

HELEN KELLER

Born in 1880, Helen Adams Keller contracted an illness at the age of 19 months that robbed her of sight and hearing. For five years, she lived in a dark and silent world until Anne Sullivan became her teacher and companion. Sullivan gave to Helen Keller the gift of light and language. Sullivan gave to the world the gift of Hellen Keller.

Helen Keller's achievements are absolutely astounding for a deaf and blind woman and this was before any significant consideration was given to the rights of the disabled.

Helen Keller received her BA degree cum laude from Radcliffe College in 1904. She became a published author, an ardent lecturer and human rights advocate. She was awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom, and served as a spokesperson and ambassador for the American Foundation for the Blind until her death in 1968.

In 1925, the legendary Helen Keller spoke to Lions members at their annual convention and challenged them to become "knights of the blind in the crusade against darkness." Millions of Lions members worldwide have devoted their service careers to helping people with visual impairments.

Looking at all Hellen Keller has accomplished; it is quite natural that the Minnesota Lions Vision Foundation developed the Helen Keller Sight Award as a tribute to her. Helen Keller Awards are given to honor those who have distinguished themselves on behalf of sight. They are an excellent way to honor a Lion, Lioness, non-Lion individual, business, or organization. A \$1000.00 donation to the Minnesota Lions Vision Foundation (for Lion Gift of Sight, the Lions Children's Eye Clinic, the MAC Center, the Minnesota Lions Eye Surgery Center, or other Vision Foundation projects) allows the donor to present a Helen Keller Award. The award recipient receives a beautiful plaque and pin, and the recipient's name is displayed on a Helen Keller board in the University of Minnesota's Eye Clinic. Both the donor and the recipient have the satisfaction of supporting worthwhile Lions projects.

WEATHER. GLOBAL WARMING...CLIMATE CHANGE?

It is difficult to ignore what is happening around us: drought, heatwaves, hurricanes, floods, wildfires. Weather refers to atmospheric conditions that happen locally over short periods of time - from minutes to hours or days. Examples would be rain, snow, clouds, winds, floods or thunderstorms. **Global Warming** is the long-term heating of the Earth's climate that has been observed since the pre-industrial period (1850–1900) due to human activities which increases trapping greenhouse gas in the Earth's atmosphere. This is primarily due to fossil fuel burning. Since the pre-industrial era the Earth's average temperature has risen by about 1.8 degrees Fahrenheit and is increasing .36 degrees per decade. It is likely that 95% of the current warming since 1950 is the result of human activity. Climate Change is observed by scientists from the ground, air and space to monitor and study past, present and future climate changes. Some of the indicators are land and ocean temperatures rise, ice lose at the earth's poles and in mountain glaciers, frequency and sever changes in weather. Greenland and Antarctic ice sheets have lost an average of 286 billion tons of ice per vear between 1993 – 2016. Antarctica lost about 127 billion tons per year during this same time - the rate has tripled in the last decade. Glaciers are disappearing around the world, including the Alps, Himalayas, Andes. Rockies. Satellites reveal that the amount of snow cover has decreased in the past 50 years and the snow is melting earlier. The sea level has risen about 8 inches in the century and the rate in the last 20 years is nearly double that of the last century and is increasing every year. The Earth Institute - Columbia University has a list of several ways climate change impacts all of us. These are a few: Damage to homes from floods, fire, storms. People working outdoors will find it more unbearable during heatwaves. High electric bill and more blackouts as temperatures rise and an increase demand for electricity in order to stay cool. More allergies with warmer temperatures, as the pollen season lasts longer. The smoke from the fires in the western US drift to the Midwest, affecting the weather. Water quality could suffer as heavy rains create runoffs into our lakes, rivers and oceans. As Climate Change impacts our lives –remember the Kenyan proverb "Treat the earth well. It was not given to you by your parents. It was loaned to you by your children."

This all began with the vision of a man called Melvin Jones in 1917. The organization became international in 1920. At the international convention in 192, Helen Keller challenged the lions to become knights of the blind.

In 1987 we were watching Three Men and a Baby, Fatal Attraction, Good Morning Vietnam and Dirty Dancing. The average cost of a home was \$92,000, gas was priced at .\$89 a gallon and stamps were \$.24. LCIF was also launched.

Since that beginning, the first grant of \$5,000 was made to South Dakota for flood relief; the Melvin Jones fellowship was established in 1973; the first major catastrophic grant of \$50,000 was sent to Mexico for earthquake relief; 1990 saw the beginning of Sight First, a program to restore sight and. prevent blindness; by 2011 there were 318,070 Melvin Jones Fellowships awarded with 58,126 progressive fellowships; by 2017 there were 13,000 grants totaling 1 billion dollars.

The first grant to 5m7 came in 1987 for an expanded facility for the disabled. Since then, he district has received \$616,484.01 in grants.

LCIF is our foundation. Last year clubs and individuals donated \$17,200. For those donations, thank you. In upcoming articles, we'll discuss some of those grants in more detail.

MN LIONS CHILDHOOD CANCER FOUNDATION

Each year, more than 300,000 children are diagnosed with cancer globally. This means that a child is diagnosed with cancer every 2 minutes.

Globally, 37% of children with cancer survive, but survival rates vary widely by region. In 2018, the World Health Organization launched the Global Initiative for Childhood Cancer with the goal of reaching at least 60% survival rate for children with cancer by 2030. The Initiative brings together stakeholders from around the world and across sectors towards the common goal.

Nearly 80% of children with cancer live in low or middle-income countries, where only 10% of children survive cancer. In developed countries like Canada, Japan, and the United States, more than 80% of children with cancer survive. The good news is that the world can be more successful at curing cancer in children. However, much work needs to be done to improve access to drugs and treatment, train healthcare providers, improve facilities and technology, and address socio-cultural barriers to improve global childhood cancer survival rates.

BELIEVE AWARD: Clubs donating \$1,000.00 have earned our beautiful, Believe Award. We are so proud of the design and hope your club can display your successful contributions to assisting children with cancer. Currently our foundation is keeping records of all the club donations. Your club does not have to contribute all the funds at once to earn the Believe Award. Donations to the U of M Hospital will be designated for the Childhood Cancer Survivor Program. And the MNLCCF is the leading contributor for this new program! And we have pins!!!! Please request pins from your district representative, they are \$5.00/each.



Important Dates: September 18: Start of mailing absentee ballots to voters who have applied. October 15: Registering to vote closes but reopens on Election Day. November 3: Election Day.

Anyone can request an absentee ballot at **mnvotes.sos.state.mn.us** and you can track your ballot just as you would a package.

- ⇒ Mail in your ballot or deliver it to the county election office by 3:00 pm on Election Day.
- ⇒ Most polling places are open from 7:00am to 8:00 pm.
- ⇒ You can register at a polling place on Election Day. You'll need a Minnesota Drivers license or other form of identification such as bill, bank statement, etc.
- ⇒ If you registered 21 days before Election Day, you do not need to supply identification at the polls.
- ⇒ Pollinig places will follow CDC guidelines for health and safety. Voters will be offered masks and hand sanitizer but will not be required to wear a mask.
- ⇒ With fewer election workers, some polling places may be combined. Check with your county or city election office to find your location.

Here are five reasons to vote: 1] Elections have consequences such as the power to decide on the quality of life you want for yourself and future generations. 2] Not voting is giving up your voice 3] It's choosing how your money/taxes are used 4] It's an opportunity for change 5] Your community depends on you to vote.

We're hoping in November the Zone Chairs can give us an update on what's going on with their clubs/Zones.

Getting a flu vaccine is more important than ever during 2020-2021 to protect yourself and the people around you from flu, and to help reduce the strain on healthcare systems responding to the COVID-19 pandemic.



Seasonal flu shots protect against the three or four influenza viruses that research suggests may be most common during the upcoming season.

CDC recommends use of any licensed, age-appropriate influenza vaccine during the 2020-2021 influenza season, including inactivated influenza vaccine [IIV], recombinant influenza vaccine [RIV], or live attenuated influenza vaccine (LAIV). No preference is expressed for any influenza vaccine over another. Both trivalent (three-ingredient) and quadrivalent (four-ingredient) influenza vaccines will be available. A trivalent flu shot made using an adjuvant (an ingredient that helps create a stronger immune response), approved for people 65 years of age and older.

There are many flu vaccine options to choose from, but the most important thing is for all people 6 months and older to get a flu vaccine every year. If you have questions about which vaccine is best for you, talk to your doctor or other health care professional. More information on approved flu vaccines for the 2020-2021 flu season, and age indications for each vaccine are available in CDC's Table: U.S. Influenza Vaccine Products for the 2020-2021 Season.

Influenza (flu) vaccine effectiveness (VE) can vary. The protection provided by a flu vaccine varies from season to season and depends in part on the age and health status of the person getting the vaccine and the similarity or "match" between the viruses in the vaccine and those in circulation. During years when the flu vaccine match is good, the benefits of flu vaccination will vary, depending on factors like the characteristics of the person being vaccinated (for example, their health and age), what influenza viruses are circulating that season and, potentially, which type of flu vaccine was used.

Flu vaccine side effects are generally mild and go away on their own within a few days. Some side effects that may occur from a flu shot include soreness, redness, and/or swelling where the shot was given, headache (low grade), fever, nausea, muscle aches, and fatigue. The flu shot, like other injections, can occasionally cause fainting.




What's Up
