The grand prize winner of the 24th Lions International Peace Poster contest is a 13-year-old girl from the Philippines. Trisha Co Reyes, who attends St. Stephen's High School. She was sponsored by the Manila Centennial Lions Club. She received a \$5,000 prize and attended an award ceremony during the Lions Day with the United Nations (LDUN) last March 14th in New York City. She was be accompanied by her mother, her sister and the president of the Manila Centennial Lions Club, Trisha's winning poster was chosen for its originality, artistic merit and portrayal of this year's theme "Children Know Peace"

In addition to the grand prize winner, there are 23 merit award winners who received a certificate and \$500 each. This year's merit award winning children came from Brazil, China, Colombia, England, Guam, Iceland, India, Japan, Panama, Peru, Portugal, Romania, Republic of South Africa, Taiwan, Thailand and the United States (Arizona, Connecticut, Georgia, Kansas, Minnesota, New Hampshire and North Carolina). The theme of the 25th annual competition will be "Imagine Peace."


Annually, more than 350,000 entries are drawn by children ages 11 to 13. The winning poster was chosen from the 126 posters from 60 countries that made it to the international level of judging after being narrowed down at local levels.

NEW SCHEDULE OF INTERNATIONAL CONVENTION

The five days International Convention is usually held beginning Monday and ending on Friday. This year, for the first time, in Busan, Korea, it will be held beginning Friday and end on Tuesday.

LIONS CLUBS STRENGTHEN PHILANTHROPY

A new study shows what we Lions already know: Lions volunteer and give more generously than the general population. The study surveyed Lions in 12 countries worldwide in partnership with Center on Philanthropy at Indiana University and CCS, . The study coincides with Lions Clubs' 95th anniversary. Topics also included leadership and women.



- Approximately 6.8% of children younger than 18 years in the United States have a diagnosed eye and vision condition.
- In 2001, about 2 million Americans sustained eye injuries that required medical attention.
- An estimated 61 million adults in the United States are at high risk for serious vision loss, but only half visited an eye doctor in the past 12 months.
- The annual economic impact of major vision problems among the adult population 40 years and older is more than \$51 billion.
- Vision disability is one of the top 10 disabilities among adults 18 years and older and one of the most prevalent disabling conditions among children.
- Early detection and timely treatment of eye conditions such as diabetic retinopathy has been found to be efficacious and cost effective.
- The National Commission on Prevention Priorities has identified vision screening among adults aged 65 years and older as one of the top 10 priorities among effective clinical preventive services.
- Vision loss causes a substantial social and economic toll for millions of people including significant suffering, disability, loss of productivity, and diminished quality of life.
- National and state data show that more than half of adult Americans who did not seek eye care are due to lack of awareness or costs; which often exacerbated by lack of adequate health insurance.
- More than 70% of survey respondents from National Eye Health Education Program (NEHEP) 2005 Public Knowledge, Attitudes, and Practices survey consider that the loss of their eyesight would have the greatest impact on their day-to-day life; however, less than 11% knew that there are no early warning signs of glaucoma and diabetic retinopathy.

San Diego Classic Lions Club Nominates 2012-13 Officers By: Aida McDaniel

The club meeting last March 29, 2012 was the final nominations meeting for the San Diego Classic Lions Club. All offices were filled and nominated candidates were all unopposed and most likely will be the officers to be elected on the April 12, 2012 election meeting.

In speaking with the other clubs in the region, it seems there is a common problem during this time of the year... the time of nominations and election. Almost no one wants to step up to be the president. People are fast to accept to be the vice president thinking "the vice president does not have to do much"... or "the vice president does not have to do anything at all".

The vice president is an important office as do the other offices are. One of the duties and obligations of the vice president is to take over in presiding the meeting when the president is not there. In most cases, the president is always present and so the vice president very seldom has to do this duty. There are other important duties and obligations but primarily, the vice president should be groomed to be the next president. He or she should also be always present during meetings and projects to observe and learn. When you accept to be the vice president, be prepared to be the next president. Some clubs have 1st, 2nd, & 3rd vice presidents and these three positions should follow the rules of succession... meaning they have to replace the next level position. This is what happens in the international level and even in the district level when the 1st International Vice President becomes the only candidate for the 1st Vice President and a new 2nd Vice President is elected. In the district level, the 1VDG is the only candidate for DG and the 2VDG for 1VDG and a new 2VDG is elected.



The Lions Clubs of San Diego and Imperial Counties are hosting the 62nd Annual (Mike Morrow) Invitational High School Baseball Tournament on April 2-5, 2012

This tournament is the oldest, the biggest and the best high school tournament in the nation. Last year, 118 schools were hosted and the players came from as far away as San Francisco, Utah and Nevada!

The tournament was founded by Dewey J. Morrow, a member of the San Diego Host Lions Club, who, together with fellow high school baseball coach Les Cassie, convinced the Lions Club to sponsor a high school baseball tournament back in 1950. Mike ran the tournament until the early 70's. After his death, the Lions honored his legacy by naming the tournament after him.

Lions members meet for eight months to plan and execute this major endeavor which takes place every year during Easter week. The Tourney is attended by team scouts...in fact over 120 high school baseball players who have competed in this tournament have gone on to have careers in Major League Baseball, including Eric Karros, Graig Nettles, Bob Boone, Thad Bosley, Randy Johnson, Barry Zito and Alan Trammell.
