according to scientists at NOAA's National Centers for Environmental Information (NCEI).

An excerpt from NOAA's latest monthly global climate report climate by the numbers November 2021: The average global land and ocean surface temperature for November 2021 was 1.64 degrees F (0.91 of a degree C) above the 20th-century average of 55.2 degrees F (12.9 degrees C). This was the fourth-warmest November on record — behind 2015 (warmest), 2020 and 2019. The world's 10-warmest Novembers have all occurred since 2004. The Northern Hemisphere saw its second-warmest November on record, while the Southern Hemisphere had its 10th warmest, a tie with 2014. Continents-wise, Africa had its warmest November on record; South America and Asia each had a top-10 warmest November; and Oceania had its coolest November since 1999.

Season and the year to date: The three-month-long season (meteorological autumn or spring, September through November) saw an average global land and ocean temperature of 1.60 degrees F (0.89 of a degree C) above the average of 57.1 degrees F (14 degrees C). This made it the fourth-warmest such period in the 142-year climate record. Looking at just land temperature, the Northern Hemisphere saw its warmest autumn on record, surpassing the second-highest land temperature recorded in 2020. The year to date (January through November) global land and ocean surface temperature was 1.51 degrees F (0.84 of a degree C) above the 20thcentury average, making it the sixth-warmest YTD on record. According to NCEI's Global Annual Temperature Rankings Outlook, 2021 is likely to rank among the 10warmest years on record.

Other notable climate events: The season was exceptionally warm for some continents; North America had its second-warmest autumn on record – trailing the record set in 2016 – while South America and Africa had their third- and fourth-warmest autumn/spring respectively. Europe and Oceania also had a warmer-than-average season, but it was their coolest since 2016. Polar sea-ice coverage was small: The November 2021 Arctic sea ice cover averaged 359,000 square miles below the 1981-2010 average, which ties with 2009 and 2011 for ninth-smallest November in the 43-year record. Antarctic sea ice coverage was 370,000 square miles below average and the second smallest on record for November, behind November 2016.

All these numbers show a disturbing trend; a trend in the wrong direction which we are responsible for changing.

Selected Significant Climate Anomalies and Events: November 2021 GLOBAL AVERAGE TEMPERATURE November 2021 average global surface temperature was the fourth-highest for November since global records began in 1880. ARCTIC SEA ICE EXTEN The November 2021 Arctic sea ice extent was 8.7% below the 1981-2010 average, tying with November 2009 and 2011 as the ninth-smallest November extent since satellite records began in 1979. This was Europe's 15th-warmest November on record. November 2021 was Asia's ninth-warmest NORTH AMERICA November on record. November 2021 was North America's 11th-warmest November on record ONTIGUOUS UNITED STATES The contiguous U.S. had its seventh-warmest November in the nation's 127-year record. **ACDIC** OCFANIA Africa had its warmest Oceania had its coolest November November on record. since 1999 AUSTRALIA November 2021 was Australia's wettest November in the nation's 122-year record. SOUTH AMERICA South America had its ninth-warmest GLOBAL CYCLONE ACTIVIT November on record. The global tropical cyclone activity from January-November was above average with 87 named storms. The number of named storms in the 2021 North Atlantic hurricane season was 21, which is the third-highest number of named storms for the season on record. NEW ZEALAND New Zealand had its warmest November on record ANTARCTIC SEA ICE EXTER The Antarctic sea ice extent for November 2021 was 6.0% below average and was the second-smallest November sea ice extent in the 43-year record. Only November 2016 had a smaller extent. Please note: Material provided in this map was compiled from NOAA's State of the Climate Reports. 
FROM YOUR EDITOR.....

He has also served as a Certified Guiding Lion for four clubs.

In recognition of his service, he has received numerous awards including an International President's Award, two International President's Leadership Awards and multiple International President's Certificates of Appreciation. Director Ibarra is a Progressive Melvin Jones Fellow.

Dave qualified for a clinical trial at the Schulz Diabetes Institute in 2006, and in 2008 and 2009, Dave was the recipient of two islet transplants. These transplants have changed Dave and his family's life significantly as it relates to the care, treatment, and living with (actually without) diabetes.

Dave and his wife of over 33 years, Denise live in Bloomington and have two sons, Reese (wife Sara), an IT specialist at a pharmaceutical company, and Riley, a Plant Sciences PhD candidate at the University of Georgia.
