I have added a letter to fill out to send to the high school leadership to ask permission to do this one night of fundraising and add to this year's budget for the athletes of the Special Olympics so that those athletes can participate in this year's competition. So that's our mission - we will help fund this year's Special Olympics program.

We Serve

Mission 1.5 is a three-year mission to get more Lions members for our clubs. Lions do wonderful service projects that make all of our fundraisers and projects easier as more hands make less work. Invite your friends to help in service projects. Most people want to lend a hand to help others.

My Mission 1.5 goals have already been submitted to Lions International. In the first 4 days of August, I'll be in Chicago training to meet my 2024 – 2025 goal: +25 new members for the District. I have a stretch Goal of +50, if at all possible. That goal did not go to Lions International. The previous Governor had + 9 at the end of the year. IPDG/CC Julia Kozicki was the only Governor that had a positive member growth in the past year. I'm trying to follow her game plan and continue the momentum of her very successful year.

So, How do you get New Lions Members? You ask THEM! Goals require everyone to help. So, I ask you to please help me reach this goal.

On Thursday, the 4th, the Noblesville Lions enjoyed paying tribute to the USA in the city's parade. It was a fun event with quite a few Lions participating.




