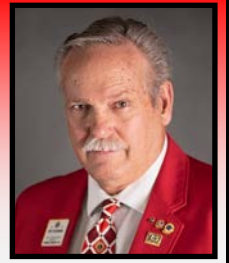

We have our health, our family, our careers, our children and grandchildren, our homes, our material goods, and there are many that do not have one or more of those items. They are the ones we help. Those down on their luck and suffering in one way or another.

I still recall my "Project Christmas" from 32 years ago when I was Governor the first time. I received notification of a family where the mother was incarcerated, the father was nowhere to be seen, the grandfather had passed, and 5 children under the age of 12 were being raised by their grandmother in HUD home with no stove or refrigerator. It was a cold winter and she was keeping bologna and milk cold on their front porch.

Well, I put the "machine" to work calling about a dozen Lions clubs and telling them of this plight and our need to serve. Within 48 hours, myself and a few others delivered to this family, a used (but working) stove and refrigerator, a bag of girls clothing and a bag of boys clothing, wrapped packages of toys and other items, \$1,800 in cash, and believe it or not, a decorated Christmas tree.

The grandmother cried almost uncontrollably. Her response was "Now I can give these children a decent meal". And it all came from Lions and Lions clubs just like you and yours. True story.

We're coming into the season so let's continue serving our communities in a fashion representative of our history.

And don't forget to put out your yard sign stating "A Proud Lion Lives here"! Share what your club is doing and perhaps get a new member or two that wants to serve also. We all have a lot to do in this season but we can all spare a couple hours to help others less fortunate.

Remember, "Together... We Can Serve More!"

LCIF and Hurricane Ian

First, LCIF Grant Staff met with Area E (Florida and Puerto Rico) LCIF Coordinators FL Lions and other state officials to assess the situation. This answer may include FEMA or other relief agencies that go in before Lions.

Second, assessments are a requirement before any type of funding can be sent.

LCIF advises they are in constant communications with LCIF Area Leaders in Florida, the Carolinas and Puerto Rico.

When a major grant of \$100,000 is granted that usually goes to the MD for distribution as needed. Everything else comes from smaller grants, usually requested by the Governors, after a plan is put into place.

Please go online and look at the LCIF Grant Toolbox which explains the steps required by a district or club before grants are distributed. If there are questions, Grant specialists at LCIF will be happy to work with you. While Indiana may not have hurricanes, we have tornados and floods, even fires as dry as it has been. Be a scout and be prepared.

One of our Lions is...

...about to quit. No one might realize this yet, including them. They may have stopped coming to club events. They may feel they don't really know anyone in the club any longer or don't feel their contribution matters. They may not have a good way to get to the projects or events (see the September 2022 article). Worst of all, they may be having differences with one or more other Lions and the easiest way to not be in that situation is to just not be there.



Whatever the reason, the good news is there are things we can all do about this situation.

First, we can remember why we joined Lions. The service done by Lions is awesome and is a source of positive change around the world. We have joined this organization to help with doing the service that just isn't being done another way. It certainly can be tiring and appear unimportant, but it is worthwhile and needed.

Second, we can see if we have done a disservice to another Lion (and trust me, I am talking to myself more than anyone else!). We are a service organization, but the organization full of people with lots of different personalities and viewpoints. In expressing ours, we may have annoyed or offended someone else. We may not even know we did this. If you do think of something, whether you feel you were right or not, reach out to the other person and let them know you want to try to repair any damage. We don't have to agree on everything, but I hope we can agree we are trying to make a positive difference.

Third, every club can contact Lions that either are still members not participating or those that have quit in the last few years and find out what caused this. There may not be a way to fix it, but they joined Lions to help, and they may still want to do that under different circumstances.

Finally, if a club is tired or feeling they don't make a difference, reach out to your Zone Chair and/or to the District Leadership to talk about this before the situation gets worse. There are lots and lots of people who are ready and willing to help.

Thank you for being a Lion. Thank you for all of the time and energy you put into your Club and your community. Thank you for helping others be a part of this great organization.

Message from Global Service Team—Gloria Careins:

The affect you have on others is the most valuable currency there is...



I once heard an actor say this during a speech, and his statement resonates with me. My belief that I can make a difference is part of the reason I became a Lion. I am sure this was a deciding factor for many of you as well. The Lions Club motto is “we serve” after all. I know most of you already have some great programs in place and it makes me happy to know we are working to help others and show the community we are here for them. Let’s get creative and find ways for all of our clubs to get more involved.

I think “currency” looks different in today’s communities, from the way it once did. The way people spend their time is very different. Parents are much more involved in activities with their children. Technology has made it easier to do more, so we found more to do. It used to be much easier to gather a group of people and take on a service project. Nowadays a lot of people are going somewhere or doing something and, therefore, don’t have the time to serve.

But what if we totally revamp the way we think about service? If it is harder to get several people together, then find ways for individuals to make a difference when it fits into their schedule. Collect some information from your members so you can better fit them for the needs in your community. When is each member usually free, (days, evenings, weekends, Thursdays). Can their kids help? Do they have skills or talents they are willing to share? Take those things and find out what the needs are. Go to town meetings find out what is going on and where the Lions Club can help based on the info you gathered from your members. We don’t have to take the community en masse. We can make a difference one act of kindness at a time. Whether someone takes a home cooked meal to a shut in, or takes them their mail. One person can do those things. The impact could be huge if you find ways for individuals to serve when they can and maybe have several people doing separate things, but still showing lots of people what the Lions Club is all about. This flexibility may also draw younger members in who are living that tight schedule and need to have options in order to help.

Service has benefits for each of us individually as well. Volunteering helps combat depression and makes you happy. It increases self-confidence and gives you a sense of purpose. Let’s focus on finding new ways to be successfully involved in our communities, for their benefit as well as our own. I want to know the ideas you come up with. What can we do to make a powerful mark in our communities?

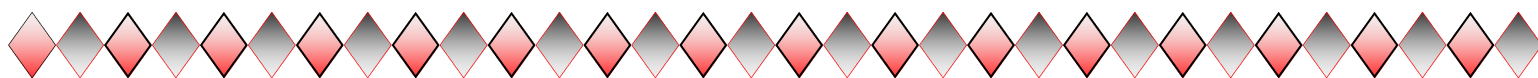

What is happening around the district?

Anderson Noon Lions Club

The Anderson Noon Lions Club celebrated its centennial with a banquet on Oct. 15. Keynote speaker was PID Lion Shea Nickell. During the celebration dinner PID Nickell presented Anderson President Lion George Smith with the International President's Certificate of Appreciation.

Earlier in the day, PID Nickell, his wife Lion Dr. Carolyn S Watson, several Anderson Lions and district leaders toured the Anderson Paramount Theatre, a rare atmospheric movie palace dating from 1929. Lion George Smith gave a mini-concert on the theatre's historic Grande Page pipe organ. Smith, a music store owner and music teacher, frequently plays the Paramount's theatre organ at holiday concerts and special events.

Lions International granted a charter for the Anderson club to a group of businessmen lead by attorney and prominent community leader Arthur Call in 1922. Charter members included physicians, attorneys and business owners. The Marion Lions Club was the sponsor. At that time Indiana had only four clubs with a membership of 202.

For many years, the Anderson Noon Lions conducted two major fundraising events: an annual Home and Auto Show staged each spring in the Anderson High School Wigwam gymnasium and the Indiana Lions Bowling Tournament in the winter. Proceeds from these projects funded camp buildings used by the local Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts, projects for the Wilson Boy's Club, and, in the 1980s, a permanent home for the St. John's Children's Clinic.

The Anderson Noon Lions Club has sponsored seven Indiana clubs: Chief Anderson, Connersville, Elwood, Alexandria, Muncie, Pendleton and Edgewood.

Several Anderson Lions served as District Governors, including the club's charter president and later PID Arthur Call, Dr. E. L. Wessar, J. Luther Elsea, John F. Brown, Sherrill Fox, Ralph McCleary and Stephen Holtzleiter.

PID Nickell recognized several Lions at the banquet as Dukes or Duchesses of Paducah on behalf of Paducah, Kentucky, where he lives. Lions Kathy and Doug Lozier are photographed receiving their certificates.

The Lions delegation received a welcome and brief history of the Paramount Theatre from Executive Director Randy Hammel.

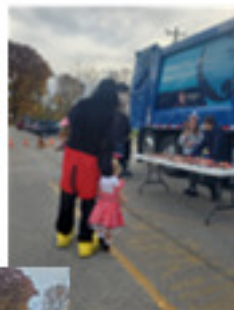

Union City Indiana Mayor, Chad Spence signed a document proclaiming November 5th as Union City Lions Club Pancake Day. The Proclamation reads:

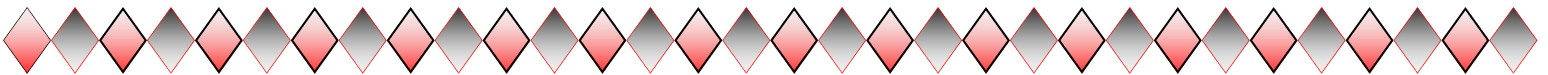
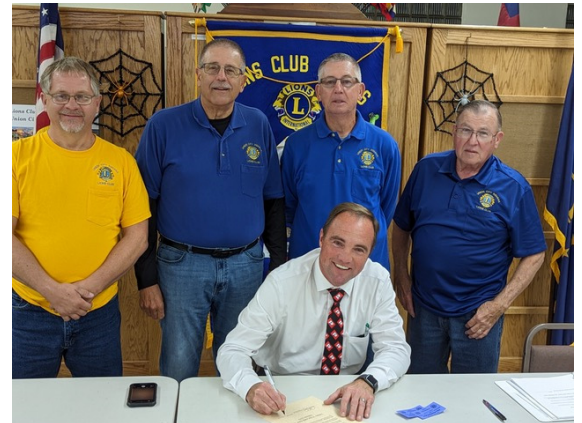
Whereas: The Union City Lions Club is celebrating the 75th Anniversary of its founding;

Whereas: The Union City Lions Club holds two Sausage and Pancake Fundraisers each year;

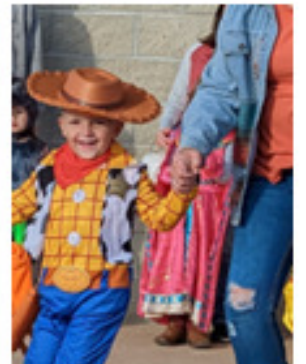

VISION SCREENING

As you all should know, Vision is one of the most important service projects Lions International is known for. In 1925, Helen Keller challenged the Lions to be "Knights of the Blind". We work hard to keep that promise to her.

BUT....How are the people of the world going to know this if we do not report the number of people we service. Vision screening is a very easy service project to complete and is very rewarding.

SO...DO YOU...

- 1) Contact your local school systems to set up screening dates? Best time to do this is about a month after school starts. The school nurse must report these mandated test figures by a deadline to the State of Indiana.
- 2) Supply the information form to the school nurse or each student to be completed and presented at the time screening?
- 3) Is your Vision Screening team properly trained? Get more people in your Club trained.
- 4) Do you have a standard team that screens?
- 5) Do you wear your Lions Club gear (shirt, vest or hat)?
- 6) Do you work with social media (Facebook, LC newsletter, local newspaper) to present a completed service project to your community?

- 7) Report your numbers using the new form provided to each Club. Photo or scan copy to:-

The State Vision Screen Chair passes along these numbers to Lions International so they can report to the public what our 1.3 million Lions are doing. This helps bring in donations for a much needed service project for children all around the world.
