Greetings to all Lions of 25-D!

Some may say I'm stretching my theme of games a little, but I wanted to talk about a different type of game, namely jigsaw puzzles. I feel that these count as games because they can be a way for people to spend time together working on the puzzle. Also, you can create your own set of rules in solving them. You may decide that you won't look at the picture on the box or you will put all the



edges to the side and add them last, as most people do those first, or you may go for a real challenge and put all the pieces upside down and try to just finish the puzzle by shape alone. And, most importantly, there is a definite goal you are trying to achieve. 



Is Your Home Internet Router Part of a Worldwide Cyberattack?

The FBI is warning that internet routers in our homes could pose a security threat nationwide. Per the article above, China cyber hackers have hijacked out-of-date home routers to prepare for a cyber attack. From the article . . .

The FBI says the attacks target older routers with outdated security made by Cisco and NetGear. Hackers can secretly install malware, and use the routers to launch cyberattacks on critical U.S. infrastructure. The bureau announced this week that investigators took down "hundreds" of infected home and small business routers.

There are actions you can take in order to reduce your hardware's vulnerability.

- **Update the firmware on your devices** Turn on auto-update if your device has that feature. The article doesn't say it, but the hackers are getting into your routers through security holes rather than by password hacks. If auto-update is not available, you can manually update your router.
- Make your router password complicated and difficult to hack. While it is not in most cases a password hack, it is just another point of entry for hackers.
- **Replace old hardware** If your hardware is 3-5 years old or more, chances are higher that it is no longer receiving the latest security updates.

*** Documentation on your router can be found on that company's web site or through a simple search on the internet.

Be proactive in your security defense. Update or replace your hardware. And when you do, don't forget to pull the newest security updates immediately.

What better way to grow our clubs than to be in an Attitude of enthusiasm, joy and express it day in and day out. I show it to everyone I come in contact with. Always have and always will. WHY? do you say! Because I celebrate life. The longer this Lion lives the more I understand the impact attitude has on life. It is far more important than the past (which should be forgotten anyway); than money, than circumstances, than failure,

than successes, than what other people think or say. Many an unpleasant situation is relieved by a tactful remark; many an enemy is converted into being a friend by a timely courtesy. It'll feel so good that you just might be a winner of awards like I have for getting a Lion to join because of the human interest I have to help my fellow in need and to change the world one Lion at a time.

This kind of fun will certainly improve your attitude. We know that life is 10% what happens and 90% how we react to it. And so it is with you my fellow Lions. We are in charge of our attitude. At the last meeting on Feb 28th the club was treated to PDG Mike Imbler, District 25D Eyeglass Recycling Chairman. Mike spoke to the club outlining specifics of this project for the international organization. A lot of Mike's information contained updated activities and statistics. The Lions Club screens for eye glasses in many schools, and have found a 23% student failure. Around the world, 1 in 4 students cannot see properly, and

a big reason the Lions Club collects glasses for recycling. Also, many countries do not make eye glasses and rely on the Lion's recycling efforts. Last year 25D alone collected 45,000 pairs of glasses.

25D has small cardboard boxes available for businesses to collect used glasses from customers; which are picked up by the Lions Club when full. Stacy talked about the path Workhorse has taken in the past few years as they navigated changes in management and vehicle production. Workhorse invested in plant upgrades and has now fo-

cused its production on the W56 all-electric delivery vehicle it launched in August of 2023. This vehicle has a range of around 120 miles which makes it ideal for delivery companies. Stacy talked about the workforce they employ and said that 70% of their laborers live within a 20-minute drive of the plant. Workhorse feels they are positioned to do well in the next few years as the push for electric vehicles moves forward. Thanks to Stacy for a very informative program.

Westfield Lions Club Announce 2024 Scholarship List Club Increases Number and Value of Scholarships

Each year the Westfield Lions Club provides a variety of scholarships for graduating Westfield High School seniors. A combination of factors has led to the club adding more scholarships and increasing the dollar amounts for them. The sizes of the graduating classes each year has continued to jump; the cost of college increases each year; and the Westfield Lions Club has had tremendous success with its largest fundraising event, their semi-annual "Poker for Sight" Texas Hold 'em Tournament. All of this has led the Lions to expanding their scholarship offerings and raising the amounts of each scholarship.

For years the Club offered three scholarships – the Florence Benson Memorial Scholarship, the Lester Tudor Memorial Scholarship, and one or two scholarships for the Westfield H.S. LEO Club. Together these scholarships typically totaled \$3000. In 2023 the Club decided to aggressively expand their list to total 9 scholarships worth \$16,500.

A major change in the scholarship offerings involves the introduction of scholarships for students interested in pursuing an education at trade and vocational schools, including the culinary arts. The Lions recognized that not all graduating students are interested in going to the traditional 4-year colleges, and there seems to be a need to encourage students to consider pursuing careers in the trades.

The 2024 list of Westfield Lions Club scholarships is:

Don Russel Career Development Scholarship (\$2000): Named in honor of one of the most outstanding Lions in the Westfield club's history, this scholarship is awarded to a student who will be attending a trade or vocational school.

(2) Trade & Vocational Scholarship (\$2000): These two scholarships are also for graduating seniors intending to attend trade or vocational schools.

Culinary Arts Scholarship (\$2000): The Westfield Lions Club has long been a financial supporter of the WHS Culinary Arts program. In 2023 they offered their first scholarship specifically targeted to a graduating culinary arts student who will be continuing their training for the food service industry. **Service Over Self Scholarship (\$3500 total to be divided between 2 students):** These scholarships (formerly known as LEO Club scholarships) are awarded to students who demonstrate a commitment to serving in their community. The Lions Club works closely with the SOS Club to help support their service work in Westfield.

Lester Tudor Memorial Scholarship (\$2000): Named in honor of a former Lion who also was a principal at Westfield H.S.

Florence Benson Memorial Scholarship (\$2000): Named in honor of a former Westfield H.S. home economics teacher who was recognized as an outstanding educator and community volunteer. This scholarship is awarded to a student who demonstrates a commitment to serving others in the community.

Outstanding Male Athlete of the Year (\$500): Selected by the Westfield Athletic Department. Outstanding Female Athlete of the Year (\$500): Selected by the Westfield Athletic Department.

Library to host mile-long line dance in Russiaville

The town of Russiaville will become the site of a mile-long line dance in April, thanks to the library and other community partners.

In partnership with the Russiaville Community Outreach Board, the Kokomo-Howard County Public Library will host a mile-long line dance alongside the Gene Parks 5K run and walk. The event will take place April 13, the final day of National Library Week.

Each year, Russiaville hosts the Gene Parks race. This year, the race will be paired with a milelong line dance stretching from KHCPL's Russiaville location to the Russiaville Lion's Club.

Lori Seaman, KHCPL branches assistant and Russiaville Lion, said people can join the line dance at either the library or the Lion's Club, with dancers meeting in the middle. Seaman hopes as many people join in as possible, adding that she encourages groups to consider participating together.

In addition to the line dance and race, a group of Scouts will host a pancake brunch at the Russiaville Lion's Club from 8:30-11:30 a.m. The cost is \$10 for adults and \$6 for children 3-12 years old. The funds will support scouts raising money for a trip to Iceland.

Seaman said she hopes residents of Russiaville and beyond will come out to participate and support local organizations.

The line dance will be free for anyone wishing to participate.

Registration for the Gene Parks race costs \$25 for the 5K, \$15 for a one-mile fun run or \$30 for both. Registration will take place from 8:30-9:15 a.m., with the fun run taking place at 9:15 and the 5K starting at 10 a.m.

Proceeds from the 5K will support the Carl Koontz Scholarship, and proceeds from the 1-mile fun run will support Ainsley's Angels, an organization that works to ensure everyone can participate in endurance events regardless of physical ability. Participants can also learn more about and donate to a planned inclusive playground for the town of Russiaville.
