This month, the answer is: **Someone aiding those impacted by disasters.** I had no idea when I listed this answer last summer that we would be

offering aid to our own right now, but I am grateful for so many who have stepped up to assist our Lions and so many others in Selma and Winchester. As I've shared in my visits, the Lions Club International Foundation has emergency grants ready when natural disasters occur. When the tornadoes struck on March 14, our state LCIF coordinators were reaching out that evening to offer assistance with the grant application. We were able to submit the grant request on Friday, and received funds in our district account the following Tuesday, which let us purchase \$10,000 of needed totes, gloves and other supplies for the clean up and recovery efforts. DGE David 'Rocky' Simpson and especially 1VDGE Jim Dubeansky were present on the ground, talking to our Selma and Winchester clubs and the local Homeland Security/FEMA folks and getting our supplies to where they could be appropriately distributed. Lions have called to volunteer their labor and Lions in other districts in Indiana have donated funds to assist. Our prayers are with our fellow Lions as they work toward recovery.

Message from First Vice District Governor Elect Jim

Hello Fellow Lions:

I hope you're all doing well and that you're all registered and ready for the State Convention at the end of this month. Some of you may have heard, we had a EF3 Tornado hit Randolph Coun-

ty, Indiana on March 14th in the evening around 8:00 pm. It did a lot of damage to several homes in Winchester and some in the Union City area. It had wind speeds of 165, so it was really close to being a EF4 Tornado. Selma, Indiana had a separate tornado hit them that night. It was an EF2. There were no fatalities, thank God, but a lot of homes destroyed and businesses gone. With the help of our District Governor Julia, we worked together and were able to obtain an LCIF disaster grant for \$10,000 for Randolph County Tornado Relief assistance. Plus all the Lions clubs in the District 25D area that brought donations to Union City Lions club as we were the housing club for donations for the Lions. I was the person on the ground, taking stuff back and forth to the donation site. The area of the tornado strike was restricted as a Red Zone, meaning there was no entry. But being a Homeland Security person I was allowed in and out. I was communicating with the officers in charge of what was needed as donations and spreading the word.

I kept our District Governor updated as needed on the progress, what was needed and how things were going when we received a semi with 10 pallets of products for the tornado relief assistance. The pallets were broken down by a group of Lions from Union City and Saratoga Lions. They loaded up and took items to the staging area in Winchester.

This all just shows that all of us Lions are stronger than people realize and that we're here to do one big thing and that is SERVE our Community. We help where we can. And that we did. I say thank you to all that donated and brought stuff to Union City, it was very busy time for me but I survived it and I did it with Lion Pride every moment.

I ask if I would've done anything differently, no. I've got the best support troop in the world behind me and they are called the Indian Lions. We serve our community with Pride, no matter what. We're here front and center to serve.

The Big Eclipse is coming April 8th and the Union City area is in a perfect viewing area so anyone wanting to watch the eclipse - come on over I have room at my place to watch it!

Staying Cyber Safe While Traveling

Traditional vacation season is upon us. Maybe you're going out of the country or staying close to home. Wherever you go, it's certain that you'll take along a device that needs access to the internet. That means staying safe while traveling and while online.

Be overly cautious when using public Wi-Fi. Public Wi-Fi, including the free internet at coffee shops, hotels, and airports is often targeted by hackers just waiting for you to connect. While these locations try to protect your online security, don't blindly trust them. They often don't have cyber experts constantly monitoring security updates and threats.

Below are a few tips to stay safe when accessing public Wi-Fi.

- Activate your Virtual Private Network (VPN). A VPN will encrypt your data between endpoints so that it's unusable by hackers.
- Access only password protected sites. When scanning for networks, a secured network will have a lock icon by it. You're still not 100% secure, but your odds will be higher.
- Ensure the Wi-Fi you're accessing is the Wi-Fi you think it is. Cyber thieves may create an evil twin that looks like the official connection. For example, Hotel-Router looks a lot like Hotel-Routers, but only one is the official access point.
- Never bank online through a public Wi-Fi. If you must, always have a VPN activated. You also can use cell instead of Wi-Fi. Cellular connections are inherently built with more security than Wi-Fi. Data rates will apply when using cellular connections.
- Never, ever use a USB cord to charge your device through a public charging station. Always use the device's charging block and an electrical receptacle.

Though this isn't about security, if you're traveling outside the country contact your carrier to ensure you have international coverage turned on. You can turn it off when you return. Your wallet will thank you.
