OCTOBER IS FOR MEMBERSHIP

As we enter October, we recognize that it is international membership month for Lions clubs. This is the month to put forth that extra effort in attempting to get a new member(s).

Have your Membership Director bring it up in your clubs at both meetings. Ask your neighbors, golf buddies, fellow church members, business/work associates, etc. Anyone.

And remember, you can sponsor new members into clubs other than your own. I sponsored a member once into a club 50 miles away from me. I have also co-sponsored a member with another Lion so we both get 1/2 credit for that member towards our key awards.

Key awards come automatically from International. Your new members must stay in for a year and a day to be eligible for you. You get your Membership Key Award after sponsoring just 2 members. The Membership Advancement Key Award comes after just 5 members. With only 10 new members, you get the Builder Key Award, and the Senior Builder Key Award with 15 members. The awards go all the way to sponsoring 500 new members giving you the Supreme Key Award.

Membership, as you will remember, is what keeps our association alive and growing. Growing in service to others. The more of us there are, the less work each of us has to do. So you see, it benefits us personally to help make our clubs grow.

Growing our membership should be a yearlong endeavor for all of us, but let's make a concerted effort to help build our association and our clubs during the international membership month – October.

Remember, "Together... We Can Serve More!"

Lions of 25D, as you may have read by now, this year I am focusing on ways to recognize and appreciate those Lions in our midst. This is clearly a topic of interest, as I tried to attend a session on recognition at the USA-Canada Forum and it was standing room only. We all want to share our appreciation of others and we want some recognition of our own efforts, but we want to receive that recognition in different ways.

While I wait for access to their slides, I will share some general thoughts about appreciation taken from the concepts of *The Five Love Languages* by Gary

Chapman. While he originally wrote the book to help spouses understand each other, his idea that people give and receive love and appreciation in different ways has application in all of our relationships, including with our fellow Lions. I find that the taco definitions provide some insights into the five types of affirmation, so I've shared that here. What I would note for those who are unfamiliar with the book is that we all have preferred ways of giving and receiving appreciation or affection, but we need to understand that the other person may want to receive appreciation differently than how we usually give it (I like to receive words of affirmation, but I'm more likely to give acts of service. Some

folks might want to spend quality time over coffee while others want a pat on the back or a hug.)

For your fellow Lions, understand that while we may tend to give acts of service (because WE SERVE), sometimes we need to use words of affirmation or quality time or even a physical pat on the back to let another Lion know how much we appreciate their efforts. Spend some time this month thinking of different ways you can appreciate your fellow Lions.

Public Service Information

For years, teenage traffic deaths have been on the rise, but just recently a new report from Zutobi shows that these deaths are at their highest in nearly a decade.

Zutobi's latest report shows the number of teen road deaths has increased by 19.5% in 2020 reaching 2,966 fatalities. Their report shows the most common age group dying in crashes ranges from 15-20.

Officials point to three main causes of crashes: alcohol, speeding and distracted driving, with the most common distraction being cell phones. According to Zutobi's report, speaking on the phone increases your risk of a crash by two times and texting increases it by up to six times.

In order to reduce the number of teens dying in crashes, authorities with the Indiana State Police suggest setting good habits early on, eliminating distractions and being responsible.

Union City Lions Club

The Union City Lions Club met on Sept. 27th at the Union City Community Room. The program was presented by Steve James, the president, and CEO of Frank Miller Lumber in Union City. Steve grew up in Flint, Michigan and worked in management at GM until 2011. He joined FML as CFO, and 7 years ago assumed his current position.

FML is a 119-year-old global business that sells rough-cut white oak in 35 countries. Most of the logs they cut are 8 to 120 years old and most are harvested within a 450 mile radius of Union City. Frank Miller Lumber uses the entire log, producing 0% waste. The logs yield boards, bark that is turned into mulch, wood chips that are sold to a paper factory, and sawdust that is burned in the boilers that make heat



to dry the lumber. They plant two trees for each tree they harvest. Steve believes in servant leadership and works hard to make FML a great place for its employees to work. They are fully employed right now with 152 employees. Thank you Steve for a very informative program. Thank you to Frank Miller Lumber for being a great community partner.


