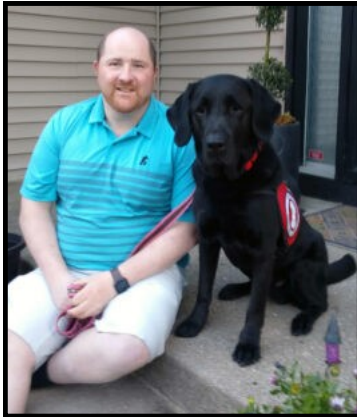

Consider what it would be like to feel completely fine, and then only a moment later, "you're completely lost." This is how Malcolm describes having Type 1 diabetes. "You have no capability of doing even the basic tasks. And people don't often see that when they look at someone with diabetes. They see someone who's perfectly fine, there's

no issues, and then all of a sudden they're acting like they have no idea."



Channeling some optimism, Malcolm applied at Can Do Canines and was matched with a large and loving black Lab named Blaze. "I wasn't 100% sure what was going to happen, I was more just hopeful of the changes that could happen."

Blaze quickly proved that he was in his glory alerting Malcolm to his lows. "It's ridiculous how much [these dogs] can do for people," says Malcolm. "I'm still in shock of the abilities that he has and the things that he catches . . . It's been a lot more than I had hoped or expected. "And Blaze has certainly found his calling. Malcolm says, "He's pretty much caught just about every time my blood sugar has [gone low]. He's actually prevented quite a lot of situations that could have been quite bad and have been bad in the past before I got him." That security has helped Malcolm not only physically, but also mentally. "He gives me the confidence that if something is going to happen, there's that extra layer of defense, catching things before it gets too serious where I can't deal with it myself." He adds, "Having him in the house makes all the difference."

This pair does not just lie low though, and Malcolm now enjoys freedom he hasn't always known. Growing up, he gave up a lot of experiences because he didn't want to put people through stress. He felt the same type of burden with his family, who used to worry about him, even as he commuted to and from work. That's changed, and Malcolm says, "Now I don't feel that's the case because if I can go, Blaze can go." The pair go together to Malcolm's work at Trustone Financial in Golden Valley, and Blaze also accompanies him to the golf course, where Malcolm says, "All the people there love him already." Plus, when some of his golf swings force Malcolm to play "lost and found," Blaze's cheery personality keeps him from getting discouraged.



What happens with the Eyeglasses we collect!

A Lions Club President places collection pails in Minnesota optical stores, banks, school city halls, etc. , so individuals can easily donate their old eyeglasses.

When an amount is collected by a Lions Club, please call either PDG Terry Wold or PDG Steve Linder and we will pick them up from you. We send the eyeglasses to the Minnesota Lions Eye-

glasses Recycling Center in Sauk Rapids. From there, glasses are periodically taken to a recycling facility in Rosholt, Wisconsin, where optometrist-trained Lion members and others wash, repair, determine the prescriptions, and pack the eyeglasses. The glasses are put in bags, labeled with their prescriptions, and inventoried in a computer database. Glasses are des-



tined for use in countries other than the United States, and groups can request eyeglasses for missions and international projects.

Hearing aids can also be placed in collection pails, but any hearing aids collected will be forwarded to a Hearing Foundation trustee.

The fundraiser the Minnesota Lions Vision Foundation that was scheduled for Friday October 29 , the Eye Ball and October 30, 2021, Thanksgiving for Sight had to be canceled again this year do to Covid. We felt it would be unsafe to continue with these venues.

Lions Clubs can make arrangements by calling PDG Terry Wold or PDG Steve Linder to receive collect pails or have glasses picked up. Thank You For All You Do!

- ◇ Start a walking group
- ◇ Canoe or kayak down a local river
- ◇ Do a diabetes health fair with free testing for Type 2 Diabetes free services and screenings, activities, and giveaways during November [Diabetes Awareness Month]
- ◇ Serve diabetic friendly meals at a Lions meeting and/or event
- ◇ Do a STRIDES WALK for diabetes awareness [benches along walking trails]
- ◇ Raise money by doing a fun event at a golf driving range
- ◇ Collect [or donate] non-perishable food that is healthy for low income people with diabetes
- ◇ Do a testing clinic for diabetic retinopathy and blood test blood glucose or A1C
- ◇ Furnish books about Diabetes, healthy eating and exercise / fitness and donate to city library or local school.

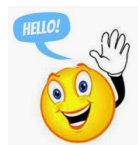

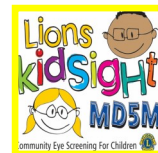

TRUTH ABOUT PLASTIC RECYCLING

Plastic products are often made of mixtures of many chemicals, which can stymie recycling processes by making it harder to isolate a base material that can be recovered and reused.

The popular perception that plastic is easily and widely recycled has been shaped by decades of carefully calculated messaging designed and paid for by the petroleum and gas companies that make most of that plastic in the first place and the beverage companies that depend on plastic to bottle their products.

"Recycling is sold as a means of not worrying about the problem" says a former regional administrator at the EPA and president of Beyond Plastics, a group focused on ending plastics pollution. The companies paying for the ads that frame recycling as an easy solution to a potentially devastating environmental problem know that recycling cannot keep up with the flood of new plastic.

One of four things happens to plastic after you're done with it. If it's not recycled [and it's usually not] it is landfilled, incinerated, or littered. The EPA estimates that in 2018, about 16% of U.S. plastic waste was incinerated while a relatively small amount was littered. Most end up in landfills, including the plastic people dutifully put into recycling bins.

Over decades much of that littered and landfilled plastic breaks down into tiny particles known as microplastics which contaminate our food, the air and our water. They also accumulated in our bodies, potentially increasing our risk of chronic inflammation and other ills.

The only way to stem the rising tide of plastic is for companies to make less of it and for recycling programs to be retooled so that more of what we throw away is actually turned into something useful.

There is little to suggest that this will happen anytime soon. Plastic production is expected to more than double by 2050 and even if it doesn't, the plastic trash that people continue to throw away will still have to go somewhere.

FROM MD5M LIONS

Since the Opening Eyes Healthy Athlete event at Summer Games was canceled due to COVID in 2020 and 2021 Lions reached out to Special Olympics Minnesota about hosting a modified screening where we could screen athletes with the Spot screeners and then have the optometrists present to talk with them about the results and refer them to their local optometrist if needed.

They also shared handouts on the importance of protecting your vision, the 20-20-20 Rule, and Tips for Preventing Vision Loss. For those athletes already wearing glasses they also offered to clean their glasses. It was felt that this type of screening could be offered at different times and places to reach more Special Olympics Athletes when we can return to more in person tournaments.

This modified version of the Opening Eyes Clinic was held on September 25th, during the Bocce and Softball Tournaments held in Woodbury at the Health East Sports Center. We saw a total of 66 athletes, screening 34 with the Spot screeners and all the athletes visited with our two Clinical Directors, Lion Ragna Godtland of the Lakeview Lions in Albert Lea and Megan Sis from Ramsey. Other Lions who assisted with the screening portions were John Hjelmeland, John LeRoy and Ray Moonen – Edina Lions; 5M5 KidSight Chairs Bill & Shari Thurston – St Louis Park Lions and Laura Maki – New Auburn Lions.

We are hopeful that we can return to a regular Opening Eyes Screening at the 2022 Summer Games. With COVID-19 cases on the rise in Minnesota, (state average of over 50 cases per 100,000) Special Olympics Minnesota recently suspended all in-person practices and events which mean that the upcoming Bowling Tournaments scheduled for November have now been changed to virtual events.

Awards-Hall of Fame and Al Jensen

Hall of Fame Award

Our Mid-Winter convention is coming in January, so please consider nominating a Lion member for the **Hall of Fame Award**. To honor those Lion and Lioness members of character and substance who have demonstrated the highest level of commitment and dedication to the efforts of their club, district or multiple district and the motto of our association, "We Serve."

Criteria for this award is:

- May be a Lion or a Lioness
- Must have been a member in good standing for at least 15 years
- Must be at least 2 years removed from the Council of Governors, if a PDG
- Have qualifications above and beyond the call of duty including social and human endeavors
- Should be of good moral character
- Should have a good reputation in good standing in his/her community
- If deceased, must have been a member in good standing of a MD5M Lions or Lioness Club at the time of his/her death

There is a nomination fee of \$150.00. For each candidate nominated and must accompany the nomination to the District Governor. All nominations must be received to the District Governor no later than 30 days prior to our MidWinter Convention, which is no later than **December 8, 2021**.

Lion Al Jensen Leadership Award

Selection Process:

1. One or two awards may be presented annually to Lions who have been members for five years or more.
2. The candidates' selection must be based only on contributions at a District or Multiple level.
3. Each District Governor shall annually nominate no more than one Lion to receive the award.
4. The nomination must be on the official nomination form, signed by the District Governor and submitted to the Council Chair each year no later than **March 1**.
5. Final selection of the award recipients shall be made by a committee of the seated Council Chair and the two previous Council Chairs.

Selection Criteria: The award shall be presented to the most qualified Lions nominated for the award, based on the following criteria:

Leadership Characteristics:

1. Vision... The ability to see or seek out new ideas and new ways to advance the humanitarian service of Lionism.
2. Creativity... Can see new ways to solve problems and to provide humanitarian service. Willingly solicits new ideas from others and helps implement the ideas without worrying about who shall get credit.
3. Courage... Follows through on commitments or a project no matter how difficult it may be. Openly accepts feedback, both complementary and critical, and is able to use the feedback to improve the overall success of the work.
4. Initiative... Willing to step up and make things happen. Accepts assignments when asked and volunteers where needed. Makes things happen and gets things done.
5. Unselfishness... Contributes without expecting something in return. Is most interested in the success of the work and the recognition of those who contributed to the success. Finds satisfaction in the success of the work and the people served, not in the power base that may be gained.
6. Teamwork... Success in organizing a team, delegating work within the team, assuring that all members of the team are informed and committed, and follows through to make sure that the work of the team is successful. Also the ability to listen, take suggestions or directions, communicate, and work successfully as a member of a team.
7. Effectiveness in leading others... Motivates others to be part of a project/ piece of work, gives them clearly defined recognition when the project/work is completed.
8. Best exemplifies the leadership qualities of Lion Al Jensen.

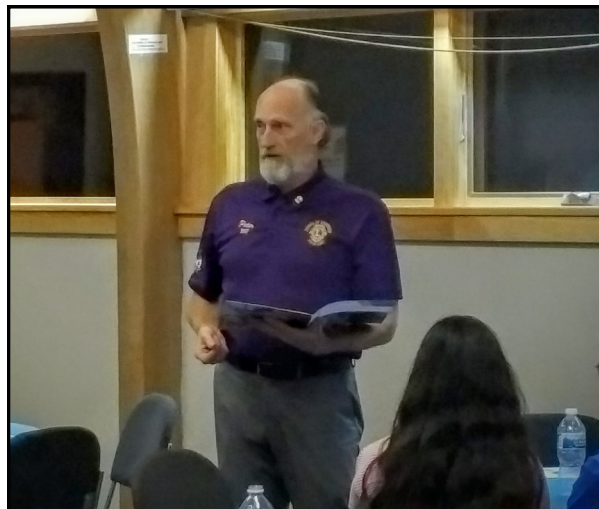
